SECOND AMENDED ONEIDA COUNTY SUPPLEMENTAL ASSIGNED COUNSEL PROGRAM

WHEREAS, the Board of the Oneida County Bar Association initially adopted the Oneida County Supplemental Assigned Counsel Program ("Plan") which was adopted by the Oneida County Board of Legislators on June 6, 1966 to provide legal services to indigent individuals who could not be represented by the Oneida County Public Defender due to a conflict of interest; and,

WHEREAS, the Plan was thereafter Amended by the Oneida County Bar Association on April 8, 2021; and,

WHEREAS, it has become necessary to make an additional change to the Oneida County Supplemental Assigned Counsel Program;

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY:

RESOLVED, the Oneida County Supplemental Assigned Counsel Program shall be authorized to compensate attorneys under the Plan, for appearing on behalf of indigent individuals, who the Oneida County Public Defender cannot represent due to a conflict of interest, at appearances at the Oneida County Centralized Arraignment Part Court (CAP Court). This amendment is necessary to authorize payment to outside attorneys by the Plan for CAP Court appearances which is not currently covered by the Plan previously authorized by the Oneida County Bar Association.

AMENDED

ONEIDA COUNTY SUPPLEMENTAL ASSIGNED COUNSEL PROGRAM

WHEREAS, the County of Oneida and the Oneida County Bar Association have worked in partnership to provide certain mandated legal services to indigent individuals in need of legal services in Oneida County; and,

WHEREAS, it has become necessary to make certain changes and amendments to the current Bar Association sponsored Plan;

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY:

RESOLVED, that the following Plan, for providing mandated legal services to indigent individuals is hereby adopted:

I. PREAMBLE

County Law Section 722 addresses the responsibility of local governments to provide legal services to indigent individuals who qualify for such services, County Law Section 722 sets forth in pertinent part:

"Plan for representation. The governing body of each county.... shall place in operation throughout the county a plan for providing counsel to persons charged with a crime or who are entitled to counsel pursuant to Section 262 or Section 1120 of the Family Court Act, Article 6-C of the Correction Law, Section 407 of the Surrogate's Court Procedure Act or Article 10 of the Mental Hygiene Law, who are financially unable to obtain coursel. Each plan shall also provide for investigative, expert and other services necessary for an adequate defense."

In response to this mandate Oneida County has adopted the Oncida County Supplemental Assigned Counsel Program in partnership with the Oneida County Bar Association which involves members of the Oneida County Bar Association agreeing to be a part of the Program. Assigned Counsel Panel membership is not automatic for each new member of the bar, but rather it is a distinction offered to certain aftorneys who meet a predetermined criteria. It is however much more than that, it is also an opportunity for all attorneys to assist people unable to afford legal representation, representation necessary to preserve individual rights that the Supreme Court of the United States and the United States Constitution say all are entitled. The Program however involves payments from the public funds, tax payer dollars specifically set aside for the purpose of providing mandated legal services to indigent individuals. An attorney's certification

to the panel and his or her conduct and performance as a Panel Member is consequently authorized and regulated, inter alia, by Article 18B of the County Law and by the Oneida County Plan as herein amended. Oversight of the Plan is unique in that it is a cooperative effort between State and local governments in partnership with the Oneida County Bar Association which is Oneida County Assigned Counsel Plan as amended, as well as, the Rules of the Appellate Division, Fourth Department and the Office of Court Administration.

Under the Oneida County Assigned Counsel Plan, except for the source of payment, the relationship existing between a member attorney in the Plan and his or her client is identical to that existing between any other attorney who has been retained or is acting pro bono, and their respective client. In representing their clients a Panel Member possesses all of the same duties, responsibilities and obligations as any retained or pro bono attorney and all branches of government, including the judicial branch, have a constitutional obligation to respect the attorney's professional independence in representation of his or her client.

II. PROGRAM OVERVIEW and ASSIGNMENT PROCESS

- A. The Oneida County Supplemental Assigned Counsel Program (hereinafter sometimes referred to as "OCSACP" or "the Plan") was created as a Bar Association Plan requiring all attorneys to follow procedures for assignments and vouchering as outlined in the Plan.
- B. The Plan is overseen by the Plan Administrator, who is a member in good standing of the Bar Association and is an attorney engaged by Oneida County to provide program coordination and management.
- C. Assignments are made by the Judge and provided by postal mail, email, courier or facsimile to the OCSACP office.
- D. When the Public Defender's office (Civil or Criminal) receives an application for representation or order from the court, the respective Public Defender's office review financial documentation, verified that the person meets the criteria to be declared indigent and determines if a conflict of interest exists.
- E. A conflict will most commonly occur when the Public Defender currently represents or in the past represented a co-defendant or party to that particular proceeding or in a past proceeding that would create a conflict or potential conflict of interest for the public defender.
- F. Once a conflict is verified, the Public Defender's office will notify the Court by letter and the Court will assign a private attorney from Assigned Counsel Panel, except in limited

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circumstances as authorized by statute. The Court then sends a copy of the order and conflict letter to the OCSACP office. While the Judges assignment is the formal authorization for the assigned attorney to begin representation of the qualifying individual, the assignment must be confirmed by the Plan before the attorney may be paid by the Plan.

