Dear Mr. Talerico:

We are requesting the creation of a new Probation Assistant position to run our ROR Program (Released On Own Recognizance) and preparing Pre-Sentence reports. These functions were performed by two Probation Officers who are now working 50% of their time at the Utica Drug Court. Per a contract approved by the Board of Legislators we will be reimbursed for their time and for overtime expenses. This new position will be grant related but we are performing these functions with management staff. The County will still make a profit in this arrangement as the costs of this position is significantly less than the reimbursement we will be receiving.

At present, we have not received a signed contract, as it has become lost in the Court Bureaucracy. After repeated attempts to retrieve it we have been advised it will take several more weeks. We hope and need to fill this position right away. Consequently, we have obtained a promissory letter from the New York State Unified Court System stating their guarantee that it will be signed. We are attaching that letter, a copy of our Board's Resolution, the Contract, and Contract Summary for your consideration.

We are hopeful of getting this before the Board on September 11, 2013.



STATE OF NEW YORK MASTER CONTRACT FOR GRANTS

This State of New York Master Contract for Grants (Master Contract) is hereby made by and between the State of New York acting by and through the applicable State Agency (State) and the public or private entity (Contractor) identified on the face page hereof (Face Page).

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the State has the authority to regulate and provide funding for the establishment and operation of program services, design or the execution and performance of construction projects, as applicable and desires to contract with skilled parties possessing the necessary resources to provide such services or work, as applicable; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor is ready, willing and able to provide such program services or the execution and performance of construction projects and possesses or can make available all necessary qualified personnel, licenses, facilities and expertise to perform or have performed the services or work, as applicable, required pursuant to the terms of the Master Contract;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises, responsibilities, and covenants herein, the State and the Contractor agree as follows:

STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS

I. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- A. Executory Clause: In accordance with Section 41 of the State Finance Law, the State shall have no liability under the Master Contract to the Contractor, or to anyone else, beyond funds appropriated and available for the Master Contract.
- B. Required Approvals: In accordance with Section 112 of the State Finance Law (or, if the Master Contract is with the State University of New York (SUNY) or City University of New York (CUNY), Section 355 or Section 6218 of the Education Law), if the Master Contract exceeds \$50,000 (or \$85,000 for contracts let by the Office of General Services, or the minimum thresholds agreed to by the Office of the State Comptroller (OSC) for certain SUNY and CUNY contracts), or if this is an amendment for any amount to a contract which, as so amended, exceeds said statutory amount including, but not limited to, changes in amount, consideration, scope or contract term identified on the Face Page (Contract Term), it shall not be valid, effective or binding upon the State until it has been approved by, and filed with, the New York Attorney General Contract Approval Unit (AG) and OSC. If, by the Master Contract, the State agrees to give something other than money when the value or reasonably estimated value of such consideration exceeds \$10,000, it shall not be valid, effective or binding upon the State until it has been approved by, and filed with, the AG and OSC.

Budget Changes: An amendment that would result in a transfer of funds among program activities or budget cost categories that does not affect the amount, consideration, scope or other terms of such contract may be subject to the approval of the AG and OSC where the amount of such modification is, as a portion of the total value of the contract, equal to or greater than ten percent for contracts of less than five million dollars, or five percent for contracts of more than

five million dollars; and, in addition, such amendment may be subject to prior approval by the applicable State Agency as detailed in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule).

C. Order of Precedence:

In the event of a conflict among (i) the terms of the Master Contract (including any and all attachments and amendments) or (ii) between the terms of the Master Contract and the original request for proposal, the program application or other attachment that was completed and executed by the Contractor in connection with the Master Contract, the order of precedence is as follows:

- 1. Standard Terms and Conditions
- 2. Modifications to the Face Page
- 3. Modifications to Attachment A-2¹, Attachment B, Attachment C and Attachment D
- 4. The Face Page
- 5. Attachment A-2², Attachment B, Attachment C and Attachment D
- 6. Modification to Attachment A-1
- 7. Attachment A-1
- 8. Other attachments, including, but not limited to, the request for proposal or program application
- **D. Funding:** Funding for the term of the Master Contract shall not exceed the amount specified as "Contract Funding Amount" on the Face Page or as subsequently revised to reflect an approved renewal or cost amendment. Funding for the initial and subsequent periods of the Master Contract shall not exceed the applicable amounts specified in the applicable Attachment B form (Budget).
- E. Contract Performance: The Contractor shall perform all services or work, as applicable, and comply with all provisions of the Master Contract to the satisfaction of the State. The Contractor shall provide services or work, as applicable, and meet the program objectives summarized in Attachment C (Work Plan) in accordance with the provisions of the Master Contract, relevant laws, rules and regulations, administrative, program and fiscal guidelines, and where applicable, operating certificate for facilities or licenses for an activity or program.
- F. Modifications: To modify the Attachments or Face Page, the parties mutually agree to record, in writing, the terms of such modification and to revise or complete the Face Page and all the appropriate attachments in conjunction therewith. In addition, to the extent that such modification meets the criteria set forth in Section I.B herein, it shall be subject to the approval of the AG and

To the extent that the modifications to Attachment A-2 are required by federal requirements and conflict with other provisions of the Master Contract, the modifications to Attachment A-2 shall supersede all other provisions of this Master Contract. See Section I(V).

² To the extent that the terms of Attachment A-2 are required by federal requirements and conflict with other provisions of the Master Contract, the federal requirements of Attachment A-2 shall supersede all other provisions of this Master Contract. See Section I(V).

OSC before it shall become valid, effective and binding upon the State. Modifications that are not subject to the AG and OSC approval shall be processed in accordance with the guidelines stated in the Master Contract.

- G. Governing Law: The Master Contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of New York except where the Federal Supremacy Clause requires otherwise.
- H. Severability: Any provision of the Master Contract that is held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect by a court of competent jurisdiction, shall be ineffective only to the extent of such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability, without affecting in any way the remaining provisions hereof; provided, however, that the parties to the Master Contract shall attempt in good faith to reform the Master Contract in a manner consistent with the intent of any such ineffective provision for the purpose of carrying out such intent. If any provision is held void, invalid or unenforceable with respect to particular circumstances, it shall nevertheless remain in full force and effect in all other circumstances.
- I. Interpretation: The headings in the Master Contract are inserted for convenience and reference only and do not modify or restrict any of the provisions herein. All personal pronouns used herein shall be considered to be gender neutral. The Master Contract has been made under the laws of the State of New York, and the venue for resolving any disputes hereunder shall be in a court of competent jurisdiction of the State of New York.

J. Notice:

- 1. All notices, except for notices of termination, shall be in writing and shall be transmitted either:
 - a) by certified or registered United States mail, return receipt requested;
 - b) by facsimile transmission;
 - c) by personal delivery;
 - d) by expedited delivery service; or
 - e) by e-mail.
- 2. Notices to the State shall be addressed to the Program Office designated in Attachment A-1 (Program Specific Terms and Conditions).
- 3. Notices to the Contractor shall be addressed to the Contractor's designee as designated in Attachment A-1 (Program Specific Terms and Conditions).
- 4. Any such notice shall be deemed to have been given either at the time of personal delivery or, in the case of expedited delivery service or certified or registered United States mail, as of the date of first attempted delivery at the address and in the manner provided herein, or in the case of facsimile transmission or e-mail, upon receipt.
- 5. The parties may, from time to time, specify any new or different e-mail address, facsimile

number or address in the United States as their address for purpose of receiving notice under the Master Contract by giving fifteen (15) calendar days prior written notice to the other party sent in accordance herewith. The parties agree to mutually designate individuals as their respective representatives for the purposes of receiving notices under the Master Contract. Additional individuals may be designated in writing by the parties for purposes of implementation, administration, billing and resolving issues and/or disputes.

- K. Service of Process: In addition to the methods of service allowed by the State Civil Practice Law & Rules (CPLR), Contractor hereby consents to service of process upon it by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested. Service hereunder shall be complete upon Contractor's actual receipt of process or upon the State's receipt of the return thereof by the United States Postal Service as refused or undeliverable. Contractor must promptly notify the State, in writing, of each and every change of address to which service of process can be made. Service by the State to the last known address shall be sufficient. The Contractor shall have thirty (30) calendar days after service hereunder is complete in which to respond.
- L. Set-Off Rights: The State shall have all of its common law, equitable, and statutory rights of set-off. These rights shall include, but not be limited to, the State's option to withhold, for the purposes of set-off, any moneys due to the Contractor under the Master Contract up to any amounts due and owing to the State with regard to the Master Contract, any other contract with any State department or agency, including any contract for a term commencing prior to the term of the Master Contract, plus any amounts due and owing to the State for any other reason including, without limitation, tax delinquencies, fee delinquencies, or monetary penalties relative thereto. The State shall exercise its set-off rights in accordance with normal State practices including, in cases of set-off pursuant to an audit, the finalization of such audit by the State Agency, its representatives, or OSC.
- M. Indemnification: The Contractor shall be solely responsible and answerable in damages for any and all accidents and/or injuries to persons (including death) or property arising out of or related to the services to be rendered by the Contractor or its subcontractors pursuant to this Master Contract. The Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the State and its officers and employees from claims, suits, actions, damages and cost of every nature arising out of the provision of services pursuant to the Master Contract.
- N. Non-Assignment Clause: In accordance with Section 138 of the State Finance Law, the Master Contract may not be assigned by the Contractor or its right, title or interest therein assigned, transferred, conveyed, sublet, or otherwise disposed of without the State's previous written consent, and attempts to do so shall be considered to be null and void. Notwithstanding the foregoing, such prior written consent of an assignment of a contract, let pursuant to Article XI of the State Finance Law, may be waived at the discretion of the State Agency and with the concurrence of OSC, where the original contract was subject to OSC's approval, where the assignment is due to a reorganization, merger, or consolidation of the Contractor's business entity or enterprise. The State retains its right to approve an assignment and to require that the merged contractor demonstrate its responsibility to do business with the State. The Contractor may, however, assign its right to receive payments without the State's prior written consent unless the Master Contract concerns Certificates of Participation pursuant to Article 5-A of the State Finance Law.
- O. Legal Action: No litigation or regulatory action shall be brought against the State of New York, the State Agency, or against any county or other local government entity with funds provided under

the Master Contract. The term "litigation" shall include commencing or threatening to commence a lawsuit, joining or threatening to join as a party to ongoing litigation, or requesting any relief from any of the State of New York, the State Agency, or any county, or other local government entity. The term "regulatory action" shall include commencing or threatening to commence a regulatory proceeding, or requesting any regulatory relief from any of the State of New York, the State Agency, or any county, or other local government entity.

- P. No Arbitration: Disputes involving the Master Contract, including the breach or alleged breach thereof, may not be submitted to binding arbitration (except where statutorily authorized), but must, instead, be heard in a court of competent jurisdiction of the State of New York.
- Q. Secular Purpose: Services performed pursuant to the Master Contract are secular in nature and shall be performed in a manner that does not discriminate on the basis of religious belief, or promote or discourage adherence to religion in general or particular religious beliefs.
- R. Partisan Political Activity and Lobbying: Funds provided pursuant to the Master Contract shall not be used for any partisan political activity, or for activities that attempt to influence legislation or election or defeat of any candidate for public office.
- S. Reciprocity and Sanctions Provisions: The Contractor is hereby notified that if its principal place of business is located in a country, nation, province, state, or political subdivision that penalizes New York State vendors, and if the goods or services it offers shall be substantially produced or performed outside New York State, the Omnibus Procurement Act 1994 and 2000 amendments (Chapter 684 and Chapter 383, respectively) require that it be denied contracts which it would otherwise obtain.³
- T. Reporting Fraud and Abuse: Contractor acknowledges that it has reviewed information on how to prevent, detect, and report fraud, waste and abuse of public funds, including information about the Federal False Claims Act, the New York State False Claims Act, and whistleblower protections.
- U. Non-Collusive Bidding: By submission of this bid, the Contractor and each person signing on behalf of the Contractor certifies, and in the case of a joint bid each party thereto certifies as to its own organization, under penalty of perjury, that to the best of his or her knowledge and belief that its bid was arrived at independently and without collusion aimed at restricting competition. The Contractor further affirms that, at the time the Contractor submitted its bid, an authorized and responsible person executed and delivered to the State a non-collusive binding certification on the Contractor's behalf.
- V. Federally Funded Grants: All of the Specific federal requirements that are applicable to the Master Contract are identified in Attachment A-2 (Federally Funded Grants) hereto. To the extent that the Master Contract is funded in whole or part with federal funds, (i) the provisions of the Master Contract that conflict with federal rules, federal regulations, or federal program specific requirements shall not apply and (ii) the Contractor agrees to comply with all applicable federal

rules, regulations and program specific requirements including, but not limited to, those provisions that are set forth in Attachment A-2 (Federally Funded Grants) hereto.

II. TERM, TERMINATION AND SUSPENSION

A. Term: The term of the Master Contract shall be as specified on the Face Page, unless terminated sooner as provided herein.

B. Renewal:

1. General Renewal: The Master Contract may consist of successive periods on the same terms and conditions, as specified within the Master Contract (a "Simplified Renewal Contract"). Each additional or superseding period shall be on the forms specified by the State and shall be incorporated in the Master Contract.

2. Renewal Notice to Not-for-Profit Contractors:

- a) Pursuant to State Finance Law §179-t, if the Master Contract is with a not-for-profit Contractor and provides for a renewal option, the State shall notify the Contractor of the State's intent to renew or not to renew the Master Contract no later than ninety (90) calendar days prior to the end of the term of the Master Contract, unless funding for the renewal is contingent upon enactment of an appropriation. If funding for the renewal is contingent upon enactment of an appropriation, the State shall notify the Contractor of the State's intent to renew or not to renew the Master Contract the later of: (1) ninety (90) calendar days prior to the end of the term of the Master Contract, and (2) thirty (30) calendar days after the necessary appropriation becomes law. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the event that the State is unable to comply with the time frames set forth in this paragraph due to unusual circumstances beyond the control of the State ("Unusual Circumstances"), no payment of interest shall be due to the not-for-profit Contractor. For purposes of State Finance Law §179-t, "Unusual Circumstances" shall not mean the failure by the State to (i) plan for implementation of a program, (ii) assign sufficient staff resources to implement a program, (iii) establish a schedule for the implementation of a program or (iv) anticipate any other reasonably foreseeable circumstance.
- b) Notification to the not-for-profit Contractor of the State's intent to not renew the Master Contract must be in writing in the form of a letter, with the reason(s) for the non-renewal included. If the State does not provide notice to the not-for-profit Contractor of its intent not to renew the Master Contract as required in this Section and State Finance Law §179-t, the Master Contract shall be deemed continued until the date the State provides the necessary notice to the Contractor, in accordance with State Finance Law §179-t. Expenses incurred by the not-for-profit Contractor during such extension shall be reimbursable under the terms of the Master Contract.

C. Termination:

1. Grounds:

- a) <u>Mutual Consent</u>: The Master Contract may be terminated at any time upon mutual written consent of the State and the Contractor.
- b) <u>Cause</u>: The State may terminate the Master Contract immediately, upon written notice of termination to the Contractor, if the Contractor fails to comply with any of the terms and conditions of the Master Contract and/or with any laws, rules, regulations, policies, or procedures that are applicable to the Master Contract.
- c) <u>Non-Responsibility</u>: In accordance with the provisions of Sections IV(N)(6) and (7) herein, the State may make a final determination that the Contractor is non-responsible (Determination of Non-Responsibility). In such event, the State may terminate the Master Contract at the Contractor's expense, complete the contractual requirements in any manner the State deems advisable and pursue available legal or equitable remedies for breach.
- d) <u>Convenience</u>: The State may terminate the Master Contract in its sole discretion upon thirty (30) calendar days prior written notice.
- e) <u>Lack of Funds</u>: If for any reason the State or the Federal government terminates or reduces its appropriation to the applicable State Agency entering into the Master Contract or fails to pay the full amount of the allocation for the operation of one or more programs funded under this Master Contract, the Master Contract may be terminated or reduced at the State Agency's discretion, provided that no such reduction or termination shall apply to allowable costs already incurred by the Contractor where funds are available to the State Agency for payment of such costs. Upon termination or reduction of the Master Contract, all remaining funds paid to the Contractor that are not subject to allowable costs already incurred by the Contractor shall be returned to the State Agency. In any event, no liability shall be incurred by the State (including the State Agency) beyond monies available for the purposes of the Master Contract. The Contractor acknowledges that any funds due to the State Agency or the State of New York because of disallowed expenditures after audit shall be the Contractor's responsibility.
- f) Force Majeure: The State may terminate or suspend its performance under the Master Contract immediately upon the occurrence of a "force majeure." For purposes of the Master Contract, "Force majeure" shall include, but not be limited to, natural disasters, war, rebellion, insurrection, riot, strikes, lockout and any unforeseen circumstances and acts beyond the control of the State which render the performance of its obligations impossible.

2. Notice of Termination:

- a) Service of notice: Written notice of termination shall be sent by:
 - (i) personal messenger service; or

- (ii) certified mail, return receipt requested and first class mail.
- b) <u>Effective date of termination</u>: The effective date of the termination shall be the later of (i) the date indicated in the notice and (ii) the date the notice is received by the Contractor, and shall be established as follows:
 - (i) if the notice is delivered by hand, the date of receipt shall be established by the receipt given to the Contractor or by affidavit of the individual making such hand delivery attesting to the date of delivery; or
 - (ii) if the notice is delivered by registered or certified mail, by the receipt returned from the United States Postal Service, or if no receipt is returned, five (5) business days from the date of mailing of the first class letter, postage prepaid, in a depository under the care and control of the United States Postal Service.

3. Effect of Notice and Termination on State's Payment Obligations:

- a) Upon receipt of notice of termination, the Contractor agrees to cancel, prior to the effective date of any prospective termination, as many outstanding obligations as possible, and agrees not to incur any new obligations after receipt of the notice without approval by the State.
- b) The State shall be responsible for payment on claims for services or work provided and costs incurred pursuant to the terms of the Master Contract. In no event shall the State be liable for expenses and obligations arising from the requirements of the Master Contract after its termination date.

4. Effect of Termination Based on Misuse or Conversion of State or Federal Property:

Where the Master Contract is terminated for cause based on Contractor's failure to use some or all of the real property or equipment purchased pursuant to the Master Contract for the purposes set forth herein, the State may, at its option, require:

- a) the repayment to the State of any monies previously paid to the Contractor; or
- b) the return of any real property or equipment purchased under the terms of the Master Contract; or
- c) an appropriate combination of clauses (a) and (b) of Section II(C)(4) herein.

Nothing herein shall be intended to limit the State's ability to pursue such other legal or equitable remedies as may be available.

D. Suspension: The State may, in its discretion, order the Contractor to suspend performance for a reasonable period of time. In the event of such suspension, the Contractor shall be given a formal written notice outlining the particulars of such suspension. Upon issuance of such notice, the Contractor shall comply with the particulars of the notice. The State shall have no obligation to reimburse Contractor's expenses during such suspension period. Activities may resume at such time

as the State issues a formal written notice authorizing a resumption of performance under the Master Contract.