- G. When orders are received, the OCSACP office will open a new file with a unique file number for that assignment.
- H. Orders are entered into a master database by the Plan and an email is generated to the attorney with the file number to be used for billing purposes.
- I. Assigned attorneys providing legal services to an indigent client are then authorized to be paid from public funds administered by the Plan.
- J. When a case is closed, the attorney shall submit the voucher into the electronic billing system to OCSACP for payment.
- K. Upon receipt and review of the voucher by the OCSACP office the voucher shall be submitted in the electronic billing system by OCSACP to the Judge for signature.
- L. When the Judge has signed, the voucher and related documentation it will be sent by the Judge to Oneida County's Audit & Control office for payment.

III. ATTORNEY ELIGIBILITY REQUIRMENTS and RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. To be eligible for appointment to the Assigned Counsel Panel designated pursuant to Article 18B of the County Law, an attorney shall be admitted to practice in the State of New York, be in good standing with the state and local bar associations, be current on CLE credits; and in the opinion of the assigning judge possess the requisite experience in civil and/or criminal practice, to make that attorney competent to give effective legal assistance to clients assigned under Article 18B of the County Law.
- B. In order to accept appellate assignments through the OCSACP, attorneys must also meet the qualifications and training requirements of the NYS Supreme Court, Appellate Division, 4th Department.
- C. Before agreeing to accept assignments, counsel must ensure that they have sufficient experience expertise, time, and resources to provide quality representation.

- D. Upon being assigned, counsel must make sure that no conflict of interest exists and promptly move to be relieved as counsel if they subsequently discover that a conflict does exist. In family law cases, where multiple parties may be involved, a conflict check must be done by the assigned attorney as to every party in that proceeding.
- E. Immediately upon assignment, counsel should contact the client. As soon as practical, counsel should do an initial assessment of the case, including whether a stay and bail pending appeal should be sought.
- F. In appellate court matters counsel must ascertain whether the appellate record is complete and, if not, obtain all missing documents as expeditiously as possible.
- G. To establish a relationship of trust and confidence, counsel must meet and discuss the case with the client as often as is reasonable and prudent under the circumstances of the case. If the client is incarcerated, the meeting should occur at the jail or prison, unless such a meeting would not be in the client's best interest. If the client is not incarcerated, a meeting may occur as counsel's office. If that is not feasible or if a visit at another site might yield more relevant information, counsel should make appropriate arrangements. Once a relationship has been established, counsel may communicate by phone, but should be mindful that such conversation with incarcerated clients typically are not secure. Further, counsel should consider the security of phone calls to clients who live with codefendants or co-respondents or anyone who might use the information about the client in a harmful way.
- H. In appellate court matters counsel must fully advise the client as to potential risks involved in pursuing the appeal and attempt to minimize such risks if the appeal progresses. In family law cases, counsel must advise clients about the impact of subsequent and collateral proceedings on the judgement being appealed. Counsel should caution clients that an order entered on consent is not appealable and modified any earlier order. In criminal matters counsel must advise clients of the extent of potential incarceration the client faces should they proceed to trial and get convicted.

IV. COMPENSATION and REIMBURSEMENT for REPRESENTATION

- A. All counsel assigned in accordance with this Plan of a bar association conforming to the requirements of §722 of the County Law whereby the services of private counsel are rotated and coordinated by an administrator shall at the conclusion of the representation receive:
 - a) for representation of a person entitled to representation by law who is initially charged with a misdemeanor or lesser offense and no felony, compensation for



such misdemeanor or lesser offense representation at a rate of SIXTY Dollars (\$50.00) per hour for time expended in court or before a magistrate judge or justice, and sixty dollars per hour for time reasonably expended out of court, and shall receive reimbursement for expenses reasonably incurred;

- b) for representation of a person entitled to representation by law who is initially charged with a felony, compensation for such felony representation at a rate of SEVENTY-FIVE Dollars (\$75.00) per hour for time expended in court before a magistrate, judge or justice and SEVENTY-FIVE Dollars (\$75.00) per hour for time reasonably expended out of court, and shall receive reimbursement for expenses reasonably incurred; and
- c) for representation of a person in all other cases governed by this article, including Family Court and all representation in an appellate court, compensation at a rate of SEVENTY-FIVE Dollars (\$75.00) per hour for time expended in court before a magistrate, judge or justice and seventy-five dollars per hour for time reasonably expended out of court, and shall receive relimbursement for expenses reasonably incurred.
- B. Except as provided in this section, the statutory cap for compensation for time expended in providing representation:
 - a) pursuant to paragraph a) of subdivision A of this section shall not exceed TWO THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED Dollars (\$2,400.00); and
 - b) pursuant to paragraph b) and c) of subdivision A of this section shall not exceed FOUR THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED Dollars (\$4,400.00).
- C. For representation on an appeal, compensation and reimbursement shall be fixed by the appellate court. For all other representation, compensation and reimbursement shall be fixed by the trial court judge. In extraordinary circumstances a trial or appellate court may provide for compensation in excess of the foregoing limits and for payment of compensation and reimbursement for expenses before the completion of the representation.
 - a) The OCSACP Administrator may request an affidavit or such other supplemental information as deemed necessary to verify the claim of extraordinary circumstances.
- D. Common reimbursements include the following:
 - a) Photocopies made in attorney's office are \$0.15 each, all others must include a receipt;
 - b) Mileage will be reimbursed at the current Federal rate at the time such expense was incurred, billing for travel time is allowed only for Appeals;
 - c) Transcript fees are \$2.50 per page for originals and \$1.00 per page for copies;
 - d) Postage, folls, parking, extraordinary copies, etc. must be accompanied by receipt for services;