III. PAYMENT AND REPORTING

A. Terms and Conditions:

- 1. In full consideration of contract services to be performed, the State Agency agrees to pay and the Contractor agrees to accept a sum not to exceed the amount noted on the Face Page.
- 2. The State has no obligation to make payment until all required approvals, including the approval of the AG and OSC, if required, have been obtained. Contractor obligations or expenditures that precede the start date of the Master Contract shall not be reimbursed.
- 3. Contractor must provide complete and accurate billing invoices to the State in order to receive payment. Provided, however, the State may, at its discretion, automatically generate a voucher in accordance with an approved contract payment schedule. Billing invoices submitted to the State must contain all information and supporting documentation required by Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule) and Section III(C) herein. The State may require the Contractor to submit billing invoices electronically.
- 4. Payment for invoices submitted by the Contractor shall only be rendered electronically unless payment by paper check is expressly authorized by the head of the State Agency, in the sole discretion of the head of such State Agency, due to extenuating circumstances. Such electronic payment shall be made in accordance with OSC's procedures and practices to authorize electronic payments.
- 5. If travel expenses are an approved expenditure under the Master Contract, travel expenses shall be reimbursed at the lesser of the rates set forth in the written standard travel policy of the Contractor, the OSC guidelines, or United States General Services Administration rates. No out-of-state travel costs shall be permitted unless specifically detailed and pre-approved by the State.
- 6. Timeliness of advance payments or other claims for reimbursement, and any interest to be paid to Contractor for late payment, shall be governed by Article 11-A of the State Finance Law to the extent required by law.
- 7. Article 11-B of the State Finance Law sets forth certain time frames for the Full Execution of contracts or renewal contracts with not-for-profit organizations and the implementation of any program plan associated with such contract. For purposes of this section, "Full Execution" shall mean that the contract has been signed by all parties thereto and has obtained the approval of the AG and OSC. Any interest to be paid on a missed payment to the Contractor based on a delay in the Full Execution of the Master Contract shall be governed by Article 11-B of the State Finance Law.

B. Advance Payment and Recoupment:

- 1. Advance payments, which the State in its sole discretion may make to not-for-profit grant recipients, shall be made and recouped in accordance with State Finance Law Section 179(u), this Section and the provisions of Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule).
- 2. Advance payments made by the State to not-for-profit grant recipients shall be due no later than thirty (30) calendar days, excluding legal holidays, after the first day of the Contract Term or, if renewed, in the period identified on the Face Page.
- 3. For subsequent contract years in multi-year contracts, Contractor will be notified of the scheduled advance payments for the upcoming contract year no later than 90 days prior to the commencement of the contract year. For simplified renewals, the payment schedule (Attachment D) will be modified as part of the renewal process.
- 4. Recoupment of any advance payment(s) shall be recovered by crediting the percentage of subsequent claims listed in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule) and Section III(C) herein and such claims shall be reduced until the advance is fully recovered within the Contract Term. Any unexpended advance balance at the end of the Contract Term shall be refunded by the Contractor to the State.
- 5. If for any reason the amount of any claim is not sufficient to cover the proportionate advance amount to be recovered, then subsequent claims may be reduced until the advance is fully recovered.

C. Claims for Reimbursement:

1. The Contractor shall submit claims for the reimbursement of expenses incurred on behalf of the State under the Master Contract in accordance with this Section and the applicable claiming schedule in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule).

Vouchers submitted for payment shall be deemed to be a certification that the payments requested are for project expenditures made in accordance with the items as contained in the applicable Attachment B form (Budget) and during the Contract Term. When submitting a voucher, such voucher shall also be deemed to certify that: (i) the payments requested do not duplicate reimbursement from other sources of funding; and (ii) the funds provided herein do not replace funds that, in the absence of this grant, would have been made available by the Contractor for this program. Requirement (ii) does not apply to grants funded pursuant to a Community Projects Fund appropriation.

- 2. Consistent with the selected reimbursement claiming schedule in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule), the Contractor shall comply with the appropriate following provisions:
 - a) <u>Quarterly Reimbursement:</u> The Contractor shall be entitled to receive payments for work, projects, and services rendered as detailed and described in Attachment C (Work Plan).

The Contractor shall submit to the State Agency quarterly voucher claims and supporting documentation. The Contractor shall submit vouchers to the State Agency in accordance with the procedures set forth in Section III(A)(3) herein.

b) <u>Monthly Reimbursement:</u> The Contractor shall be entitled to receive payments for work, projects, and services rendered as detailed and described in Attachment C (Work Plan).

The Contractor shall submit to the State Agency monthly voucher claims and supporting documentation. The Contractor shall submit vouchers to the State Agency in accordance with the procedures set forth in Section III(A)(3) herein.

c) <u>Biannual Reimbursement:</u> The Contractor shall be entitled to receive payments for work, projects, and services rendered as detailed and described in Attachment C (Work Plan).

The Contractor shall submit to the State Agency biannually voucher claims and supporting documentation. The Contractor shall submit vouchers to the State Agency in accordance with the procedures set forth in Section III(A)(3) herein.

d) <u>Milestone/Performance Reimbursement:</u>⁴ Requests for payment based upon an event or milestone may be either severable or cumulative. A severable event/milestone is independent of accomplishment of any other event. If the event is cumulative, the successful completion of an event or milestone is dependent on the previous completion of another event.

Milestone payments shall be made to the Contractor when requested in a form approved by the State, and at frequencies and in amounts stated in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule). The State Agency shall make milestone payments subject to the Contractor's satisfactory performance.

- e) <u>Fee for Service Reimbursement:</u> Payment shall be limited to only those fees specifically agreed upon in the Master Contract and shall be payable no more frequently than monthly upon submission of a voucher by the contractor.
- f) <u>Rate Based Reimbursement:</u>⁶ Payment shall be limited to rate(s) established in the Master Contract. Payment may be requested no more frequently than monthly.
- g) <u>Scheduled Reimbursement:</u> The State Agency shall generate vouchers at the frequencies and amounts as set forth in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule),

⁴ A milestone/ performance payment schedule identifies mutually agreed-to payment amounts based on meeting contract events or milestones. Events or milestones must represent integral and meaningful aspects of contract performance and should signify true progress in completing the Master Contract effort.

Fee for Service is a rate established by the Contractor for a service or services rendered.

⁶ Rate based agreements are those agreements in which payment is premised upon a specific established rate per unit.

⁷ Scheduled Reimbursement agreements provide for payments that occur at defined and regular intervals that provide for a specified dollar amount to be paid to the Contractor at the beginning of each payment period (i.e. quarterly, monthly or bi-annually). While these payments are related to the particular services and outcomes defined in the Master Contract, they are not dependent upon particular services or expenses in any one payment period and provide the Contractor with a defined and regular payment over the life of the contract.

and service reports shall be used to determine funding levels appropriate to the next annual contract period.

- h) <u>Fifth Quarter Payments:</u> Fifth quarter payment shall be paid to the Contractor at the conclusion of the final scheduled payment period of the preceding contract period. The State Agency shall use a written directive for fifth quarter financing. The State Agency shall generate a voucher in the fourth quarter of the current contract year to pay the scheduled payment for the next contract year.
- 3. The Contractor shall also submit supporting fiscal documentation for the expenses claimed.
- 4. The State reserves the right to withhold up to fifteen percent (15%) of the total amount of the Master Contract as security for the faithful completion of services or work, as applicable, under the Master Contract. This amount may be withheld in whole or in part from any single payment or combination of payments otherwise due under the Master Contract. In the event that such withheld funds are insufficient to satisfy Contractor's obligations to the State, the State may pursue all available remedies, including the right of setoff and recoupment.
- 5. The State shall not be liable for payments on the Master Contract if it is made pursuant to a Community Projects Fund appropriation if insufficient monies are available pursuant to Section 99-d of the State Finance Law.
- 6. All vouchers submitted by the Contractor pursuant to the Master Contract shall be submitted to the State Agency no later than thirty (30) calendar days after the end date of the period for which reimbursement is claimed. In no event shall the amount received by the Contractor exceed the budget amount approved by the State Agency, and, if actual expenditures by the Contractor are less than such sum, the amount payable by the State Agency to the Contractor shall not exceed the amount of actual expenditures.
- 7. All obligations must be incurred prior to the end date of the contract. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section III(C)(6) above, with respect to the final period for which reimbursement is claimed, so long as the obligations were incurred prior to the end date of the contract, the Contractor shall have up to ninety (90) calendar days after the contract end date to make expenditures; provided, however, that if the Master Contract is funded in whole or in part with federal funds, the Contractor shall have up to sixty (60) calendar days after the contract end date to make expenditures.

D. Identifying Information and Privacy Notification:

1. Every voucher or New York State Claim for Payment submitted to a State Agency by the Contractor, for payment for the sale of goods or services or for transactions (e.g., leases, easements, licenses, etc.) related to real or personal property, must include the Contractor's Vendor Identification Number assigned by the Statewide Financial System, and any or all of the following identification numbers: (i) the Contractor's Federal employer identification number, (ii) the Contractor's Federal social security number, and/or (iii) DUNS number. Failure to

⁸ Fifth Quarter Payments occurs where there are scheduled payments and where there is an expectation that services will be continued through renewals or subsequent contracts. Fifth Quarter Payments allow for the continuation of scheduled payments to a Contractor for the first payment period quarter of an anticipated renewal or new contract.

include such identification number or numbers may delay payment by the State to the Contractor. Where the Contractor does not have such number or numbers, the Contractor, on its voucher or Claim for Payment, must provide the reason or reasons for why the Contractor does not have such number or numbers.

2. The authority to request the above personal information from a seller of goods or services or a lessor of real or personal property, and the authority to maintain such information, is found in Section 5 of the State Tax Law. Disclosure of this information by the seller or lessor to the State is mandatory. The principle purpose for which the information is collected is to enable the State to identify individuals, businesses and others who have been delinquent in filing tax returns or may have understated their tax liabilities and to generally identify persons affected by the taxes administered by the Commissioner of Taxation and Finance. The information will be used for tax administration purposes and for any other purpose authorized by law. The personal information is requested by the purchasing unit of the State Agency contracting to purchase the goods or services or lease the real or personal property covered by the Master Contract. This information is maintained in the Statewide Financial System by the Vendor Management Unit within the Bureau of State Expenditures, Office of the State Comptroller, 110 State Street, Albany, New York, 12236.

E. Refunds:

- 1. In the event that the Contractor must make a refund to the State for Master Contract-related activities, including repayment of an advance or an audit disallowance, payment must be made payable as set forth in Attachment A-1 (Program Specific Terms and Conditions). The Contractor must reference the contract number with its payment and include a brief explanation of why the refund is being made. Refund payments must be submitted to the Designated Refund Office at the address specified in Attachment A-1 (Program Specific Terms and Conditions).
- 2. If at the end or termination of the Master Contract, there remains any unexpended balance of the monies advanced under the Master Contract in the possession of the Contractor, the Contractor shall make payment within forty-five (45) calendar days of the end or termination of the Master Contract. In the event that the Contractor fails to refund such balance the State may pursue all available remedies.
- F. Outstanding Amounts Owed to the State: Prior period overpayments (including, but not limited to, contract advances in excess of actual expenditures) and/or audit recoveries associated with the Contractor may be recouped against future payments made under this Master Contract to Contractor. The recoupment generally begins with the first payment made to the Contractor following identification of the overpayment and/or audit recovery amount. In the event that there are no payments to apply recoveries against, the Contractor shall make payment as provided in Section III(E) (Refunds) herein.

G. Program and Fiscal Reporting Requirements:

1. The Contractor shall submit required periodic reports in accordance with the applicable schedule provided in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule). All required reports or other work products developed pursuant to the Master Contract must be completed as provided by the agreed upon work schedule in a manner satisfactory and acceptable to the State Agency in order for the Contractor to be eligible for payment.

- 2. Consistent with the selected reporting options in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule), the Contractor shall comply with the following applicable provisions:
 - a) If the Expenditure Based Reports option is indicated in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule), the Contractor shall provide the State Agency with one or more of the following reports as required by the following provisions and Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule) as applicable:
 - (i) Narrative/Qualitative Report: The Contractor shall submit, on a quarterly basis, not later than the time period listed in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule), a report, in narrative form, summarizing the services rendered during the quarter. This report shall detail how the Contractor has progressed toward attaining the qualitative goals enumerated in Attachment C (Work Plan). This report should address all goals and objectives of the project and include a discussion of problems encountered and steps taken to solve them.
 - (ii) Statistical/Quantitative Report: The Contractor shall submit, on a quarterly basis, not later than the time period listed in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule), a detailed report analyzing the quantitative aspects of the program plan, as appropriate (e.g., number of meals served, clients transported, patient/client encounters, procedures performed, training sessions conducted, etc.)
 - (iii) Expenditure Report: The Contractor shall submit, on a quarterly basis, not later than the time period listed in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule), a detailed expenditure report, by object of expense. This report shall accompany the voucher submitted for such period.
 - (iv) Final Report: The Contractor shall submit a final report as required by the Master Contract, not later than the time period listed in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule) which reports on all aspects of the program and detailing how the use of funds were utilized in achieving the goals set forth in Attachment C (Work Plan).
 - (v) Consolidated Fiscal Report (CFR): The Contractor shall submit a CFR, which includes a year-end cost report and final claim not later than the time period listed in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule).
 - b) If the Performance-Based Reports option is indicated in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule), the Contractor shall provide the State Agency with the following reports as required by the following provisions and Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule) as applicable:
 - (i) Progress Report: The Contractor shall provide the State Agency with a written progress report using the forms and formats as provided by the State Agency, summarizing the work performed during the period. These reports shall detail the Contractor's progress toward attaining the specific goals enumerated in Attachment C (Work Plan). Progress reports shall be submitted in a format prescribed in the Master Contract.

- (ii) Final Progress Report: Final scheduled payment is due during the time period set forth in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule). The deadline for submission of the final report shall be the date set forth in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule). The State Agency shall complete its audit and notify the Contractor of the results no later than the date set forth in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule). Payment shall be adjusted by the State Agency to reflect only those services/expenditures that were made in accordance with the Master Contract. The Contractor shall submit a detailed comprehensive final progress report not later than the date set forth in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule), summarizing the work performed during the entire Contract Term (i.e., a cumulative report), in the forms and formats required.
- 3. In addition to the periodic reports stated above, the Contractor may be required (a) to submit such other reports as are required in Table 1 of Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule), and (b) prior to receipt of final payment under the Master Contract, to submit one or more final reports in accordance with the form, content, and schedule stated in Table 1 of Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule).

H. Notification of Significant Occurrences:

- 1. If any specific event or conjunction of circumstances threatens the successful completion of this project, in whole or in part, including where relevant, timely completion of milestones or other program requirements, the Contractor agrees to submit to the State Agency within three (3) calendar days of becoming aware of the occurrence or of such problem, a written description thereof together with a recommended solution thereto.
- 2. The Contractor shall immediately notify in writing the program manager assigned to the Master Contract of any unusual incident, occurrence, or event that involves the staff, volunteers, directors or officers of the Contractor, any subcontractor or program participant funded through the Master Contract, including but not limited to the following: death or serious injury; an arrest or possible criminal activity that could impact the successful completion of this project; any destruction of property; significant damage to the physical plant of the Contractor; or other matters of a similarly serious nature.

IV. ADDITIONAL CONTRACTOR OBLIGATIONS, REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES

A. Contractor as an Independent Contractor/Employees:

- 1. The State and the Contractor agree that the Contractor is an independent contractor, and not an employee of the State and may neither hold itself out nor claim to be an officer, employee, or subdivision of the State nor make any claim, demand, or application to or for any right based upon any different status. The Contractor shall be solely responsible for the recruitment, hiring, provision of employment benefits, payment of salaries and management of its project personnel. These functions shall be carried out in accordance with the provisions of the Master Contract, and all applicable Federal and State laws and regulations.
- 2. The Contractor warrants that it, its staff, and any and all subcontractors have all the necessary licenses, approvals, and certifications currently required by the laws of any applicable local, state, or Federal government to perform the services or work, as applicable, pursuant to the

Master Contract and/or any subcontract entered into under the Master Contract. The Contractor further agrees that such required licenses, approvals, and certificates shall be kept in full force and effect during the term of the Master Contract, or any extension thereof, and to secure any new licenses, approvals, or certificates within the required time frames and/or to require its staff and subcontractors to obtain the requisite licenses, approvals, or certificates. In the event the Contractor, its staff, and/or subcontractors are notified of a denial or revocation of any license, approval, or certification to perform the services or work, as applicable, under the Master Contract, Contractor shall immediately notify the State.

B. Subcontractors:

- 1. If the Contractor enters into subcontracts for the performance of work pursuant to the Master Contract, the Contractor shall take full responsibility for the acts and omissions of its subcontractors. Nothing in the subcontract shall impair the rights of the State under the Master Contract. No contractual relationship shall be deemed to exist between the subcontractor and the State.
- 2. The Contractor agrees not to enter into any subcontracts, or revisions to subcontracts, that are in excess of \$100,000 for the performance of the obligations contained herein until it has received the prior written permission of the State, which shall have the right to review and approve each and every subcontract in excess of \$100,000 prior to giving written permission to the Contractor to enter into the subcontract. All agreements between the Contractor and subcontractors shall be by written contract, signed by individuals authorized to bind the parties. All such subcontracts shall contain provisions for specifying (1) that the work performed by the subcontractor must be in accordance with the terms of the Master Contract, (2) that nothing contained in the subcontract shall impair the rights of the State under the Master Contract, and (3) that nothing contained in the subcontract, nor under the Master Contract, shall be deemed to create any contractual relationship between the subcontractor and the State. In addition, subcontracts shall contain any other provisions which are required to be included in subcontracts pursuant to the terms herein.
- 3. Prior to executing a subcontract, the Contractor agrees to require the subcontractor to provide to the State the information the State needs to determine whether a proposed subcontractor is a responsible vendor.
- 4. When a subcontract equals or exceeds \$100,000, the subcontractor must submit a Vendor Responsibility Questionnaire (Questionnaire).
- 5. When a subcontract is executed, the Contractor must provide detailed subcontract information (a copy of subcontract will suffice) to the State within fifteen (15) calendar days after execution. The State may request from the Contractor copies of subcontracts between a subcontractor and its subcontractor.
- 6. The Contractor shall require any and all subcontractors to submit to the Contractor all financial claims for Services or work to the State agency, as applicable, rendered and required supporting documentation and reports as necessary to permit Contractor to meet claim deadlines and documentation requirements as established in Attachment D (Payment and Reporting Schedule) and Section III. Subcontractors shall be paid by the Contractor on a timely basis after submitting the required reports and vouchers for reimbursement of services or work, as

applicable. Subcontractors shall be informed by the Contractor of the possibility of non-payment or rejection by the Contractor of claims that do not contain the required information, and/or are not received by the Contractor by said due date.

C. Use Of Material, Equipment, Or Personnel:

- 1. The Contractor shall not use materials, equipment, or personnel paid for under the Master Contract for any activity other than those provided for under the Master Contract, except with the State's prior written permission.
- 2. Any interest accrued on funds paid to the Contractor by the State shall be deemed to be the property of the State and shall either be credited to the State at the close-out of the Master Contract or, upon the written permission of the State, shall be expended on additional services or work, as applicable, provided for under the Master Contract.

D. Property:

- 1. Property is real property, equipment, or tangible personal property having a useful life of more than one year and an acquisition cost of \$1,000 or more per unit.
 - a) If an item of Property required by the Contractor is available as surplus to the State, the State at its sole discretion, may arrange to provide such Property to the Contractor in lieu of the purchase of such Property.
 - b) If the State consents in writing, the Contractor may retain possession of Property owned by the State, as provided herein, after the termination of the Master Contract to use for similar purposes. Otherwise, the Contractor shall return such Property to the State at the Contractor's cost and expense upon the expiration of the Master Contract.
 - c) In addition, the Contractor agrees to permit the State to inspect the Property and to monitor its use at reasonable intervals during the Contractor's regular business hours.
 - d) The Contractor shall be responsible for maintaining and repairing Property purchased or procured under the Master Contract at its own cost and expense. The Contractor shall procure and maintain insurance at its own cost and expense in an amount satisfactory to the State Agency, naming the State Agency as an additional insured, covering the loss, theft or destruction of such equipment.
 - e) A rental charge to the Master Contract for a piece of Property owned by the Contractor shall not be allowed.
 - f) The State has the right to review and approve in writing any new contract for the purchase of or lease for rental of Property (Purchase/Lease Contract) operated in connection with the provision of the services or work, as applicable, as specified in the Master Contract, if applicable, and any modifications, amendments, or extensions of an existing lease or purchase prior to its execution. If, in its discretion, the State disapproves of any Purchase/Lease Contract, then the State shall not be obligated to make any payments for such Property.

- g) No member, officer, director or employee of the Contractor shall retain or acquire any interest, direct or indirect, in any Property, paid for with funds under the Master Contract, nor retain any interest, direct or indirect, in such, without full and complete prior disclosure of such interest and the date of acquisition thereof, in writing to the Contractor and the State.
- 2. For non-Federally-funded contracts, unless otherwise provided herein, the State shall have the following rights to Property purchased with funds provided under the Master Contract:
 - a) For cost-reimbursable contracts, all right, title and interest in such Property shall belong to the State.
 - b) For performance-based contracts, all right, title and interest in such Property shall belong to the Contractor.
- 3. For Federally funded contracts, title to Property whose requisition cost is borne in whole or in part by monies provided under the Master Contract shall be governed by the terms and conditions of Attachment A-2 (Federally Funded Grants).
- 4. Upon written direction by the State, the Contractor shall maintain an inventory of all Property that is owned by the State as provided herein.
- 5. The Contractor shall execute any documents which the State may reasonably require to effectuate the provisions of this section.

E. Records and Audits:

1. General:

- a) The Contractor shall establish and maintain, in paper or electronic format, complete and accurate books, records, documents, receipts, accounts, and other evidence directly pertinent to its performance under the Master Contract (collectively, Records).
- b) The Contractor agrees to produce and retain for the balance of the term of the Master Contract, and for a period of six years from the later of the date of (i) the Master Contract and (ii) the most recent renewal of the Master Contract, any and all Records necessary to substantiate upon audit, the proper deposit and expenditure of funds received under the Master Contract. Such Records may include, but not be limited to, original books of entry (e.g., cash disbursements and cash receipts journal), and the following specific records (as applicable) to substantiate the types of expenditures noted:
 - (i) personal service expenditures: cancelled checks and the related bank statements, time and attendance records, payroll journals, cash and check disbursement records including copies of money orders and the like, vouchers and invoices, records of contract labor, any and all records listing payroll and the money value of non-cash advantages provided to employees, time cards, work schedules and logs, employee personal history folders, detailed and general ledgers, sales records, miscellaneous reports and returns (tax and otherwise), and cost allocation plans, if applicable.

- (ii) payroll taxes and fringe benefits: cancelled checks, copies of related bank statements, cash and check disbursement records including copies of money orders and the like, invoices for fringe benefit expenses, miscellaneous reports and returns (tax and otherwise), and cost allocation plans, if applicable.
- (iii) non-personal services expenditures: original invoices/receipts, cancelled checks and related bank statements, consultant agreements, leases, and cost allocation plans, if applicable.
- (iv) receipt and deposit of advance and reimbursements: itemized bank stamped deposit slips, and a copy of the related bank statements.
- c) The OSC, AG and any other person or entity authorized to conduct an examination, as well as the State Agency or State Agencies involved in the Master Contract that provided funding, shall have access to the Records during the hours of 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday (excluding State recognized holidays), at an office of the Contractor within the State of New York or, if no such office is available, at a mutually agreeable and reasonable venue within the State, for the term specified above for the purposes of inspection, auditing and copying.
- d) The State shall protect from public disclosure any of the Records which are exempt from disclosure under Section 87 of the Public Officers Law provided that: (i) the Contractor shall timely inform an appropriate State official, in writing, that said records should not be disclosed; and (ii) said records shall be sufficiently identified; and (iii) designation of said records, as exempt under Section 87 of the Public Officers Law, is reasonable.
- e) Nothing contained herein shall diminish, or in any way adversely affect, the State's rights in connection with its audit and investigatory authority or the State's rights in connection with discovery in any pending or future litigation.

2. Cost Allocation:

- a) For non-performance based contracts, the proper allocation of the Contractor's costs must be made according to a cost allocation plan that meets the requirements of OMB Circulars A-87, A-122, and/or A-21. Methods used to determine and assign costs shall conform to generally accepted accounting practices and shall be consistent with the method(s) used by the Contractor to determine costs for other operations or programs. Such accounting standards and practices shall be subject to approval of the State.
- b) For performance based milestone contracts, or for the portion of the contract amount paid on a performance basis, the Contractor shall maintain documentation demonstrating that milestones were attained.
- 3. Federal Funds: For records and audit provisions governing Federal funds, please see Attachment A-2 (Federally Funded Grants).
- F. Confidentiality: The Contractor agrees that it shall use and maintain information relating to individuals who may receive services, and their families pursuant to the Master Contract, or any other information, data or records deemed confidential by the State (Confidential Information) only

for the limited purposes of the Master Contract and in conformity with applicable provisions of State and Federal law. The Contractor (i) has an affirmative obligation to safeguard any such Confidential Information from unnecessary or unauthorized disclosure and (ii) must comply with the provisions of the New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act (General Business Law Section 899-aa; State Technology Law Section 208).

G. Publicity:

- 1. Publicity includes, but is not limited to: news conferences; news releases; public announcements; advertising; brochures; reports; discussions or presentations at conferences or meetings; and/or the inclusion of State materials, the State's name or other such references to the State in any document or forum. Publicity regarding this project may not be released without prior written approval from the State.
- 2. Any publications, presentations or announcements of conferences, meetings or trainings which are funded in whole or in part through any activity supported under the Master Contract may not be published, presented or announced without prior approval of the State. Any such publication, presentation or announcement shall:
 - a) Acknowledge the support of the State of New York and, if funded with Federal funds, the applicable Federal funding agency; and
 - b) State that the opinions, results, findings and/or interpretations of data contained therein are the responsibility of the Contractor and do not necessarily represent the opinions, interpretations or policy of the State or if funded with Federal funds, the applicable Federal funding agency.
- 3. Notwithstanding the above, the Contractor may submit for publication, scholarly or academic publications that derive from activity under the Master Contract (but are not deliverable under the Master Contract), provided that the Contractor first submits such manuscripts to the State forty-five (45) calendar days prior to submission for consideration by a publisher in order for the State to review the manuscript for compliance with confidentiality requirements and restrictions and to make such other comments as the State deems appropriate. All derivative publications shall follow the same acknowledgments and disclaimer as described in Section V(G)(2) (Publicity) hereof.
- H. Web-Based Applications-Accessibility: Any web-based intranet and Internet information and applications development, or programming delivered pursuant to the Master Contract or procurement shall comply with New York State Enterprise IT Policy NYS-P08-005, Accessibility Web-Based Information and Applications, and New York State Enterprise IT Standard NYS-S08-005, Accessibility of Web-Based Information Applications, as such policy or standard may be amended, modified or superseded, which requires that State Agency web-based intranet and Internet information and applications are accessible to person with disabilities. Web content must conform to New York State Enterprise IT Standards NYS-S08-005, as determined by quality assurance testing. Such quality assurance testing shall be conducted by the State Agency and the results of such testing must be satisfactory to the State Agency before web content shall be considered a qualified deliverable under the Master Contract or procurement.

- I. Non-Discrimination Requirements: Pursuant to Article 15 of the Executive Law (also known as the Human Rights Law) and all other State and Federal statutory and constitutional nondiscrimination provisions, the Contractor and sub-contractors will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed (religion), color, sex (including gender expression), national origin, sexual orientation, military status, age, disability, predisposing genetic characteristic, marital status or domestic violence victim status, and shall also follow the requirements of the Human Rights Law with regard to non-discrimination on the basis of prior criminal conviction and prior arrest. Furthermore, in accordance with Section 220-e of the Labor Law, if this is a contract for the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work or for the manufacture, sale or distribution of materials, equipment or supplies, and to the extent that the Master Contract shall be performed within the State of New York, the Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall, by reason of race, creed, color, disability, sex, or national origin: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under the Master Contract. If this is a building service contract as defined in Section 230 of the Labor Law, then, in accordance with Section 239 thereof, the Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall by reason of race, creed, color, national origin, age, sex or disability: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under the Master Contract. The Contractor shall be subject to fines of \$50.00 per person per day for any violation of Section 220-e or Section 239 of the Labor Law.
- J. Equal Opportunities for Minorities and Women; Minority and Women Owned Business Enterprises: In accordance with Section 312 of the Executive Law and 5 NYCRR 143, if the Master Contract is: (i) a written agreement or purchase order instrument, providing for a total expenditure in excess of \$25,000.00, whereby a contracting State Agency is committed to expend or does expend funds in return for labor, services, supplies, equipment, materials or any combination of the foregoing, to be performed for, or rendered or furnished to the contracting State Agency; or (ii) a written agreement in excess of \$100,000.00 whereby a contracting State Agency is committed to expend or does expend funds for the acquisition, construction, demolition, replacement, major repair or renovation of real property and improvements thereon; or (iii) a written agreement in excess of \$100,000.00 whereby the owner of a State assisted housing project is committed to expend or does expend funds for the acquisition, construction, demolition, replacement, major repair or renovation of real property and improvements thereon for such project, then the Contractor certifies and affirms that (i) it is subject to Article 15-A of the Executive Law which includes, but is not limited to, those provisions concerning the maximizing of opportunities for the participation of minority and womenowned business enterprises and (ii) the following provisions shall apply and it is Contractor's equal employment opportunity policy that:
 - 1. The Contractor shall not discriminate against employees or applicants for employment because of race, creed, color, national origin, sex, age, disability or marital status;
 - 2. The Contractor shall make and document its conscientious and active efforts to employ and utilize minority group members and women in its work force on State contracts;
 - 3. The Contractor shall undertake or continue existing programs of affirmative action to ensure that minority group members and women are afforded equal employment opportunities without discrimination. Affirmative action shall mean recruitment, employment, job assignment,

promotion, upgrading, demotion, transfer, layoff, or termination and rates of pay or other forms of compensation;

- 4. At the request of the State, the Contractor shall request each employment agency, labor union, or authorized representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining or other agreement or understanding, to furnish a written statement that such employment agency, labor union or representative shall not discriminate on the basis of race, creed, color, national origin, sex, age, disability or marital status and that such union or representative shall affirmatively cooperate in the implementation of the Contractor's obligations herein; and
- 5. The Contractor shall state, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees, that, in the performance of the State contract, all qualified applicants shall be afforded equal employment opportunities without discrimination because of race, creed, color, national origin, sex, age, disability or marital status.

The Contractor shall include the provisions of subclauses 1-5 of this Section (IV)(J), in every subcontract over \$25,000.00 for the construction, demolition, replacement, major repair, renovation, planning or design of real property and improvements thereon (Work) except where the Work is for the beneficial use of the Contractor. Section 312 of the Executive Law does not apply to: (i) work, goods or services unrelated to the Master Contract; or (ii) employment outside New York State. The State shall consider compliance by the Contractor or a subcontractor with the requirements of any Federal law concerning equal employment opportunity which effectuates the purpose of this section. The State shall determine whether the imposition of the requirements of the provisions hereof duplicate or conflict with any such Federal law and if such duplication or conflict exists, the State shall waive the applicability of Section 312 of the Executive Law to the extent of such duplication or conflict. The Contractor shall comply with all duly promulgated and lawful rules and regulations of the Department of Economic Development's Division of Minority and Women's Business Development pertaining hereto.

- K. Omnibus Procurement Act of 1992: It is the policy of New York State to maximize opportunities for the participation of New York State business enterprises, including minority and women-owned business enterprises, as bidders, subcontractors and suppliers on its procurement contracts.
 - 1. If the total dollar amount of the Master Contract is greater than \$1 million, the Omnibus Procurement Act of 1992 requires that by signing the Master Contract, the Contractor certifies the following:
 - a) The Contractor has made reasonable efforts to encourage the participation of State business enterprises as suppliers and subcontractors, including certified minority and womenowned business enterprises, on this project, and has retained the documentation of these efforts to be provided upon request to the State;
 - b) The Contractor has complied with the Federal Equal Opportunity Act of 1972 (P.L. 92-261), as amended;
 - c) The Contractor agrees to make reasonable efforts to provide notification to State residents of employment opportunities on this project through listing any such positions with the Job Service Division of the New York State Department of Labor, or providing such notification

in such manner as is consistent with existing collective bargaining contracts or agreements. The Contractor agrees to document these efforts and to provide said documentation to the State upon request; and

d) The Contractor acknowledges notice that the State may seek to obtain offset credits from foreign countries as a result of the Master Contract and agrees to cooperate with the State in these efforts.

L. Workers' Compensation Benefits:

- 1. In accordance with Section 142 of the State Finance Law, the Master Contract shall be void and of no force and effect unless the Contractor shall provide and maintain coverage during the life of the Master Contract for the benefit of such employees as are required to be covered by the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Law.
- 2. If a Contractor believes they are exempt from the Workers Compensation insurance requirement they must apply for an exemption.
- M. Unemployment Insurance Compliance: The Contractor shall remain current in both its quarterly reporting and payment of contributions or payments in lieu of contributions, as applicable, to the State Unemployment Insurance system as a condition of maintaining this grant.

The Contractor hereby authorizes the State Department of Labor to disclose to the State Agency staff only such information as is necessary to determine the Contractor's compliance with the State Unemployment Insurance Law. This includes, but is not limited to, the following:

- 1. any records of unemployment insurance (UI) contributions, interest, and/or penalty payment arrears or reporting delinquency;
- 2. any debts owed for UI contributions, interest, and/or penalties;
- 3. the history and results of any audit or investigation; and
- 4. copies of wage reporting information.

Such disclosures are protected under Section 537 of the State Labor Law, which makes it a misdemeanor for the recipient of such information to use or disclose the information for any purpose other than the performing due diligence as a part of the approval process for the Master Contract.

N. Vendor Responsibility:

1. If a Contractor is required to complete a Questionnaire, the Contractor covenants and represents that it has, to the best of its knowledge, truthfully, accurately and thoroughly completed such Questionnaire. Although electronic filing is preferred, the Contractor may obtain a paper form from the OSC prior to execution of the Master Contract. The Contractor further covenants and represents that as of the date of execution of the Master Contract, there are no material events, omissions, changes or corrections to such document requiring an amendment to the Questionnaire.

- 2. The Contractor shall provide to the State updates to the Questionnaire if any material event(s) occurs requiring an amendment or as new information material to such Questionnaire becomes available.
- 3. The Contractor shall, in addition, promptly report to the State the initiation of any investigation or audit by a governmental entity with enforcement authority with respect to any alleged violation of Federal or state law by the Contractor, its employees, its officers and/or directors in connection with matters involving, relating to or arising out of the Contractor's business. Such report shall be made within five (5) business days following the Contractor becoming aware of such event, investigation, or audit. Such report may be considered by the State in making a Determination of Vendor Non-Responsibility pursuant to this section.
- 4. The State reserves the right, in its sole discretion, at any time during the term of the Master Contract:
 - a) to require updates or clarifications to the Questionnaire upon written request;
 - b) to inquire about information included in or required information omitted from the Questionnaire;
 - c) to require the Contractor to provide such information to the State within a reasonable timeframe; and
 - d) to require as a condition precedent to entering into the Master Contract that the Contractor agree to such additional conditions as shall be necessary to satisfy the State that the Contractor is, and shall remain, a responsible vendor; and
 - e) to require the Contractor to present evidence of its continuing legal authority to do business in New York State, integrity, experience, ability, prior performance, and organizational and financial capacity. By signing the Master Contract, the Contractor agrees to comply with any such additional conditions that have been made a part of the Master Contract.
- 5. The State, in its sole discretion, reserves the right to suspend any or all activities under the Master Contract, at any time, when it discovers information that calls into question the responsibility of the Contractor. In the event of such suspension, the Contractor shall be given written notice outlining the particulars of such suspension. Upon issuance of such notice, the Contractor must comply with the terms of the suspension order. Contract activity may resume at such time as the State issues a written notice authorizing a resumption of performance under the Master Contract.
- 6. The State, in its sole discretion, reserves the right to make a final Determination of Non-Responsibility at any time during the term of the Master Contract based on:
 - a) any information provided in the Questionnaire and/or in any updates, clarifications or amendments thereof; or
 - b) the State's discovery of any material information which pertains to the Contractor's responsibility.

- 7. Prior to making a final Determination of Non-Responsibility, the State shall provide written notice to the Contractor that it has made a preliminary determination of non-responsibility. The State shall detail the reason(s) for the preliminary determination, and shall provide the Contractor with an opportunity to be heard.
- O. Charities Registration: If applicable, the Contractor agrees to (i) obtain not-for-profit status, a Federal identification number, and a charitable registration number (or a declaration of exemption) and to furnish the State Agency with this information as soon as it is available, (ii) be in compliance with the OAG charities registration requirements at the time of the awarding of this Master Contract by the State and (iii) remain in compliance with the OAG charities registration requirements throughout the term of the Master Contract.
- P. Consultant Disclosure Law: 9 If this is a contract for consulting services, defined for purposes of this requirement to include analysis, evaluation, research, training, data processing, computer programming, engineering, environmental, health, and mental health services, accounting, auditing, paralegal, legal, or similar services, then in accordance with Section 163 (4-g) of the State Finance Law (as amended by Chapter 10 of the Laws of 2006), the Contractor shall timely, accurately and properly comply with the requirement to submit an annual employment report for the contract to the agency that awarded the contract, the Department of Civil Service and the State Comptroller.
- Q. Wage and Hours Provisions: If this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law or a building service contract covered by Article 9 thereof, neither Contractor's employees nor the employees of its subcontractors may be required or permitted to work more than the number of hours or days stated in said statutes, except as otherwise provided in the Labor Law and as set forth in prevailing wage and supplement schedules issued by the State Labor Department. Furthermore, Contractor and its subcontractors must pay at least the prevailing wage rate and pay or provide the prevailing supplements, including the premium rates for overtime pay, as determined by the State Labor Department in accordance with the Labor Law. Additionally, effective April 28, 2008, if this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law, the Contractor understands and agrees that the filing of payrolls in a manner consistent with Subdivision 3-a of Section 220 of the Labor Law shall be condition precedent to payment by the State of any State approved sums due and owing for work done upon the project.