- e) Simple witness fees;
- f) Subpoena service; and
- g) If translation services are required, Oneida County has contracted with several local translation services at reduced rates for use by the Assigned Counsel and other County programs.
- E. Services other than attorney fees, including expert witnesses, investigative or other necessary services which require an exparte application to the judge or magistrate designated to hear the case for authorization prior to procurement are limited to one thousand dollars per retainer.
- F. Any outside stenographic, investigative, interpretation or similar services that are substantial or out of the ordinary should be authorized in advance by the judge or magistrate designated to hear the case.
- O. Counsel shall not include charges for "Open File," "Close File" or "Wait Time" in their vouchers.

V. BILLINGS PROCEDURES

- A. The Oneida County Board of Legislators adopted Resolution 303 of 2013 which states, in pertinent part: "...all persons or corporations with claims for bills against the County of Oneida shall present same to the Oneida County Comptroller for audit no later than 90 days after said claims accrued." In the event the voucher is not submitted within said 90 days, counsel shall provide an affidavit outlining the circumstances which justify late payment, which late payment is also subject to judicial approval. Assigned Counsel attorneys must therefore endeavor to submit their bills promptly at the conclusion of the matter,
- B. Billing documentation required:
 - a) Accurate time record in tenths of an hour;
 - b) List of all disbursements, including receipts when appropriate;
 - c) Mileage charges (if appropriate), including start and end locations;
 - d) Accurate completion of the Judicial Conference (JCR) section of the billing record;
 - Afterney Affirmation of Services with attorney signature.
- C. Interim bills may be submitted once a year for ongoing matters such as treatment court or extensive or exceptional matters.

- D. Multiple assignments made by the same Judge may be submitted together if all matters have concluded, <u>BUT</u> if charges exceed the statutory cap, separation of assignments is preferred.
- E. Once bills are completed and signed by the Judge, the billing record is electronically forwarded to Audit & Control for payment.

Resolution adopted by the Queida County Bar Association June 6, 1966

WHENEAS, the Reard of Supervisors of the County of Queida adopted local law No. 4 of 1965, on October 13, 1965, creating the Office of Public Defender, and

WHEREAS, the Chaids County Ber Association desires to adopt an assigned counsel plan supplemental to the Public Defender Office of the County of Caelds purposent to Article 18-B of the County Isv in order to provide for the rotation and coordination of counsel who may be assigned by the Court to represent persons charged with a crime who are first of unable to obtain counsel, when there is an apparent or possible conflict of interest wherein the Public Defender may not be able to represent indigent defendants.

HOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,

1. That the Occide County Dur Association does hereby adopt an assigned counted plan to supplement the Public Defender Office of the County of Coulds, to be used by the Courts in cases where commet other than the Public Defender are assigned because of an apparent or possible conflict of interest between the defendant and the Public Defender as follows:

a. The Pregident of the Cheida County Bar Association, subject to the approval of the Pound of Directors, shall appoint an Administrator of the plan from its numbership. Such Administrator shall maintain a list of all qualified and practicing attorneys regident in or preacticing law in Oscida County who indicate that they are available to be assigned as counted index said plan:

The Administrator shall not be a Judgo, County Attorney, Assistant County Attorney, a Public Defender or a Legal Aid representative.

b. Upon request from a Court the Administrator shall submit for assignment by said Court the names of three or more attorneys.

from said list, the names to be submitted in rotation. He shall keep records of assignments made and shall maintain a supply of County vouchers. for use under said plane . Upon completion of an assignment, the assigned counsel shall submit his voucher to the Court and the Court shall fix the compensation and reimbursement to be paid applicated counsel in accordance with Article 18-B of the County lav. Then assigned counsel shall submit the voucher to the Administrator who shall forward it to the County Executive for payment,

- . c. The Administrator shall cooperate with the Court so that, in order to prevent any delay in arraignment, counsel may be assigned immediately upon a declaration of indigency. It is expected that assigned counsel will make subsequent investigation as to the financial officemetances of the defendant, except that such defendant shall not be asked any questions which might be self-incriminatory or irrelevant, such as inquiries into the accets of relatives or friends.
- d. The Administrator shall be compounded by the County of Omelia in such sum of shall be fixed by the Board of Supervisors. of the County of Oneids,
- e. The attorneys functioning under this plan shell be compensated and reimbursed by the County of Cheids as provided in Article 18-8 of the County Law.
- 2: This plan shall be effective forthwith subject to the approval of the Judicial Conference of the State of New York and upon adoption by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Oneida.