PROGRAM SPECIFIC TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR ALL NEW YORK STATE OFFICE OF CHILDREN AND FAMILY SERVICES (OCFS) CONTRACTS

(05-2013)

A) AGENCY SPECIFIC TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. PERSONNEL

- a. It is the policy of OCFS to encourage the employment of qualified applicants for, or recipients of, public assistance by both public organizations and private enterprises who are under contractual agreement to OCFS for the provision of goods and services. Contractor will be expected to make best efforts in this area.
- b. The Contractor agrees to identify, in writing, the person(s) who will be responsible for directing the work to be done under this CONTRACT. No change or substitution of such responsible person(s) will be made without prior approval in writing from OCFS, to the degree that such change or substitution is within the reasonable control of the Contractor.

2. GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- a. The Contractor agrees to comply in all respects with the provisions of this CONTRACT and the attachments thereto. The Contractor specifically agrees to perform services according to the objectives, tasks, work plan and staffing plan contained in the ATTACHMENTS. Any modifications to the tasks or workplan contained in Attachment C must be mutually agreed to by both parties in writing before the additional or modified tasks or workplan shall commence.
- b. In providing these services, the Contractor hereby agrees to be responsible for designing and operating these services, and otherwise performing, so as to maximize Federal financial participation to OCFS under the Federal Social Security Act, where applicable.
- c. If funds from this CONTRACT will be used to pay any costs associated with the provision of legal services of any sort, the following shall apply:
 - Opinions prepared by consultant law firms construing the statutes or Constitution of the State of New York do not constitute the view of the State unless the prior written approval of the Attorney General is obtained. Requests for said approval shall be submitted to the Solicitor General, Division of the Appeals and Opinions Bureau, Department of Law, The Capitol, Albany, New York 12224.
 - The Contractor shall provide to OCFS in a format provided by OCFS such additional information concerning the provision of legal services as OCFS shall require.
- d. OCFS will designate a Contract Manager who shall have authority relating to the technical services and operational functions of this CONTRACT and activities completed or contemplated thereunder. The Contract Manager and those individuals designated by him/her in writing shall have the prerogative to make announced or unannounced on-site visits to the project. Project reports and issues of interpretation or direction relating to this CONTRACT shall be directed to the Contract Manager.
- e. If additional funds become available for the same purpose as described in the original procurement, OCFS reserves the right to modify the CONTRACT to provide additional funding to the Contractor for provision of additional mutually agreed upon services and/or to extend the provision of services under the CONTRACT. This additional funding can be provided within an existing period, or in conjunction with a change in the original term. Any changes in the amount or changes in period and amount are subject to the approval of OCFS and the Office of the State Comptroller (OSC).
- f. All organizations that receive Federal and/or New York State financial assistance under social service programs are prohibited from discriminating against beneficiaries or prospective beneficiaries of the social service programs on the basis of religion or religious belief. Accordingly, organizations, in providing services supported in whole or in part with Federal and/or New York State financial assistance, and in their outreach activities related to such services, are not allowed to discriminate against current or prospective program

beneficiaries on the basis of religion, a religious belief, a refusal to hold a religious belief, or a refusal to attend or participate in a religious practice.

Organizations that engage in explicitly religious activities (including activities that involve overt religious content such as worship, religious instruction, or proselytization) must perform such activities and offer such services outside of programs that are supported with direct Federal and/or New York State financial assistance (including through prime awards or sub-awards), separately in time or location from any such programs or services supported with direct Federal and/or New York State financial assistance, and participation in any such explicitly religious activities must be voluntary for the beneficiaries of the social service program supported with such Federal and/or New York State financial assistance.

g. The Contractor ensures that the grounds, structures, buildings and furnishings at the program site(s) used under this CONTRACT are maintained in good repair and free from any danger to health or safety and that any building or structure used for program services complies with all applicable zoning, building, health, sanitary, and fire codes.

3. CONFIDENTIALITY AND PROTECTION OF HUMAN SUBJECTS

- a. The Contractor agrees to safeguard the confidentiality of financial and client information relating to individuals and their families who may receive services in the course of this project. The Contractor shall maintain the confidentiality of all such financial and client information with regard to services provided under this CONTRACT in conformity with the provisions of applicable State and Federal laws and regulations. Any breach of confidentiality by the Contractor, its agents or representatives shall be cause for immediate termination of this CONTRACT.
- b. Any contactor who will provide goods and/or services to a residential facility or program operated by OCFS agrees to require all of its employees and volunteers who will have the potential for regular and substantial contact with youth in the care or custody of OCFS to sign the Confidentiality Non-Disclosure Agreement and Contractor Employee and Volunteer Background Certification before any such employees and volunteers are permitted access to youth in the care or custody of OCFS and/or any financial and/or client identifiable information concerning such youth. Additionally, OCFS will require a database check of the Statewide Central Register of Child Abuse and Maltreatment (SCR) and, at the discretion of OCFS, of the Vulnerable Persons Central Register (VPCR) of each employee and volunteer of the contractor who has the potential for regular and substantial contact with children in the care or custody of OCFS. Any other contractor whose employees and volunteers will have access to financial and/or client identifiable information concerning youth in the care or custody of OCFS agrees to require all such employees and volunteers to sign the Confidentiality Non-Disclosure Agreement before any such employees and volunteers are permitted access to any financial and/or client identifiable information concerning such youth.

4. PUBLICATIONS AND COPYRIGHTS

- a. OCFS and the State of New York expressly reserve the right to a royalty-free, non-exclusive and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, distribute or otherwise use, in perpetuity, any and all copyrighted or copyrightable material resulting from this CONTRACT or activity supported by this CONTRACT. All publications by the Contractor covered by this CONTRACT shall expressly acknowledge OCFS's right to such license.
- b. All of the license rights so reserved to OCFS and the State of New York under this paragraph are equally reserved to the United States Department of Health and Human Services and subject to the provisions on copyrights contained in 45 CFR 92 if the CONTRACT is federally funded.
- c. The Contractor agrees that at the completion of any scientific or statistical study, report or analysis prepared pursuant to this CONTRACT, it will provide to OCFS at no additional cost a copy of any and all data supporting the scientific or statistical study, report or analysis, together with the name(s) and business address(es) of the principal(s) producing the scientific or statistical study, report or analysis. The Contractor agrees and acknowledges the right of OCFS, subject to applicable confidentiality restrictions, to release the name(s) and business address(es) of the principal(s) producing the scientific or statistical study, report or analysis, together with a copy of the scientific or statistical study, report or analysis and all data supporting the scientific or statistical study, report or analysis.

5. PATENTS AND INVENTIONS

The Contractor agrees that any and all inventions, conceived or first actually reduced to practice in the course of, or under this CONTRACT, or with monies supplied pursuant to this CONTRACT, shall be promptly and fully reported to OCFS. Determination as to ownership and/or disposition of rights to such inventions, including

whether a patent application shall be filed, and if so, the manner of obtaining, administering and disposing of rights under any patent application or patent which may be issued, shall be made pursuant to all applicable law and regulations.

6. TERMINATION

To the extent permitted by law, this CONTRACT shall be deemed in the sole discretion of OCFS terminated immediately upon the filing of a petition in bankruptcy or insolvency, by or against the Contractor. Such termination shall be immediate and complete, without termination costs or further obligation by OCFS to the Contractor.

7. FISCAL SANCTION

In accordance with the OCFS Fiscal Sanction policy, Contractors may be placed on fiscal sanction when OCFS identifies any of the following issues:

- The Contractor has received an Advance, overpayment or other funds under this or another CONTRACT that has not been refunded to OCFS within the established timeframe;
- An OCFS, OSC, or other audit identifies significant fiscal irregularities and/or that funds are due to OCFS:
- The Contractor has not provided satisfactory services as required under the terms of this CONTRACT;
- The Contractor has not provided fiscal or program reports as required under the terms of this CONTRACT;
- A local, State or federal prosecutorial or investigative agency identifies possible criminal activity, or significant fiscal or programmatic irregularities on the part of the Contractor;
- The Contractor is not in compliance with State or federal statutes or regulations, or applicable OCFS guidelines, policies and/or procedures; or
- Unsafe physical conditions exist at a program site operated by the Contractor and funded under this CONTRACT with OCFS.

Once the Contractor has been placed on Fiscal Sanction, payments on all open contracts and any new awards, amendments or CONTRACT renewals will not be processed until the issues have been satisfactorily resolved. The Contractor will be notified in advance of any proposed Fiscal Sanction and will be provided a timeframe within which the issues must be resolved in order to avoid a Fiscal Sanction. Issues that are not resolved within the timeframe established by OCFS may be referred to the Attorney General (AG) for collection or legal action. If a CONTRACT is referred to the AG a collection fee will be added to the amount owed. In addition, interest will be due on any amount not paid in accordance with the timeframes established by the AG. The contractor will remain on Fiscal Sanction until the amount owed, including any collection fee and interest, is paid.

8. PROCUREMENT LOBBYING LAW

The Contractor will comply with all New York State and OCFS procedures relative to the permissible contacts and disclosure of contacts as required by State Finance Law Sections 139-j and 139-k and OCFS procedures and will affirmatively certify that all information provided pursuant to those provisions is complete, true and accurate. This certification is included in the Offerer's Certification and Affirmation of Understanding and CONTRACT pursuant to State Finance Law Sections 139-j and 139-k.

OCFS reserves the right to terminate this CONTRACT if the Offerer's Certification filed by the Contractor in accordance with the New York State Finance Law Section 139-k was intentionally false or intentionally incomplete. Upon such a determination by the OCFS, OCFS may exercise its termination right by providing written notification to the Contractor in accordance with the written notification terms of this CONTRACT. Nothing herein shall preclude or otherwise limit OCFS's right to terminate this contact as otherwise set forth in the applicable provisions of this CONTRACT.

9. REQUIRED REPORTS - CONTRACTS FOR CONSULTING SERVICES

If consulting services (including services for analysis, evaluation, research, training, data processing, computer programming, engineering, environmental, health, and mental health services, accounting, auditing, paralegal, legal, or similar services) are provided, the Contractor must submit on or before May 15th of each year for the annual period ending March 31st, Form OCFS-4843, State Consultant Services — Contractor's Annual Employment Record. This form must report information for all employees who provided services under the CONTRACT whether employed by the Contractor or a subcontractor. This form will be available for public inspection and copying under the Freedom of Information Law with any individual employee names and social security numbers redacted.

10. IRAN DIVESTMENT ACT

By entering into this CONTRACT, Contractor certifies that it is not on the "Entities Determined To Be Non-Responsive Bidders/Offerers Pursuant to The New York State Iran Divestment Act of 2012" list ("Prohibited Entities List") posted on the OGS website at: http://www.ogs.ny.gov/about/regs/docs/ListofEntities.pdf and further certifies that it will not utilize on such CONTRACT any subcontractor that is identified on the Prohibited Entities List. Contractor agrees that should it seek to renew or extend this CONTRACT, it must provide the same certification at the time the CONTRACT is renewed or extended. Contractor also agrees that any proposed Assignee of the CONTRACT will be required to certify that it is not on the Prohibited Entities List before OCFS may approve a request for Assignment of CONTRACT.

During the term of the CONTRACT, should OCFS receive information that a person (as defined in State Finance Law §165-a) is in violation of the above-referenced certifications, OCFS will review such information and offer the person an opportunity to respond. If the person fails to demonstrate that it has ceased its engagement in the investment activity which is in violation of the Act within 90 days after the determination of such violation, then OCFS shall take such action as may be appropriate and provided for by law, rule, or CONTRACT, including, but not limited to, seeking compliance, recovering damages, or declaring the Contractor in default.

OCFS reserves the right to reject any request for renewal, extension, or assignment for an entity that appears on the Prohibited Entities List prior to the renewal, extension, or assignment of the CONTRACT, and to pursue a responsibility review with Contractor should it appear on the Prohibited Entities List hereafter.

11. ADDITIONAL ASSURANCES

- a. Expectation of Insured: The Contractor, if a municipal corporation, represents that it is a self-insured entity. If a not-for-profit corporation or entity other than a self-insured municipal corporation, the Contractor agrees to obtain and maintain in effect a general policy of liability insurance in an appropriate amount. The Contractor agrees that it will require any and all Subcontractors with whom it subcontracts pursuant to this CONTRACT to obtain and maintain a general policy of liability insurance in an appropriate amount.
- b. Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 14 of this CONTRACT, to the extent the contractor provides health care and treatment or professional consultation to residents of facilities operated by OCFS, in conformance with Executive Law §522 the provisions of paragraphs A, B and C of Article 14 (Article 14 A., B. and C.) shall not apply. In such cases, the provisions of Public Officers Law §17, to the extent provided by Executive Law §522, shall apply instead.

B) Program Specific Terms and Conditions

Child Fatality Review Teams (CFRTs)

New York State Social Services Law allows Child Fatality Review Teams (CFRT's) to be established at a local or regional level with the approval of the New York State Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS). CFRT's bring community agencies together to systemically share information on child death events and identify risk factors in these deaths. The goal of the CFRT is to identify how and why children die in order to support local actions to prevent deaths within communities.

OCFS administers the CFRT Program. CFRT's are a multidisciplinary group of professionals with responsibility for the review of child deaths. Local or regional CFRT's approved by OCFS are authorized to review the death of any child whose care and custody or custody and guardianship has been transferred to an authorized agency, any child for whom child protective services has an open case, any child for whom the local department of social services has an open preventive services case, and any child named in a report made to the New York Statewide Central Register of Child Abuse and Maltreatment (SCR) involving the death of the child. A fatality review team may also investigate any unexplained or unexpected death of any child under the age of eighteen.

Required members of the CFRT must include:

- Child Protective Services (CPS)
- County Department of Health (or local health commissioner or director or a designee if there is no county health department)
- Office of the Medical Examiner (ME), (or if the locality does not have an ME, then the Office of the Coroner)
- District Attorney's Office
- Office of the County Attorney
- Local Law Enforcement
- Emergency Medical Services (EMS)
- New York State Police
- individual pediatricians or other medical professional with expertise in child abuse and maltreatment or forensic pediatrics

Representatives from other agencies and professions may also contribute to the team. These agencies may include representatives from local departments of social services, mental health agencies, domestic violence agencies, substance abuse programs, hospitals, local schools and family court.

Regional CFRT's must clearly demonstrate support of the required agencies or disciplines of the identified counties participating.

Contractor is required to:

- 1. Develop a mission statement and goals.
- 2. Develop interagency protocols and confidentiality procedures within the parameters of the OCFS CFRT Guidelines and Protocol Template.
- 3. Become an approved OCFS CFRT within three months of contract approval.
- 4. Implement the case review process and collect data through the NCCDR Case Reporting System.
- 5. Collaborate and support efforts of the NYS DOH's "Prevention of Child Morbidity and Mortality in New York State: Keeping New York Kids Alive" Initiative.

Priority deaths for review shall include: Any child whose death has been reported to the SCR as allegedly occurring as the result of abuse or maltreatment; Any child for whom child protective services has an open case; Any child for whom the local department of social services has an open preventive services case; The death of any child whose care and custody or custody and guardianship has been transferred to an authorized agency. (This may include children up to age 21 years old). Infant sleep related deaths, particularly bed sharing; Injury related deaths where the cause(s) is unclear.

Allowable and non-allowable costs are indicated in the Child Fatality Review Team Request for Proposals, if applicable. The OCFS Program Manager will have final decision making responsibility on all allowable and non-allowable costs in the case of a discrepancy. The following parameters will apply:

Attachment C Oneida Child Fatality Review Team Project Work Plan for 2013-2014 Contract Year

Mission of Child Fatality Review Team:

The Oneida County Child Fatality Review Team is a multi-disciplinary, multi-agency panel given the responsibility of reviewing child deaths under the age of 18 in Oneida County. Their mission is to prevent deaths through the identification and evaluation of risk factors related to child fatalities. The case reviews allow the deaths to be examined from all perspectives: medical, social, and environmental which provides a comprehensive look at each child's death. This enables the team to recommend actions that could lead to systemic changes, public awareness and advocacy. The reviews are not conducted to find fault or to place blame but as a conduit to learn how we can protect our children.

Purpose of Child Fatality Review Team:

The CFRT purpose is to prevent future deaths and promote child safety through a comprehensive and multidisciplinary examination as to the cause, manner and circumstance of a death. This examination allows team members to identify trends, unsafe practices, and gaps in investigative standards or policies.

The CFRT is a valuable asset as it identifies the fatalities in the County, compiles information and inputs the data into the State Data Base (NCCDR Case Reporting System). The CFRT also has the opportunity to share their ideas and observations during their quarterly reviews with the Office of Children and Family Services representatives. Valuable feedback as to what other county teams are identifying assists our team in the areas of strategic planning regarding specific trends. It also provides us with information as to how we compare with other communities within the state and trends as a whole. CFRT's have an option to draft and finalize a Child Fatality Review Report regarding fatalities that occur in Oneida County. Oneida County CFRT has chosen not to write fatality reports and /or recommendations to the local district of Social Services.

Oneida County: Demographic, Economic and Social Characteristics:

The Oneida County CFRT gets a number of community agencies and individuals together to review fatalities in the County. Utilizing a diverse team is important as they are able to receive input, ideas, and opinions that represent the community. Team members include but are not limited to law enforcement, pediatricians, emergency response services, child protective workers etc... which enables the team to cross great ground in the networking area. This team, as a whole, is able to hone in on trends from cases that have a vast range from accidents, child abuse, neglect, sickness, wrongful death etc. Once you bring together the knowledge and expertise of all team members they can really make a difference. For example, fatalities due to co-sleeping could be assumed to be more prevalent in a particular population such as the Burmese due to their customs and culture. In reality, fatalities from co-sleeping or unsafe sleep practices cross all ethnical boundaries and is not targeted to one particular population. This means safe sleep awareness needs to be brought to the community forefront as a whole. The CFRT has the ability to make the public aware of unsafe practices and ultimately provide safety to children in the community.

Oneida County is made up of the following demographics:

Oneida County is located in central New York State and contains 1,257 square miles. The seat of Oneida County is Utica, but County Court and major offices also are found in Rome. The County consists of an urban-rural mixture composed of 26 towns, 19 villages and 3 cities. In 2010, the two largest cities, Utica and Rome, had a combined population of almost 96,000. This represents about 41% of the county's total population (234,878). Another 27,000 people live in villages and other areas immediately surrounding these cities. All told, more than 50% of the county's population live either in urban city type settings or incorporated villages generally surrounding these cities. The remaining population lives in more rural settings both north and south of

the Mohawk Valley corridor.

The total population in 2010 was 234,878. During the 1990s, the County lost 6% of its population, dropping from 250,836 in 1990 to 235,469 people in the year 2000. In the last decade, the population appears to have stabilized, with a change of less than a quarter of a percent. The median age of the county's population jumped from 33.8 in 1990 to 38.2 in 2000. This reflected the loss of many younger segments of the population due to the impacts of the closure of Griffiss Air Force Base in the mid-nineties. In 2010, the median age of Oneida County now stands at 40.9* years of age. In the year 2010, approximately 5.7% of the population was under the age of five; 21.9% were less than age eighteen; 73.5% were age twenty-one or older; and 16.3% were age sixty-five or older. These are somewhat similar to the 2000 age distributions.

According to the 2010 Census, about 97% of the county population identifies itself as being of a single racial background. Among the total population, 87.1% see themselves as being white only; 6.3% as being black or African American only; and 3.1% as being of some other singular racial composition. In 2000, nearly 7,500 persons were identified as being of Hispanic ethnicity in the County. In 2010, this number has jump significantly to nearly 11,000 people. Hispanics now represent almost 5% of the population and are the single largest growing ethnic group in the region. Within the cities of Utica and Rome, 75.1%** and 85.6%** of their respective populations identified themselves as white only; 13.8%** and 7.7%**, respectively, said that they were of black or African American racial composition only; and 4.1% and 1.7%**, respectively, claimed to be of some other singular racial component. Almost one in ten city residents in Utica (9 %**) said that they were Hispanic, while in Rome 5.6%** claimed Hispanic origin.

A large number of refugees have settled in Oneida County. The Mohawk Valley Resource Center for Refugees (MVRCR) has helped resettle over 13,000 refugees in NYS since 1973. Of these refugees, some 35% have settled in Oneida County; of those who remained in Oneida County, most live in the City of Utica. The majority of refugees (73%) came from Bosnia, Vietnam, Ukraine, Serbia, Burma and Belarus. MVRCR more recent influx of refugees is from the war-torn Southern Somalia in Africa. Language barriers and cultural differences have made it difficult for many of these culturally and linguistically diverse residents to integrate into our local communities.

Among the 104,180 housing units is Oneida County, about two thirds are within urban settings. Of the almost 93,028 total occupied housing units, 66.7% are owner occupied, with the remainder occupied by renters. The median self-identified housing value in the Census 2010 in Oneida County was \$106,500*. The median self-reported rent was \$665*.

Of the 111,442* persons age 16 or older in the civilian labor force, 101,190* persons were employed according to the Census 2000. This reflects an unemployment rate of 9.0%* in 2010. Employment within various industries includes: construction (5,170)*; manufacturing (10,917)*; wholesale trade (1,851)*; retail trade (10,960)*; transportation and warehousing (3,570)*; finance and insurance (8,128)*; educational, health care and social assistance (29,838)*; and, arts, entertainment, accommodation and food services (7.750)*.

Higher education facilities in the County include: Hamilton College, Clinton (about 1,800 students); Mohawk Valley Community College, Utica and Rome campuses (around 7,000 full and part time students combined); Utica College, Utica (approximately 2,500 undergraduate and 500 graduate students); SUNY Institute of Technology, Marcy (about 2,800 students); and the Utica School of Commerce, Utica (approximately 250 students).

Health care facilities include: Faxton-St Luke's Hospitals in Utica, St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Utica, and the Rome Hospital in Rome.

Target Population:

The CFRT target population includes two types of cases.

Section 20 cases involve children, under the age of 18 years, either named in a State Central Registry Report, children receiving child protective or preventive services and / or children who died while in the care and custody or guardianship of the local district of Social Services.

Non-Section 20 cases involve children, under the age of 18 years, which have succumbed to an unexpected and unexplained death.

All residents of Oneida County, as a whole, are the target population. Child fatalities are not discriminate and cross all population types and are not limited to one grouping of people. This is another reason why our community can benefit from the Child Fatality Review Team's work. The focus of the CFRT is to identify areas of needed change in order to reduce future deaths. This benefits the community, as a whole, through community awareness. The team has, and continues to use, various forms of public awareness which includes but is not limited to: media, brochures, posters and flyers which has allowed us to reach a large audience with our message. The information is distributed and posted at various community agencies, schools, child care centers, hospitals, doctor's offices, furniture stores, just to name a few.

Outcomes/Performance Targets:

Proposed Project Description:

Oneida County Child Fatality Review Team meets quarterly and reviews both Section 20 and Non-Section 20 cases involving childhood deaths. Oneida County plans on achieving all Performance Targets and Goals outlined in this proposal. Oneida County will also re-focus its efforts on safe sleep practices and coordinate a public awareness campaign and trainings due to the number of fatalities it has experienced in this area. There is an identified need to educate the community in regards to these preventable deaths.

CFRT is comprised of individuals from a variety of disciplines which include: a CFRT Coordinator and CFRT Assistant Coordinator whose role is not only to help develop a committed and motivated team but has team meeting, prevention undertakings and team continuity responsibilities; as well as a Social Welfare Examiner that provides assistance for information gathering, data base input and documentation that needs to be submitted to OCFS. The team membership includes required representatives from the Oneida County Child Protective Services component, New York State Office of Children and Family Services, Oneida County Health Department, Medical Examiner, Oneida County District Attorney's Office, Utica Police, Rome Police, New York State Police, Department of Emergency Services and Pediatricians. We also have non-required members from the Local Department of Social Services, Mental Health, Domestic Violence, Substance Abuse, Hospitals, and Schools who also participate on an on-going or case by case basis. The team is currently in the process of recruiting additional members from Probation, the YWCA and Community Action which will provide the team with a more expansive and diversified approach in promoting child safety. It is understood, by all members, that any information obtained, reviewed and discussed at a CFRT meeting is confidential. To ensure the privacy of the families we discuss, prior to every meeting, all members present are required to sign the Confidentiality Agreement and Attendance Verification Form to re-enforce the importance of this. A copy of the Oneida County Confidentiality Agreement and Attendance Verification Form is attached for your reference.

The CFRT identifies child deaths in Oneida County and is tasked with acquiring detailed information pertaining to that death from various sources. The process usually begins with the death certificate and /or autopsy report and can lead to additional informational gathering activities from such entities as: medical examiners, law enforcement, hospital staff, pediatricians etc. Cases cannot be reviewed until all on-going investigations that pertain to the case are completed. Information is shared at the quarterly CFRT meeting and a detailed and comprehensive discussion ensues as to the cause of death and the circumstances that led to the death. This can sometimes lead to more questions, as well as, potential strategies that could have prevented the outcome. CFRT members will discuss whether this death could have been prevented and, what if any, actions could have been taken. If the information can benefit the community, the team will focus on ways of disseminating the information through different venues.

Oneida County CFRT Protocols are also attached for your review.

Project Staff:

If awarded this grant, it will enhance and maintain the daily functions needed to run the Oneida County Child Fatality Review Team and support the following staff: Child Fatality Coordinator, Child Fatality Assistant Coordinator and Social Welfare Examiner for Oneida County Child Fatality Review Team.

The Oneida County CFRT Coordinator is designated to be Deborah Neal that works for the Oneida County Department of Social Services as the Director of Services. She has the expertise, knowledge and experience to lead the CFRT. The Oneida County CFRT Assistant Coordinator is designated to be James Brognano, who also works for the Oneida County Department of Social Services as the Assistant Director of Services. In utilizing these two individuals, we believe it provides the team with a vast amount of expertise and knowledge needed to make the Oneida County CFRT a success. They will provide oversight and lead the CFRT meetings. Their duties would include but are limited to:

- Coordination of quarterly meetings, facilitation of trainings, data collection and community outreach based on needs assessment, including notification of all agencies as described in the CFRT protocol.
- Responsible and accountable for personal and professional growth ensuring that team members will participate in professional development programs such as in-service trainings, formal education courses and quarterly meetings held by the CFRT.
- Maintenance of records and reports.
- Participation in the review and revision of policies, procedures and protocols.
- Participation in periodic team meetings for case review and evaluation of project effectiveness.
- Responsible and accountable for the acquisition, analysis and dissemination of knowledge and skills in their respective area of expertise:

The Social Welfare Examiner will support the CFRT Coordinators by performing needed tasks, such as but not limited to: preparing packets and information for meetings, contacting team members, taking meeting minutes, gathering an entering statistics and information into NCCDR and various other duties assigned by the CFRT Coordinator and Assistant CFRT Coordinator.

Oneida County CFRT History and Achievements:

Oneida County's team was started in 2000 with the utilization of Child Advocacy funding from NYS OCFS. In 2007, it began a modified regional approach by instituting a two-county CFRT which included Oneida and Madison Counties. Oneida-Madison, as a combined effort, was awarded a grant specifically for CFRT which not only enabled the enhancement of the project in Oneida County but it also supported the start-up and beginning of the CFRT project in Madison County. Both teams were and are represented with the appropriate CFRT team members and disciplines. As Madison County is now established and working successfully, they have decided to maintain their own CFRT team for future endeavors, separate and apart from Oneida County. This will now allow Oneida County CFRT Coordinators to focus all their efforts on Oneida County.

The history of the Oneida-Madison Child Fatality Review Team Project began in 2007-2009 and was very eventful. Not only did Oneida County enhance its existing CFRT, which is an approved 422-b SSL team, it also recruited additional members and reviewed data for a needs assessment in order to implement community outreach and prevention. It provided specific child fatality investigative trainings to team members and was instrumental in the start-up for Madison County to establish a working 422-b approved CFRT Team in Madison County.

In 2009-2010, the project promoted participation of additional disciplines and furthered community-based education programs in Oneida County. In Madison County, the CFRT began increasing its membership, formulating trainings programs and developing community based education programs that were designed to prevent child deaths. Quarterly meetings and case reviews were maintained and trainings were provided in both counties. By the time this program reached the 2010-2011 year, both Oneida and Madison County Child Fatality Review Teams were fully functional and had established uniform goals in an effort to bring both teams in compliance with OCFS goals outlined for each county.

In the past year 2011-2012, both CFRT teams experienced a significant change in the Coordinator position. The previous Coordinator for both Oneida and Madison County resigned. Oneida County's response to this change was to identify a Coordinator and an Assistant Coordinator to handle Oneida County quarterly meetings and maintained all required documentation for both CFRT teams. Madison County identified and contracted for a Coordinator to lead Madison County meetings under the direction of the Oneida County Coordinators. Performance Targets and Milestones for both Oneida and Madison County were streamlined and goals were clarified with CFRT members. Both counties reviewed all appropriate fatality cases, entered the Non-Section 20 cases into the NCCDR database and provided training and/or literature that targeted child death prevention. Oneida County focused their public awareness efforts on safe sleep, crib distribution and the identification of new funding streams for the purchase of "pack-n-plays" while Madison County continued their efforts to ensure child safety in and near water.

During the time period 2007-2013, each county grew from holding meetings to review deaths of children and maintain membership, to expanding goals and targets to include all of the above. Each team has progressed significantly since the inception of the five year plan. Team meetings continue to be held quarterly and team members attended trainings and seminars including but not limited to: Building Justice for Children, Safe Sleep, Child Fatality Web Cast and Child Fatality, conference on homicide shootings, Shaken Baby and Child Fatality Investigations. In addition to these trainings, a CFRT project produced a Child Fatality Death Scene Protocol which was presented to a number of first responders such as EMT's and Firefighters. Based on new targets and goals, the teams have undertaken public awareness campaigns throughout the years, along with the dissemination of information to prevent child deaths in the future. Members from both teams attended and hosted various trainings related to the above-mentioned topics and public awareness promotions were initiated and continue to date.

Child Death Statistics or History:

Statistically from 2007 through 2012, Oneida County had one hundred forty-four (144) child deaths of which forty-eight (48) of the Oneida County cases were reviewed

Of the one hundred forty-four (144) cases in the five year period, causes of death were:

- fifty-eight (58) deaths prematurity
- fifty-four (54) deaths various illnesses
- four (4) deaths SIDS
- five (5) deaths suicides
- one (1) death shaken baby
- one (1) death asphyxia

- six (6) deaths co-sleeping
- one (1) death scissors accident
- two (2) deaths drowning
- six (6) deaths vehicle accidents
- three (3) deaths fire
- one (1) death homicide
- one (1) death blunt force trauma
- one (1) death stabbing.

Statistically from 2007 through 2012, Madison County had twenty-four (24) child deaths and twenty-four (24) of the Madison County cases were reviewed

Of the twenty-four (24) cases in a five year period, causes of death were:

- five (5) deaths prematurity
- six (6) deaths various illnesses
- four (4) deaths vehicle accidents
- one (1) death- co-sleeping
- two (2) deaths suicide
- one (1) death homicide
- one (1) death suicide by police officer
- one (1) death drowning
- one (1) death asphyxia
- one (1) death fire
- one (1) death ingestion of synthetic pot

In 2012-2013 all appropriate child deaths were reviewed. Of the ten (10) child deaths that occurred in Oneida County, four (4) were reviewable. All five (5) child deaths in Madison County were reviewed.

Budget Plan:

Oneida County proposal requested funds fall 100% into the program costs category. The proposed CFRT funding provides for Personnel cost support of the Oneida County CFRT Coordinator (15% of this position), Oneida County CFRT Assistant Coordinator (17.5% of this position) and a Social Welfare Examiner (33.08% of this position) to assist the CFRT Coordinators with office support, reports and documentation for Oneida County CFRT.

The Oneida County CFRT is looking forward to the continued partnership with OCFS providing enhancement of Child Death Review.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of Social Services of the County of Oneida, hereinafter called the Commissioner, is authorized under Section 410 of the Social Services Law (SSL) to provide Day Care Services at public expense for children residing in her territory who are eligible pursuant to criteria established by the New York State Department of Social Services, and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner may provide such Day Care Services either directly or through the purchase of such care from a private non-profit corporation or association pursuant to Section 410 (3) (a) of said SSL, or if the Day Care Provider is a private proprietor, a waiver has been granted pursuant to Section 410.3 and

WHEREAS, the Contractor is authorized to provide Day Care Services by reason of holding a valid permit pursuant to Section 390 of the SSL, and

WHEREAS, Day Care Services are included in the latest Comprehensive Annual Social Services Program Plan for New York State including the Oneida County Social Services District, and

WHEREAS, the Department feels that the amount of funds to be paid to the Contractor is reasonable and necessary to assure quality of services; and

WHEREAS, it is economically and organizational feasible for the Department to contract with the Contractor for the performance of these services;

NOW THEREFORE, the parties in consideration of the above, do covenant and agree as follows:

1. The Contractor shall furnish to the Department Day Care Services as follows:

Objectives

Day Care Provider Day Care Services

(a) To provide quality day care to children between ___ years and ____ years of age for a portion of the day and less than 24 hours, outside their home in accordance with New York State and Federal standards for day care.

Location of Services

(b) The Contractor will provide the agreed services at its place(s) of business, <u>SEE</u> ATTACHMENT B There are no other locations where the Contractor will provide services.

Unit of Service

- (c) A unit of service is defined for the purpose of this agreement, as the care of a child for one week, five full days of at least six hours per day.
- (d) A child in care at this Day Care Provider Center must be at least ______YRS and no more than ______. YEARS of age since this is the basis for issuance of their permit.
- 2. The Department will pay the Contractor <u>Per Market Rates</u> as set by New York State for each unit of service (ref., item 1. (c) provided pursuant to this Agreement.) This rate per service unit has been determined by the Department to be an amount reasonable and necessary to assure the quality of the day care services purchased per DSS 1993, Annual Day Care Budget form. For care for a child with the day care provider on a part-time basis, the department will pay the contractor an individually negotiated rate.
- 3. This Agreement may be terminated by either party upon 30 days notice to the other party.
- 4. Performance under this agreement shall commence on October 1, 2013 and shall terminate on September 30, 2014. The option to renew this Agreement under all current terms and conditions for one additional year not to exceed September 30, 2015 is at the sole discretion of the Department and the Oneida County (hereinafter "County") and notice to the Contractor shall be provided prior to the end of the term of this Agreement.

It is agreed by the Contractor that performance without this Agreement or a subsequent written Amendment to this Agreement extending the term of the Agreement by one year will not be paid for by the Department.

5. The parties hereto agree to abide by all the items and requirements set forth in Contract Attachment A, Contract Attachment B, Appendix A, Appendix B and Addendum hereto annexed and made part hereof, or as the same may be amended by amendments hereto.

The terms of this Agreement, including any attachments, amendments, addendums or appendixes attached hereto, constitute the entire understanding and agreement of the parties and cancels and

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supersedes all prior negotiations, representations, understandings or agreements, whether written or oral, with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement.

Department will not be responsible for any fee and all clients supplemented by Social Services funds will not be required to pay a registration fee.

Now Therefore, the Department will allow for payment of <u>4</u> absentee days per month.

- 1. If and so long as funds are available therefore, the Contractor shall furnish services to persons determined by the Department to be eligible therefore, in accordance with standards prescribed by the Department and by the State Department of Social Services.
- 2. If and so long as funds are available therefore, the Department shall purchase from the Contractor, any or all of the services set forth in this agreement which the Contractor may furnish to persons eligible therefor.
- 3. The Department shall be responsible for establishing the standards, policies and procedures for determining the eligibility of persons for the above services to be purchased by the Department and to be furnished by the Contractor to those persons determined to be eligible therefore in accordance with the Social Services Law of the State of New York and the Regulations of the New York State Department of Social Services, and the Department will retain continuing, basic responsibility for determining the eligibility of persons for such services.
- 4. The Department shall perform the functions of determining eligibility and developing the individual plans of services in accordance with applicable Federal and State requirements, pursuant to the procedures and criteria established by the Department.
- 5. The Department shall furnish such services in accordance with applicable requirements of law and shall cooperate with the Department, as may be required so that the Department and the New York State Department of Social Services will be able to fulfill their function and responsibilities as the Single State Agency under Title XX and the other applicable provisions of the Social Security Act and the Social Services Law and be able to meet all the applicable requirements, both State and Federal pertaining thereto.
- 6. The Contractor will establish a system through which recipients may present grievances about the operation of the service program. The Contractor will advise recipients of this right and will also advise applicants and recipients of their right to appeal.
- 7. The Department shall notify applicants for or recipients of care and services of their right to a fair hearing to appeal the denial, reduction or termination of a service, or failure to act upon a request for service with reasonable promptness. Whenever an applicant or recipient requests a fair

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hearing, the New York State Department of Social Services will provide such a hearing through its regular fair hearing procedures.

- 8. (a) The Department working through the State Department of Social Services shall be responsible for establishing fair hearing procedures; holding fair hearings and issuing appropriate decisions thereon; and taking such steps as may be necessary to enforce its determinations and decisions. The Department shall provide the Contractor with copies of its decision.
- (b). The Contractor, upon the request of the Department shall participate in appeals and fair hearings as witnesses when necessary for a determination of the issues.
- 9. Designated representatives of the Department and of the State Department of Social Services shall have access to persons who are eligible for or who may be eligible for the services herein, and to the records of such persons for the purpose of the proper discharge of its responsibilities under this agreement.
- 10. The Contractor agrees to maintain books, records documents, and other evidence and accounting procedures and practices which sufficiently and properly reflect all direct and indirect costs of any nature expended in the performance of this agreement.
- 11. These records shall be subject at all reasonable times for inspection, review or audit by State personnel and other personnel duly authorized by the Department, as well as by Federal personnel when Federal funds are being utilized in making payments to the Contractor.
- 12. The Contractor agrees to collect statistical data of a fiscal nature on a regular basis and to make fiscal statistical reports at times prescribed by and on forms furnished by the Department.
- 13. The Contractor agrees to include these requirements in all subcontractors and assignments.
- 14. Contractor agrees to maintain program records required by the Department and agrees that a program and facilities review, including meetings with consumers, review of service records, review of service policy and procedural issuances, review of staffing ratios and job descriptions, and meetings with any staff directly or indirectly involved in the provision of services-may be conducted at a reasonable time by appropriate State and Federal personnel and other persons duly authorized by the Department.
- 15. The Contractor agrees to retain all books, records and other documents relevant to this agreement for six years after final payment, Federal and/or State auditors and any persons duly authorized by the Department shall have full access to and the right to examine any of said materials during said period.
 - 16. The Department shall develop, in cooperation with the Contractor, a system of reports to

be made periodically as are or may be necessary to comply with applicable Federal and State requirements.

- 17. The Department and the Contractor shall through cooperative efforts develop forms, procedures and financial controls for carrying out their respective responsibilities under this agreement.
- 18. The Contractor shall not assign this agreement without prior written approval of the Department (which shall be attached to the original agreement) and subject to such conditions and provisions as the Department may deem necessary. No such approval by the Department of any assignment shall be deemed in any event or in any manner to provide for the incurrence of any obligation of the Department in addition to the total agreed upon prices.
- 19. The Department and the Contractor shall observe and require the observance of applicable Federal and State requirements relating to confidentiality of records and information, and each agree not to allow examination of records or disclose information, except that examination of records by the Department as may be necessary to assure that the purpose of the agreement will be effectuated, and also to otherwise comply with the Department's requirements and obligations under law will be allowed. In addition, the Department and the Contractor shall be bound by the provisions of 45 CFR 205.50, and all amendments thereof, and any other relevant provision of the state service operation work plans and Federal regulations.
- 20. The parties agrees to renegotiate this agreement in the event that the Department of Health, Education and Welfare or the New York State Department of Social Services issue new or revised requirements on the Department as a condition for receiving continued Federal or State reimbursement.
- 21. This agreement may be amended whenever determined necessary by the Department and Contractor. All amendments must be in writing, duly signed by both parties and be annexed to the contract.
- 22. This agreement contains all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties. All items incorporated by reference are to be attached. No other understandings, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this agreement, shall be deemed to exist or to bind any of the parties hereto.
- 23. The Contractor will retain all fees collected from eligible individuals required to pay such fees and will reduce its claim for Federal, State or County reimbursements by the amount of such fees determined by the Department to be due from such recipients. The collection of such fees is solely the responsibility of the Contractor.
 - 24. During the performance of this agreement, the Contractor agrees as follows:

The Contractor will not, on the grounds of age, race, color, or national origin:

Day Care Provider Day Care Services

a. deny an individual any services or other benefits provided under the program; b. provide any service(s) or other benefits to an individual which are different, or are provided in a different manner, from those provided to others under the program; c. subject an individual to segregation or separate treatment in any matter related to his receipt of any service(s) or other benefits provided under the program; d. restrict an individual in any way in the enjoyment of any advantage or privilege enjoyed by others receiving any service(s) or other benefits provided under the program;

e. treat an individual differently from others in determining whether he satisfies any eligibility or other requirements or condition which individuals must meet in order to receive any aid, care, service(s), or other benefits provided under the program; f. deny any individual an opportunity to participate in the program through the provision of services or otherwise, or will afford him an opportunity to do so which is different from that afforded others under the program.

25. During the performance of this contract, the Contractor agrees as follows:

a. The Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of age, race, creed, sex, color, or national origin, and will take affirmative action to insure that they are afforded equal employment opportunities without discrimination because of race, creed, sex, color or national origin. Such action shall be taken with reference, but not be limited to: recruitment, employment, job assignment, promotion, upgrading, demotion, transfer, layoff, or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection for training or retaining, including apprenticeship and on-the-job training.

b. The Contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has or is bound by a collective bargaining or other agreement or understanding, a notice to be provided by the State Division for Human Rights, advising such labor union or representative of the Contractor's agreement under clauses (a) through (g) (hereinafter called "non-discrimination clauses"). If the Contractor was directed to do so by the contracting agency as part of the bid or negotiation of this contract, the Contractor shall request such labor union or representative to furnish him with a written statement that such labor union or representative will not discriminate because of age, race, creed, sex, color or national origin and that such labor union or representative either will affirmatively cooperate, within the limits of its legal and contractual authority, in the implementation of the policy and provisions of these non-discrimination clauses or that it consents and agrees that recruitment, employment and the terms and conditions of employment under this contract shall be in accordance with the purposes and provisions of these non-discrimination clauses. If such labor union or representative fails or refuses to comply with such a request that it furnish such a statement, the contractor shall promptly notify the State Division for Human Rights of such failure or refusal.

- c. The Contractor will post and keep posted in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided by the State Division of Human Rights setting forth the substance of the provisions of clauses (a) and (b) and such provisions of the State's laws against discrimination as the State Commissioner of Human Rights shall determine.
- d. The Contractor will state, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Contractor, that all qualified applicants will be afforded equal employment opportunities without discrimination because of age, race, creed, sex, color or national origin.
- e. The Contractor will comply with the provisions of Sections 291-299 of the Executive Law and the Civil Rights Law, will furnish all information and reports deemed necessary by the State Commissioner of Human Rights under these non-discrimination clauses and such section of the Executive Law, and will permit access to his books, records and accounts by the State Commissioner of Human Rights, the Attorney General and the Industrial Commissioner for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with these non-discrimination clauses and such sections of the Executive Law and Civil Rights Law.
- f. This Contract may be forthwith canceled, terminated or suspended, in whole or in part, by the Department upon the basis of a finding made by the State Commissioner of Human Rights that the Contractor has not complied with these non-discrimination clauses, and the Contractor may be declared ineligible for further contracts made by or on behalf of the State or a public authority or agency of the State, until he satisfies the Commissioner of Human Rights that he has established and is carrying out a program in conformity with the provisions of these non-discrimination clauses. Such finding shall be made by the State Commissioner of Human Rights after conciliation efforts by the State Division for Human Rights have failed to achieve compliance with these non-discrimination clauses and after verified complaint has been filed with the State Division for Human Rights, notice thereof has been given to the Contractor and an opportunity has been afforded him to be heard publicly before the State Commissioner of Human Rights of his designee. Such sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked independently of or in addition to sanctions and remedies otherwise provided by law.
- g. The Contractor will include the provisions of clauses (a) through (f) in every subcontract or purchase order in such a manner that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor as to operations to be performed within the State of New York. The Contractor will take such action in enforcing such provisions of such subcontract or purchase order as the Department may direct, including sanctions or remedies for noncompliance. If the Contractor becomes involved in or is threatened with litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the contracting agency, the Contractor shall promptly so notify the Attorney General, requesting him to intervene and

protect the interest of the State of New York.

- 26. The Contractor agrees to be bound by the provisions of Section 103-a and 103-b of the General Municipal Law of the State of New York which provides in part: that upon the refusal of a person, when called before a grand jury, head of a state department, temporary state commission or other state agency, the organized crime task force in the Department of Law, head of a city department, or other city agency which is empowered to compel the attendance of witnesses and examine them under oath, to testify in an investigation concerning any transaction or contract had with the State, any political subdivision thereof, a public authority or with any public department, agency or officials of the state or of any political subdivision thereof or of a public authority, to sign a waiver of immunity against subsequent criminal prosecution or to answer any relevant question concerning such transaction or contract.
- a. The Contractor, its director, and officers, and any firm partnership or corporation of which they are a member, partner, director or officer shall be disqualified from thereafter selling to or submitting bids to or receiving awards from or entering into any contract with any municipal corporation or fire district, or any public department, agency or official thereof, for goods, work or services, for a period of five(5) years after such refusal and,
- b. This agreement and any and all other contracts made with any municipal corporation or any public department, agency or official thereof on or after the first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifty-nine or with any fire district or any agency or official thereof on or after the first day of September, nineteen hundred sixty, by such person, and by any firm, partnership, or officer may be canceled or terminated by the Department or municipal corporation or fire district without incurring any penalty of damages on account of such cancellation or termination, and any monies owed by the Department or municipal corporation or fire district for goods delivered or work done prior to the cancellation or termination shall be paid.
- c. The undersigned, as an officer of the Contractor expressly warrants and represents that neither he nor any member, director or officer of the Contractor, prior to the date of execution of this contract, has been called before the grand jury, head of a state department, temporary state commission or other state agency which is empowered to compel the attendance of witnesses and examine them under oath to testify in an investigation concerning any transaction or contract had with the State of New York any political subdivision thereof, a public authority or with any public department, agency or official of the State of New York or any political subdivision thereof, or of a public authority or of any fire district, and refused to sign a waiver of immunity against subsequent criminal prosecution or to answer any relevant question concerning such transaction or contract.
- 27. It is hereby agreed that the Contractor will secure compensation insurance to cover employees engaged under this contract in compliance with the provisions of the Workmen's

Compensation Law, and keep such employees insured during the life of this contract, and in default thereof, this contract shall be void and of no effect.

- 28. The relationship of the Contractor to the Department shall be that of independent contractor. The Contractor, in accordance with his status as an independent contractor, covenants and agrees that he will conduct himself in accordance with such status, that he will neither hold himself out as, nor claim to be, an officer or employee of the Department by reason thereof and that he will not by reason thereof, make any claim, demand or application to or for any right or privilege applicable to an officer or employee of the State, including, but not limited to workmen's compensation coverage, or retirement membership or credits.
- 29. The Department and Contractor agree that Contractor is an independent contractor, and not in any way deemed to be an employee of the Department or County of Oneida for any purpose including, but not limited to, claims for unemployment insurance, workers compensation, retirement or health benefits. The Contractor agrees to indemnify the Department and/or Oneida County for any loss the Department and/or Oneida County may suffer when such losses result from claims of any person or organization injured by the negligent acts of omission of Contractor, its officers and/or employees or subcontractors. Furthermore, the Contractor agrees to indemnify, defend, and save harmless the Department and/or Oneida County, and its officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims and losses occurring or resulting to any and all contractors, subcontractors, and any other person, firm, or corporation furnishing or supplying work, services, materials, or supplies in connection with the performance of the contract, and from all claims and losses occurring or resulting to any person, firm, or corporation who may be injured or damaged by the Contractor in the performance of the contract, and against any liability, including costs and expenses, for violation of proprietary rights, copyrights, or rights of privacy, arising out of the publication, translation, reproduction, delivery, performance, or use, or disposition of any data furnished under the contract or based on any libelous or other unlawful matter contained in such data or written materials in any form produced pursuant to the contract.
- 30. By submission of any bid in connection with this agreement, each bidder and each person signing on behalf of any bidder certified, and in the case of a joint bid each party thereto certified as to its own organization under penalty of perjury, that to the best of his knowledge and belief:
- (1). The prices in this bid have been arrived at independently without collusion, consultation, or agreement, for the purpose of restricting competition, as to any matter relating to such prices with any other bidder or with any competitor;
- (2). Unless otherwise required by law, the prices which have been quoted in this bid have not been knowingly disclosed by the bidder and will not knowingly be disclosed by the bidder prior to opening, directly or indirectly, to any other bidder to any competitor; and

(3). No attempt has been made or will be made by the bidder to induce any other person, partnership or corporation to submit or not to submit a bid for the purpose of restricting competition.

A bid shall not be considered for award nor shall any award be made where (1), (2) and (3) above have not been complied with; provided, however, that if in any case the bidder cannot make the foregoing certification, the bidder shall so state and shall furnish with the bid a signed statement which sets forth in detail the reasons therefor. Where (1), (2) and (3) above have not been complied with, the bid shall not be considered for award nor shall any award be made unless the head of the purchasing unit of the State, public department or agency to which the bid is made, or his designee, determines that such disclosure was not made for such items, or (c) has sold the same items to other customers at the same prices being bid, does not constitute, without more, a disclosure within the meaning of the immediate preceding paragraph.

APPENDIX A

The parties to the attached contract further agree to be bound by the following, which are hereby made a part of said contract.

- I. This contract may not be assigned by the contractor or its right, title or interest therein assigned, transferred, conveyed, sublet or disposed of without the previous consent, in writing, of the State.
- II. This contract shall be deemed executory only to the extent of money available to the State for the performance of the terms hereof and no liability on account thereof shall be incurred by the State of New York beyond moneys available for the purpose thereof.
- III. The contractor specifically agrees, as required by Labor Law, Sections 220 and 220-d, as amended that:
 - (a) no laborer, workman or mechanic, in the employ of the contractor, subcontractor or other person doing or contracting to do the whole or any part of the work contemplated by the contract shall be permitted or required to work more than eight hours in any one calendar day or more than five days in any one week, except in the emergencies set forth in the Labor Law.
 - (b) the wages paid for a legal day's work shall be not less than the prevailing rate of wages as defined by law.
 - (c) The minimum hourly rate of wages to be paid shall not be less than that stated in the specifications, and any redetermination of the prevailing rate of wages after the contract is approved shall be deemed to be incorporated herein by reference as of the effective date of redetermination and shall form a part of these contract documents.
 - (d) The Labor Law provides that the contract may forfeited and no sum paid for any work done thereunder on a second conviction for willfully paying less than—
 - (a) the stipulated wage scale as provided in Labor Law, Section 220, subdivision 3, as amended or
 - (b) less than the stipulated minimum hourly wage scale as provided in Labor Law, Section 220-d, as amended.
- IV. The contractor specifically agrees, as required by the provisions of the Labor Law, Section 220-e, as amended, that:
 - (a) in hiring of employees for the performance of work under this contract or any subcontract hereunder, or for the manufacture, sale or distribution of materials, equipment or supplies hereunder, no contractor, subcontractor, shall by reason of race, creed, color, sex or national origin discriminate against any citizen of the State of New York who is qualified and available to perform the work to which the employment relates.

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- (b) No contractor, subcontractor, nor any person on his behalf shall, in any manner, discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this contract on the account of race, creed, color, sex or national origin.
- (c) There may be deducted from the amount payable to the contractor by the State under this contract a penalty of five dollars for each person for each calendar day during which such person was discriminated against or intimidated in violation of the provisions of the contract, and
- (d) This contract may be cancelled or terminated by the State or municipality and all moneys due or to become due hereunder may be forfeited for a second or any subsequent violation of the terms or conditions of this section of the contract, and
- (e) The aforesaid provisions of this section covering every contract for or on behalf of the State or a municipality for the manufacture, sale or distribution of materials, equipment or supplies shall be limited to operations performed within the territorial limits of the State of New York.
- V. The contractor specifically agrees, as required by Executive Order # 45, dated Jan. 4, 1977, effective February 4, 1977, that:
 - (a) The contractor will not discriminate against employees or applicants for employment because of race, creed, color, national origin, sex, age, disability or marital status, and will undertake programs of affirmative action to insure that they are afforded equal employment opportunities without discrimination. Such action shall be taken with reference, but not limited to: recruitment, employment, job assignment, promotion, upgrading, demotion, transfer, layoff, or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection for training or retraining, including apprenticeship and onthe-job training.
 - (b) If the contractor is directed to do so by the contracting agency or the Office of State Contract Compliance (hereafter OSCC). - *(e) If the contractor does not comply with the equal opportunity provisions of this contract, with Executive Order # 45 (1977), or with such rules, regulations, or orders, this contract or any portion thereof, may be cancelled, terminated or suspended or payments thereon withheld, or the contractor may be declared ineligible for future State or State-assisted contracts, in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order #45 (1977), and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as are provided in said Executive Order or by rule, regulation or order issued pursuant thereto, or as otherwise provided by law.
- *(f) The contractor will include the provisions of clauses (a) through (e) above and all contract provisions promulgated by OSCC pursuant to Section 1.3 (b) of Executive Order # 45 (1977), in every non-exempt subcontract or purchase order in such a manner that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor as to its work force within the State of New York. The contractor will take such action in enforcing such provisions of such subcontract or purchase order as the contracting agency or the OSCC may direct, including sanctions or remedies for noncompliance. If the contractor becomes involved in or is threatened with litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction, the contractor shall promptly so notify the Attorney General, requesting him to intervene and protect the interests of the State of New York.

The contractor will comply with the provisions of Sections 291-299 of the Executive Law and the Civil Rights Law, will furnish all information and reports deemed necessary by the State Division of Human Rights under the Law, and will permit access to its books, records and accounts by the State Industrial Commissioner for the purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with the non-discrimination clauses, the Executive Law and Civil Rights Law.
- VII. (a) By submission of this bid, each bidder and each person signing on behalf of any bidder certifies, and in the case of a joint bid each party thereto

certifies as to its own organization, under penalty or perjury, that to the best of his knowledge and belief:

- 1) The prices in this bid have been arrived at independently without collusion, consultation, communication or agreement, for the purpose of restricting competition, as to any matter relating to such prices with any other bidder or with any competitor;
- 2) Unless otherwise required by law, the prices which have been quoted in this bid have not been knowingly disclosed by the bidder, and will not be disclosed by the bidder prior to opening, directly or indirectly, to any other bidder or to any competitor;
- 3) No attempt has been made or will be made by the bidder to induce any other person, partnership or corporation to submit or not to submit a bid for the purpose of restricting competition.

Where (a) (1) (2) and (3) above have not been complied with, the bid shall not be considered for award nor shall any award be made unless the head of the purchasing unit of the State, public department or agency to which the bid is made, or his designee, determines that such disclosure was not made for the purpose of restricting competition.

APPENDIX B

STANDARD CLAUSES FOR ALL ONEIDA COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES CONTRACTS

Personnel

- a. The Contractor agrees to be solely responsible for the recruitment, hiring, provision of employment benefits, payment of salaries and management of its project personnel. These functions shall be carried out in accordance with the provisions of this AGREEMENT, and all applicable Federal, State and County laws and regulations.
- b. It is the policy of the Department to encourage the employment of qualified applicants for, or recipients of public assistance by both public organization and private enterprises who are under contractual AGREEMENT to the Department for the provision of goods and services. Contractors will be expected to make best efforts in this area.
- c. The Contractor agrees to identify, in writing, the person(s) who will be responsible for directing the work to be done under this AGREEMENT. No change or substitution of such responsible person(s) will be made without prior approval in writing from the Department, to the degree that such change is within the reasonable control of the Contractor

Notices

- a. All notices permitted or required hereunder shall be in writing and shall be transmitted either by:
 - a. By certified or registered United States mail, return receipt requested;
 - b. By Facsimile transmission;
 - c. By personal delivery;
 - d. By expedited delivery service; or
 - e. By e-mail

Notices to the Department shall be addressed to the Commissioner of Social Services at the Address, Telephone Number, Facsimile Number or E-mail Address provided to the Contractor during contract development, or to such different Program Manager as the Department may for time-to time designate.

b. Any such notice shall be deemed to have been given either at the time of personal delivery or, in the case of expedited delivery service or certified or register United States mail, as of the date of first attempted delivery at the address and in the manner provided herein, or in the case of facsimile transmission or email, upon receipt.

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c. The parties may, from time to time, specify any new or different address in the United States as their address for purpose of receiving notice under this Agreement by giving fifteen (15) days written notice to the other party sent in accordance herewith. The Parties agree to mutually designate individuals as their respective representatives for the purposes of implementation and administration/billing, resolving issues and problems and/or for dispute resolution.

Office Services

- a. The contractor shall be responsible for the provision of necessary equipment and services for Contractor's staff, pursuant to and described in the narratives and budgets contained in the AGREEMENT.
- b. For Federally funded contracts, title to real property and non-expendable personal property whose requisition cost is borne in whole or in part by monies proved under this AGREEMENT shall be determined between the Contractor and the Department, pursuant to Federal regulations 45 CFR 92 unless such authority is otherwise inappropriate. Title to all equipment, supplies and material purchased with funds under this AGREEMENT under contracts which are not Federally funded shall be in the State of New York and the property shall not be transferred, conveyed, or disposed of without written approval of the Department. Upon expiration or termination of this Agreement, all property purchased with funds under this Agreement shall be returned to the Department, unless the Department has given direction for, or approval of, an alternative means of disposition in writing.
- c. Upon written direction by the Department, the Contractor shall maintain an inventory of those properties that are subject to the provisions of sub-paragraph b of this section

GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- a. The contractor agrees to comply in all respects with the provisions of this AGREEMENT and the attachments hereto. The Contractor specifically agrees to perform services according to the objectives, tasks, work plan and staffing plan contained in the AGREEMENT. Any modifications to the tasks or work plan contained in AGREEMENT must be mutually agreed to by both parties in writing before the additional or modified tasks or work plan shall commence.
- b. If any specific event or conjunction of circumstances threatens the successful completion of the project, in whole or in part, including where relevant, timely completion of milestones, the Contractor agrees to submit to the Department within three days of occurrence or perception of such problem, a written description thereof together with a recommended solution thereto.

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- c. The Contractor immediately shall notify in writing the Department Program Manager assigned to this contract of any unusual incident, occurrence or event that involves the staff, volunteers or officers of the Contractor, and subcontractor or Program participant funded through this contract, including but not limited to the following: death or serious injury; an arrest or possible criminal activity; and destruction of property; significant damage to the physical plant of the Contractor, or other matters of a similarly serious nature.
- d. In providing these services, the Contractor hereby agrees to be responsible for designing and operating these services, and otherwise performing, so as to maximize Federal financial participation to the Department under the Federal Social Security Act.
- e. If funds from this contract will be used to pay any costs associated with the provision of legal services of any sort, the following shall apply;
 - No litigation shall be brought against the State of New York, the New York State Office of Children and Family Services, or against Oneida County or the Department or other local government or local social services district with funds provided under this contract. The term "litigation" shall include commencing or threatening to commence a lawsuit joining or threatening to join as a party to ongoing litigation, or requesting any relief from either the State of New York, the New York State Office of Children and Family Services or Oneida County or other local government or local social services district, based upon any agreement between such agency in litigation with another party and such party, during pendency of the litigation.
 - Opinions prepared by consultant law firms construing the statues of Constitution of the State of New York do not constitute the view of the State unless the prior written approval of the Attorney General is obtained. Requests for said approval shall be submitted to the Solicitor General, Division of the appeals and Opinions Bureau, department of Law, The Capital, Albany, New York 12224
 - The Contractor shall provide to the Department in a format provided by the Department such additional information concerning the provision of legal services as the Department shall require.
- f. The Department will designate a contract Manager who shall have authority relating to the technical services and operational functions of this AGREEMENT and activities completed or contemplated there under. The Contract Manager and those individuals designated by him/her in writing shall have the prerogative to make announced or unannounced on-site visits to the project. Project reports and issues of interpretation or direction relating to this AGREEMENT shall be directed to the Contract Manager.

- Except where the Department otherwise authorizes or directs in writing, the Contractor agrees not to enter into any subcontracts, or revisions to subcontracts, for the performance of the obligations contained herein until it has received the prior written approval of the Department, which shall have the right to review and approve each and every subcontract prior to giving written approval to the contractor to enter into the subcontract. All AGREEMENTS between the Contractor and subcontractors shall be by written contract, signed by individuals authorized to bind the parties. All such subcontracts shall contain provisions for specifying (1) that the work performed by the subcontractor must be in accordance with the terms of this AGREEMENT (2) that nothing contained in the subcontract shall impair the rights of the Department under this AGREEMENT, (3) that nothing contained in the subcontract, nor under this AGREEMENT, shall be deemed to create any contractual relationship between the subcontractor and the Department, and (4) incorporating all provisions regarding the rights of the Department as set forth in Agreement, where applicable. The Contractor specifically agrees that he Contractor shall be fully responsible to the Department for the acts and omissions of subcontractors and of persons either directly or indirectly employed by them, as it is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by the Contractor.
- h. The Contractor warrants that it, its staff and any and all Subcontractors which must be approved by the Department, have all the necessary licenses, approvals and certifications currently required by the law of any applicable local, state or federal government to perform the services pursuant to this AGREEMENT and/or subcontract entered into under this AGREEMENT. The contractor further agrees such required licenses, approvals and certificates will be kept in full force and effect during the term of this Agreement, or any extension thereof, and to secure any new licenses, approvals or certificates within the required time frames and/or to require its staff and Subcontractors to obtain and requisite licenses, approvals or certificates. In the event the contractor, its staff, and/or Subcontractors are notified of a denial or revocation of any license, approval or certification to perform the services under the AGREEMENT, Contractor will immediately notify the Department.
- i. This Agreement cannot be assigned by the Contractor to a subcontractor without obtaining written approval of the Department. Prior to executing a subcontract agreement the Contractor agrees to provide the Department the information the Department needs to determine whether a proposed Subcontractor is a responsible vendor. The Determination of Vendor responsibility will be made in accordance with Section n. of General Terms and Conditions
- j. If the Contractor intends to use materials, equipment or personnel paid for under this contract in a revenue generating activity, the Contractor shall report such intentions to the Department forthwith and shall be subject to the direction of the Department as to the disposition of such revenue.

- k. Any interest accrued on funds paid to the Contractor by the Department shall be deemed to be the property of the Department and shall either be credited to the Department at the termination of this AGREEMENT or expended on additional services provided for under this AGREEMENT.
- 1. The Contractor ensures that the grounds, structures, building and furnishings at the program site(s) used under this AGREEMENT are maintained in good repair and free from any danger to health or safety and that any building or structure used for program services complies with all applicable zoning, building, health, sanitary, and fire codes.
- m. The Contractor agrees to produce, and retain for the balance of the calendar year in which produced, and for a period of six years thereafter, any and all records necessary to substantiate upon audit, the proper deposit and expenditure of funds received under this contract. Such records shall include, but not be limited to, original books of entry (e.g., cash disbursements and cash receipts journal), and the following specific records (as applicable) to substantiate the types of expenditures noted:
 - a) Payroll Expenditures: cancelled checks and the related bank statements, time and attendance records, payroll journals, employee personal history folders, and cost allocation plans, if applicable.
 - b) Payroll Taxes and Fringe Benefits: cancelled checks, copies of related bank statements, reporting forms, and invoices for Fringe Benefit expenses.
 - c) Non-Personal Services Expenditures: original invoices/receipts, cancelled checks and related bank statements, consultant agreements, leases, and cost allocation plans, if applicable
 - d) Receipt and Deposit of Advance and Reimbursements: Itemized bank stamped deposit slips, and a copy of the related bank statements.
 - e) The Contractor agrees that any equipment purchased with funds under this agreement is the property of the Department and will remain with or will be returned to the Department in the event of the termination of this Agreement,

Although not required, the Department recommends that the Contractor retain records directly pertinent to this contract for a period of ten (10) years after the end of the calendar year in which they were made, as the statute of limitations for the New York False Claims Act is ten years.

n. By signing this contract, the Contractor certifies that within the past three years the contractor has engaged in no actions that would establish a basis for a finding by the Department that the contractor is a non-responsible vendor or, if the contractor has engaged in any such action or actions, that all such actions have been disclosed to the Department prior to entering into this Contract. The actions that would potentially establish a basis for a finding by Department that the contractor is a non-responsible vendor include:

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- The Contractor has had a license or contract suspended, revoked or terminated by a governmental agency.
- The Contractor has had a claim, lien, fine, or penalty imposed or secured against the Contractor by a governmental agency.
- The Contractor has initiated a bankruptcy proceeding or such a proceeding has been initiated against the Contractor
- The Contractor has been issued a citation, notice, or violation order by a governmental agency finding the Contractor to be in violation of any local, state, or federal laws.
- The Contractor has been advised by a governmental agency that a determination to issue a citation, notice or violation order finding the Contractor to be in violation of any local, state or federal laws is pending before a governmental agency
- The contractor has not paid all due and owed local, state and federal taxes to the proper authorities
- The contractor has engaged in any other actions of a similarly serious nature.

Where the Contractor has disclosed any of the above to the Department, Department may require as a condition precedent to entering into the contract that the Contractor agree to such additional conditions as will be necessary to satisfy the Department that the vendor is and will remain a responsible vendor. By signing this contract, the Contractor agrees to comply with any such additional conditions that have been made a part of this contract.

By signing this contract, the contractor also agrees that during the term of the contract, the Contractor will promptly notify the Department if the Contractor engages in any actions that would establish a basis for a finding by Department that the Contractor is a non-responsible vendor, as described above.

- o. By signing this contract, the contractor agrees to comply with State Tax Law section 5-a
- p. Contractors must maintain Workers Compensation Insurance in accordance with the Workers Compensation Law. If a contractor believes they are exempt from the Workers Compensation insurance requirement then they must apply for an exemption. - q. All organizations that receive Federal financial assistance under social service programs are prohibited from discriminating against beneficiaries or prospective beneficiaries of the social service programs on the basis of religion or religious belief. Accordingly, organizations, in providing services supported in whole or in part with Federal financial assistance, and in their outreach activities related to such services, are not allowed to discriminate against current or prospective program beneficiaries on the basis of

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religion, a religious belief, a refusal to hold a religious belief, or a refusal to attend or participate in a religious practice.

Organizations that engage in explicitly religious activities (including activities that involve overt religious content such as worship, religious instruction, or proselytization) must perform such activities and offer such services outside of programs that are supported with direct Federal financial assistance (including through prime awards or sub-awards), separately in time or location from any such programs or services supported with direct Federal financial assistance, and participation in any such explicitly religious activities must be voluntary for the beneficiaries of the social service program supported with such Federal financial assistance

REPORTS AND DELIVERABLES

The Contractor shall prepare and submit all reports, documents, and projects required by this AGREEMENT to the Office's Contract Manager for review and approval. These reports shall be in such substance, from, and frequency as required by the Department and as necessary to meet State, Federal and County requirements.

The Contractor shall complete Contract Evaluations as required by the Department as well as Statistical Data as needed by the Department and New York State to meet the reporting requirements.

CONFIDENTIALITY AND PROTECTION ON HUMAN SUBJECTS

- a. The Contractor agrees to safeguard the confidentiality of financial and/or client information relating to individuals and their families who may receive services in the course of this project. The Contractor shall maintain the confidentiality of all such financial and/or client information with regard to services provided under this AGREEMENT in conformity with the provisions of applicable State, Federal, and County laws and regulations. Any breach of confidentiality by the Contractor, its agents or representatives shall be cause for immediate termination of this AGREEMENT.
- b. Any contractor who will provide goods and/or services to a residential facility or program operated by Department agrees to require all of its employees and volunteers who will have the potential for regular and substantial contact with youth in the care or custody of the Department to sign a Employee Confidentiality Certification and employee Background Certification before any such employees and volunteers are permitted access to youth in the care or custody of the Department and/or any financial and/or client identifiable information concerning such youth. Additionally, Department will require a database check of the State wide Central Register of Child Abuse and Maltreatment (SCR) of each employee and volunteer of the Contractor who has the potential for regular and substantial contract with children in the care or custody of the

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Department. Any other Contractor whose employees and volunteers will have access to financial and/or client identifiable information concerning youth in the care or custody of Department agrees to require all such employees and volunteers to sign a Employee Confidentiality Certification before any such employees and volunteers are permitted access to any financial and/or client identifiable information concerning such youth.

c. Contractor and any subsequent sub-contractor shall not discriminate or refuse assistance to individuals with AIDS or an HIV infection or an HIV - related illness.

The Contractor and any subsequent sub-contractor agrees that their staff to whom confidential HIV - related information may be given as a necessity for providing services and in accordance with 403 of Title 18 NYSDSS regulation and Section 2782 of the Public Health Law are fully informed of the penalties and fines for redisclosure in violations of State Law and Regulations.

The Contractor and any subsequent sub-contractor must include the following written statement when disclosing any confidential HIV - related information.

"This information has been disclosed to you from confidential records which are protected by State Law. State Law prohibits you from making any further disclosure of this information without the specific written consent of the person to whom it pertains, or as otherwise permitted by law. Any unauthorized further disclosure in violation of State Law may result in a fine or jail sentence or both. A general authorization for the release of medical or other information is not sufficient authorization for further disclosure."

- d. All information contained in the Contractors, or it's sub-contractor's files shall be held confidential pursuant to the applicable provisions of the Social Services Law and any State Department Regulations promulgated thereunder, including 18 NY CRR Sec. 357.5 and 423.7, as well as any applicable Federal Laws and any regulations promulgated thereunder and shall not be disclosed except as authorized by law.
- e. The Contractor and all Contract Staff that are subject to the Oneida County computer systems/databases shall complete the Oneida County Department of Social Services Confidentiality and Non-Disclosure Agreement provided with this agreement and shall submit forms to the following address:

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- a. The results of any activity supported under this AGREEMENT may not be published without prior written approval of the Department, which results (1) shall acknowledge the support of the Department and the County and, if funded with Federal funds, the applicable federal funding agency, and (2) shall state that the opinions, results, findings and/or interpretations of data contained therein are the responsibility of the Contractor and do not necessarily represent the opinions, interpretation or policy of the Department or Oneida County.
- b. The Department and Oneida County expressly reserve the right to a royalty-free, non-exclusive and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, distribute or otherwise use, in perpetuity, any and all copyrighted or copyrightable material resulting from this AGREEMENT or activity supported by this AGREEMENT. All publications by the Contractor covered by this AGREEMENT shall expressly acknowledge the Department's right to such license.
- c. All of the license rights so reserved to the Department and Oneida County under this paragraph are equally reserved to the United States Department of Health and Human Services and subject to the provisions on copyrights contained in 45 CFR 92 if the AGREEMENT is federally funded
- d. The Contractor agrees that at the completion of any scientific or statistical study, report or analysis prepared pursuant to this AGREEMENT, it will provide to the Department at no additional cost a copy of any and all data supporting the scientific or statistical study, report or analysis, together with the name(s) and business address(es) of the principal(s) producing the scientific or statistical study, report or analysis. The Contractor agrees and acknowledges the right of the Department, subject to applicable confidentiality restrictions, to release the name(s) and business address(es) producing the scientific or statistical study, report or analysis, together with a copy of the scientific or statistical study, report or analysis and all data supporting the scientific or statistical study, report or analysis.

PATENTS AND INVENTIONS

The Contractor agrees that any all inventions, conceived or first actually reduced to practice in the course of, or under this AGREEMENT, or with monies supplied pursuant to this AGREEMENT, shall be promptly and fully reported to the DEPARTMENT. Determination as to ownership and/or disposition of rights to such inventions, including whether a patent application shall be filed, and if so, the manner of obtaining, administering and disposing of rights under any patent application or patent which may be issued, shall be made pursuant to all applicable law and regulations.

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TERMINATION

- a. This AGREEMENT may be terminated by the DEPARTMENT upon thirty (30) days prior written notice to the Contractor. Such notice is to me made by way of registered or certified mail return receipt requested or hand delivered with receipt granted by the Contractor. The date of such notice shall be deemed to be the date the notice is received by the contractor established by the receipt returned, if delivery by registered or certified mail, or by the receipt granted by the Contractor, if the notice is delivered by hand. The Department agrees to pay the Contractor for reasonable and appropriate expenses incurred in good faith before the date of termination of this AGREEMENT.
- If the Contractor fails to use any real property or equipment purchased pursuant to b. this AGREEMENT or the Contractor ceases to provide the services specified in the AGREEMENT for which the equipment was purchased, the Department may terminate this AGREEMENT upon thirty (30) days written notice to the Contractor, where the Contractor has failed to cure as set forth hereafter, Said notice of breach and shall be sent by way of registered or certified mail return receipt requested, or shall be delivered by hand, receiving Contractor's receipt therefore. Said notice shall specify the Contractor's breach and shall demand that such breach be cured. Upon failure of the Contractor to comply with such demand within thirty (30) days, or such longer period as may be specified therein, the Department may, upon written notice similarly served, immediately terminate this AGREEMENT, termination to be effective upon the date of receipt of such notice established by the receipt returned to the Department. Upon such termination, the Department may require (a) the repayment to the Department of any monies previously paid to the Contractor, or (b) return of any real property or equipment purchased under the terms of this AGREEMENT or an appropriate combination of (a) and (b), at the Department's option.
- c. To the extent permitted by law, this AGREEMENT shall be deemed in the sole discretion of the Department terminated immediately upon the filling of a petition in bankruptcy or insolvency, by or against the Contractor. Such termination shall be immediate and complete, without termination costs or further obligation by the Department to the Contractor
- d. Should the Department determine that Federal, State or County funds are limited or become unavailable for any reason, the Department may reduce that total amount of funds payable to the Contractor, reduce the contract period or deem this contract terminated immediately. The Department agrees to give notice to the Contractor as soon as it becomes aware that funds are unavailable, in the event of termination under this paragraph. If the initial notice is oral notification, the Department shall

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follow this up immediately with written notice. The Department will be obligated to pay the Contractor only for the expenditures made and obligations incurred by the Contractor until such time as notice of termination is received either orally or in writing by the Contractor from the Department.

The Contractor shall provide to the Department such information as is required by e. the Department in order that the Department may determine whether the Contractor is a responsible vendor for purposes of compliance with section 163 of the State Finance Law and requirements of the Department. If there is any change in any of the vendor responsibility information provided to the Department by the Contractor at any time during their term of this Agreement, the Contractor shall be required to immediately notify the Department so that the Department may assess whether the Contractor continues to be a responsible vendor. Should the Contractor fail to notify the Department of any change in the vendor responsibility information or should the Department otherwise determine that the Contractor has ceased to be a responsible vendor for the purposes of this AGEEMENT, the Department may terminate this AGREEMENT upon thirty (30 days written notice to the Contractor. Said notice of termination shall be sent by way of registered or certified mail return receipt requested, or shall be delivered by hand, receiving Contractor's receipt therefore. Said notice shall specify the reason(s) that the Contractor has been found to no longer be a responsible vendor.

Upon determination that the Contractor is no longer a responsible vendor the Department may, in its discretion and as an alternative to termination pursuant to this paragraph, notify the contractor of the determination that the Contractor has ceased to be a responsible vendor and set forth the corrective action that will be required of the Contractor to maintain the contract. Should the Contractor fail to comply with the required corrective action within thirty (30 days of the date of notification, or such longer period as may be specified therein, the Department may, upon written notice similarly served, immediately terminate this AGREEMENT, termination to be effective upon the date of receipt of such notice established by the receipt returned to the Department. Upon such termination, the Department may require (a) the repayment to the Department of any monies previously paid to the Contractor, (b) return of any real property or equipment purchased under the terms of this AGREEMENT, or an appropriate combination of (a) and (b) at the Department's option.

CONTRACTOR COMPLIANCE

The Contractor agrees to provide an Annual Certification pertaining to this Contract as part of the Contractor's Annual Independent audit.

The Department shall have the right to audit or review the Contractor's performance and

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operations as related to this AGREEMENT, or has abused or misused funds paid to the contractor, or it the Contractor has violated or is in non-compliance with any term of any other AGEEMENT with the Department, or has abused or misused funds paid to the Contractor under any other AGREEMENT with the Department, the rights of the Department shall include, but not be limited to:

- Recovery of any funds expended in violation of the AGREEMENT;
- Suspension of Payments
- Termination of the AGREEMENT; and/or
- Employment of another entity to fulfill the requirements of the AGREEMENT.

The Contractor shall be liable for all reasonable costs incurred on account thereof, including payment of any cost differential for employing such entity. The Contractor will assist the Department in transferring the operation of the Contracted services to any other entity selected by the Department in a manner that will enable the Department or clients to continue to receive services in an on-going basis, including, but not limited to , notifying clients of the new entity to which the services will be transferred and the effective date of the transfer, providing the new entity promptly and at no charge with a complete copy of the clients' and all other records necessary to continue the provision of the transferred services, and transferring any equipment purchased with funds provided under this AGREEMENT.

Nothing herein shall preclude the Department from taking actions otherwise available to it under law.

The Contractor agrees to cooperate fully with any audit or investigation the Department or any agent of the Department may conduct and to provide access during normal business hours to any and all information necessary to perform its audit or investigation. The Contractor shall also allow the Department, and any representatives specifically directed by the Department to take possession of all books, records and documents relating to this AGREEMENT without prior notice to the Contractor. The Department will return all such books, records and documents to the Contractor upon completion the official purposes for which they were taken.

The Contractor agrees that all AGREEMENTS between the Contractor and a subcontractor or consultants for the performance of any obligations under the AGREEMENT will be by written contract (subcontract) which will contain provisions including, but not limited to, the above specified rights of the Department.

FISCAL SANCTION

In accordance with the Department, contractors may be placed on fiscal sanction when the Department identifies any of the following issues:

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- The Contractor has received an Advance, overpayment or other funds under this or another agreement that has not been refunded to the Department within the established timeframe;
- An Department or other audit identifies significant fiscal irregularities and/or that funds are due to the Department
- The Contractor has not provided satisfactory services as required under the terms of this or another Department agreement;
- The Contractor has not provided fiscal or program reports as required under the terms of this or another Department agreement;
- A County, State or Federal prosecutorial or investigative agency identifies possible criminal activity, or significant fiscal or programmatic irregularities on the part of the Contractor;
- The Contractor is not in compliance with State, Federal, or County statutes or regulations, or applicable Department guidelines, policies and/or procedures; or
- Unsafe physical conditions exist at a program site operated by the Contractor and funded under an agreement with the Department

Once the Contractor has been placed on Fiscal Sanction, payments on all open contracts and any new awards, amendments or contract renewals will not be processed until the issues have been satisfactorily resolved. The contractor will be notified in advance of any proposed Fiscal sanction and will be provided a timeframe within which the issues must be resolved in order to avoid Fiscal Sanction. Issues that are not resolved within the timeframe established by the Department may be referred to the Attorney General (AG) for collection of legal action. If a contract is referred to the AG a collection fee will be added to the amount owed. In addition, interest will be due on any amount not paid in accordance with the timeframes established by the AG. The contractor will remain on Fiscal Sanction until the amount owed, including any collection fee and interest is paid.

ADDITIONAL ASSURANCES

a. The Department and Contractor agree that Contractor is an independent contractor, and not in any way deemed to be an employee of the Department or County of Oneida for any purpose including, but not limited to, claims for unemployment insurance, workers compensation, retirement or health benefits. The Contractor agrees to defend and indemnify the Department and/or Oneida County for any loss the Department and/or Oneida County may suffer when such losses result from claims of any person or organization injured by the negligent acts or omissions of Contractor, its officers and/or employees or subcontractors. Furthermore, the Contractor agrees to indemnify, defend, and save harmless the Department and/or Oneida County, and its officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims and losses occurring or resulting from any and all contractors, subcontractors, and any other person, firm, or corporation furnishing or supplying work, services, materials, or supplies in connection with the performance of

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the contract, and from all claims and losses occurring or resulting to any person, firm, or corporation who may be injured or damaged by the Contractor in the performance of the contract, and against any liability, including costs and expenses, for violation of proprietary rights, copyrights, or rights of privacy, arising out of the publication, translation, reproduction, delivery, performance, or use, or disposition of any data furnished under the contract or based on any libelous or other unlawful matter contained in such data or written materials in any form produced pursuant to the contract.

b. The Contractor, if a municipal corporation, represents that it is a self-insured entity. If a not-for-profit Corporation or entity other than a self-insured municipal Corporation, the Contractor agrees to obtain and maintain in effect a general policy of liability insurance in an amount not less than one million dollars (\$ 1,000,000). The Contractor agrees that it will require any and all Subcontractors with whom it subcontracts pursuant to this contract to obtain and maintain a general policy of liability insurance in an amount not less than one million dollars (\$ 1,000,000). The Contractor further agrees to procure and maintain in force, for the duration of this Agreement, insurance in types and in the amounts as determined by the Department. Such coverage must be identified and entered upon a Standard Insurance Certificate or its acceptable substitute and be signed by the Contractor's Agency's insurance company, agent or broker.

The Contractor agrees that it will, at its own expense, at all times during the term of this agreement, maintain in force a policy of insurance which will insure against liability for property damage and/or injury/death with regard to any property of persons. The liability and property damage coverage of such insurance shall not be less than One Million dollars (\$ 1,000,000). The Contractor agrees to have the Department and Oneida County added to said insurance policies as named additional insured, as their interest may appear, and to provide the Department and/or Oneida County with a certificate from said insurance company, or companies, showing coverage as herein before required, such certification to show the Department and the Oneida County as additional insured and to provide that such coverage shall not be terminated without written prior notice to the to the Department and/or Oneida County of at least thirty (30) days.

The Contractor further agrees that the Department has the right to take whatever action it deems appropriate, including, but not limited to, the removal of the Contractor from the rotation list, the removal of clients, the cessation of client referrals, and termination of this Agreement, if the Contractor fails to submit a completed and signed Standard Insurance Certificate or its acceptable substitute, which is subsequently approved by the Oneida County Department of Law, prior to the expiration of its insurance coverage.

RENEWAL NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS

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Options to renew the contract are at the discretion of the Department, which shall supply written notice of such renewal or termination within 30 days of the expiration date. The Commissioner of Social Services reserves the right to evaluate the job performance and availability of funding.

COMPLIANCE WITH LAW

The Contractor represents and agrees to comply with the requirements of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 as amended, the Age Discrimination Employment Act of 1964 as amended, the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973 as amended, and Executive Order No. 11246, entitled "Equal Employment Opportunity" as amended by Executive Order No. 11375 and as supplemented in Department of Labor Relations, 41CFR Part 60.

The Contractor also agrees to comply with Federal and State Laws as supplemented in the Dept. of Labor regulations and any other regulations of the Federal and State entities relating to such employment and Civil Rights requirements.

As a mandated reporting agency, all instances of suspected child abuse, neglect and/or maltreatment, will be reported to the Central Registry as required by law. These verbal reports will be followed by submission of completed 2221A to the local Department of Social Services. The family will be informed in advance of the Agency's decision to file a report with the Central Register.

The Contractor attest they have not been disbarred by the Federal Government from contracting to provide services funded by any Federal money.

The obligations of the parties hereunder are conditioned upon the continued availability of Federal and/or New York State Funds for the purposes set forth in this Agreement.

Should funds become unavailable or should appropriate Federal or New York State officials fail to approve sufficient funds for completion of the services or programs set forth in this Agreement, the Department shall have the option to immediately terminate this Agreement upon providing written notice to the Contractor. In such an event, the Department shall be under no further obligation to the Contractor other than payment for costs actually incurred prior to termination and in no event will the Department be responsible for any actual or consequential damages as a result of termination.

This Agreement contains all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties. All items incorporated by reference are to be attached. No other understandings, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this Agreement, shall be deemed to exist or to bind any of the parties hereto. No wavier, alterations or modifications of and provisions of this Agreement shall be binding unless in writing and signed by the duly authorized representative of the parties sought to be bound.

ADDENDUM

THIS ADDENDUM, entered into on this <u>1st</u> day of <u>October, 2013</u>, between the County of Oneida, hereinafter known as COUNTY, and a contractor, subcontractor, vendor, vendee, licensor, licensee, lessor, lessee or any third party, hereinafter known as CONTRACTOR.

WHEREAS, COUNTY and CONTRACTOR have entered into a contract, license, lease, amendment or other agreement of any kind (hereinafter referred to as the "Contract"), and

WHEREAS, the Oneida County Attorney and the Oneida County Director of Purchasing have recommended the inclusion of the standard clauses set forth in this Addendum to be included in every Contract for which COUNTY is a party, now, thereafter,

The parties to the attached Contract, for good consideration, agree to be bound by the following clauses which are hereby made a part of the Contract.

1. Executor or Non-Appropriation Clause.

The County shall have no liability or obligation under this Contract to the Contractor or to anyone else beyond the annual funds being appropriated and available for this Contract.

2. Oneida County Board of Legislators: Resolution #249 Solid Waste Disposal Requirements.

Pursuant to Oneida County Board of Legislator Resolution No. 249 of May 26, 1999, the Contractor agrees to deliver exclusively to the facilities of the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority, all waste and recyclables generated within the Authority's service area by performance of this Contract by the Contractor and any subcontractors. Upon awarding of this Contract, and before work commences, the Contractor will be required to provide Oneida County with proof that Resolution No. 249 of 1999 has been complied with, and that all wastes and recyclables in the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority's service area which are generated by the Contractor and any subcontractors in performance of this Contract will be delivered exclusively to Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority facilities.

- 3. Certification Regarding Lobbying; Debarment, Suspension and other Responsibility Matters; and Drug-Free Workplace Requirements.
- a. Lobbying. As required by Section 1352, Title 31 of the U.S. Code and implemented at 34 CFR Part 82 for persons entering into a grant or cooperative agreement over \$100,000, as defined at 34 CFR Part 82, Section 82.105 and 82.110, the Contractor certifies that:
 - 1. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the Contractor, to any persons for influencing or attempting to influence an officer

- or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, and officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the making of any Federal Grant, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal grant or cooperative agreement.
- 2. If any funds other than federally appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this federal grant or cooperative agreement, the Contractor shall complete and submit Standard Form 111 "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.
- 3. The Contractor shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all subcontracts and that all subcontractors shall certify and disclose accordingly.
- b. Debarment, Suspension and other Responsibility Matters. As required by Executive Order 12549, Debarments and Suspension, and implemented at 34 CFR Part 85, for prospective participants in primary covered transactions, as defined at 34 CFR Part 85, Sections 83.105 and 85.110,
 - 1. The Contractor certifies that it and its principals:
 - a. Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any Federal department or agency;
 - b. Have not within a three-year period preceding this Contract been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (Federal, State or local) transaction or contracts under a public transaction, violation of federal or State antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements, or receiving stolen property;
 - c. Are not presently indicated or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a Government entity (Federal, State or local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in paragraph 1(b) of this certification; and
 - d. Have not within a three-year period preceding this Contract had one or more public transactions (Federal, State, or local) for cause or default; and
 - 2. Where the Contractor is unable to certify to any of the statements in this certification, he or she shall attach an explanation to this Contract.
- c. Drug-Free Workplace (Contractors other than individuals). As required by the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988, and implemented at 34 CFR Part 85, Subpart F, for Contractors, as defined at 34 CFR Part 85, Sections 85.605 and 85.610:
 - 1. The Contractor will or will continue to provide a drug-free workplace by:

- a. Publishing a statement notifying employees that the manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the Contractor's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violation of such prohibition;
- b. Establishing an on-going drug-free awareness program to inform employees about:
 - 1. The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
 - 2. The Contractor's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
 - 3. Any available drug counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance program; and
 - 4. The penalties that may be imposed upon an employee for drug abuse violation occurring in the workplace;
- c. Making it a requirement that each employee to be engaged in the performance of the Contract be given a copy of the statement required by paragraph (a);
- d. Notifying the employee in the statement required by paragraph (a) that as a condition of employment under the Contract, the employee will:
 - 1. Abide by the terms of the statement; and
 - 2. Notify the employer in writing of his or her conviction for a violation of a criminal drug statue occurring in the workplace no later than five (5) calendar days after such conviction;
- e. Notifying the County, in writing within ten (10) calendar days after having received notice under subparagraph (d)(2) from an employee or otherwise receiving actual notice of such conviction. Employers of convicted employees must provide notice, including position title, to: Director Grants Management Bureau, State Office Building Campus, Albany, New York 12240. Notice shall include the identification number(s) of each affected contract.
- f. Taking one of the following actions, within thirty (30) calendar days of receiving notice under subparagraph (d)(2), with respect to any employee who is so convicted;
 - 1. Taking appropriate personnel action against such an employee, up to and including termination, consistent with the Requirements of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended; or
 - 2. Requiring such employee to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by a Federal, State or local health, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency;
- g. Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of paragraphs (a),(b),(c),(d),(e),(f).
- 2. The Contractor may insert in the space provided below the site(s) for the performance of work done in connection with the specific contract.

- d. Drug-Free Workplace (Contractors who are individuals). As required by the Drug-Free Workplace act of 1988, and implemented at 34 CFR Part 85, Subpart F. for Contractors, as defined at 34 CFR Part 85, Sections 85.605 and 85.610:
 - 1. As a condition of the contract, the Contractor certifies that he or she will not engage in the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance in conducting any activity with the Contract; and
 - 2. If convicted of a criminal drug offense resulting from a violation occurring during the conduct of any contract activity, the Contractor will report the conviction, in writing, within ten (10) calendar days of the conviction, to: Director, Grants Management Bureau, State Office Building Campus, Albany, NY 12240. Notice shall include the identification number(s) of each affected Contract.

4. Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPPA).

When applicable to the services provided pursuant to the Contract:

- a. The Contractor, as a Business Associate of the County, shall comply with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, hereinafter referred to as "HIPAA," as well as all regulations promulgated by the Federal Government in furtherance thereof, to assure the privacy and security of all protected health information exchanged between the Contractor and the County. In order to assure such privacy and security, the Contractor agrees to enact the following safeguards for protected health information:
 - 1. Establish policies and procedures, in written or electronic form, that are reasonably designed, taking into consideration the size of, and the type of activities undertaken by, the Contractor, to comply with the Standards for Privacy of Individual Identifiable Health Information, commonly referred to as the Privacy Rule;
 - 2. Utilize a combination of electronic hardware and computer software in order to securely store, maintain, transmit, and access, protected health information electronically; and
 - 3. Utilize an adequate amount of physical hardware, including but not limited to filing cabinets, and locks on drawers, cabinets, and office doors, in order to prevent unwarranted and illegal access to computers and paper files that contain protected health information of the County's clients.
- b. This agreement does not authorize the Contractor to use or further disclose the protected health information that the Contractor handles in treating patients of the County in any

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manner that would violate the requirements of 45 CFR § 164.504(e), if that same use or disclosure were done by the County, except that:

- 1. The Contractor may use and disclose protected health information for the Contractor's own proper management and administration; and
- 2. The Contractor may provide data aggregation services relating to the health care operations of the County.
- c. The Contractor shall:
 - 1. Not use or further disclose protected health information other than as permitted or required by this contract or as required by law;
 - 2. Use appropriate safeguards to prevent the use or disclosure of protected health information other than as provided for in this Contract;
 - 3. Report to the County any use or disclosure of the information not provided for by this Contract of which the Contractor becomes aware;
 - 4. Ensure that any agents, including a subcontractor, to whom the Contractor provides protected health information received from, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of, the County agrees to the same restrictions and conditions that apply to the Contractor with respect to such protected health information;
 - 5. Make available protected health information in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.524;
 - 6. Make available protected health information for amendment and incorporate any amendments to protected health information in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528;
 - 7. Make available the information required to provide an accounting of disclosures in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528;
 - 8. Make its internal practices, books, and records relating to the use and disclosure of protected health information received from, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of, the County available to the Secretary of Health and Human Services for purposes of determining the County's compliance with 45 CFR § 164.504(e)(2)(ii); and
 - 9. At the termination of this Contract, if feasible, return or destroy all protected health information received from, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of, the County that the Contractor still maintains in any form and retain no copies of such information or, if such return or destruction is not feasible, extend the protections of this Contract to such information and limit further uses and disclosures to those purposes that make the return or destruction of the information infeasible.
- d. The Contractor agrees that this contract may be amended if any of the following events occurs:
 - 1. HIPAA, or any of the regulations promulgated in furtherance thereof, is modified by Congress or the Department of Health and Human Services;

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- 2. HIPAA, or any of the regulations promulgated in furtherance thereof, is interpreted by a court in a manner impacting the County's HIPAA compliance; or
- 3. There is a material change in the business practices and procedures of the County.
- e. Pursuant to 45 CFR § 164.504(e)(2)(iii), the County is authorized to unilaterally terminate this Contract if the County determines that the Contractor has violated a material term of this Contract.

5. Non-Assignment Clause.

In accordance with Section 109 of the General Municipal Law, this Contract may not be assigned by the Contractor or its right, title or interest therein assigned, transferred, conveyed, sublet or otherwise disposed of without the County's previous written consent, and attempts to do so are null and void. The Contractor may, however, assign its right to receive payments without the County's prior written consent unless this Contract concerns Certificates of Participation pursuant to Section 109-b of the General Municipal Law.

6. Worker's Compensation Benefits.

In accordance with Section 108 of the General Municipal Law, this Contract shall be void and of no force and effect unless the Contractor shall provide and maintain coverage during the life of this Contract for the benefit of such employees as are required to be covered by the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Law.

7. Non-Discrimination Requirements.

To the extent required by Article 15 of the Executive Law (also known as the Human Rights Law) and all other State and Federal statutory and constitutional non-discrimination provisions, the Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed, color, sex, national origin, sexual orientation, age, disability, genetic predisposition or carrier status, or marital status. Furthermore, in accordance with Section 220-e of the Labor Law, if this is a Contract for the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work or for the manufacture, sale or distribution of materials, equipment or supplies, and to the extent that this Contract shall be performed within the State of New York, the Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall, by reason of race, creed, color, disability, sex, or national origin: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this Contract. If this is a building service contract as defined in Section 230 of the Labor Law, then, in accordance with Section 239 thereof, the Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall by reason of race, creed, color, national origin, age, sex or disability: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or

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intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this Contract. The Contractor is subject to fines of \$50.00 per person per day for any violation of Section 220-e or Section 239 as well as possible termination of this Contract and forfeiture of all moneys due hereunder for a second or subsequent violation.

8. Wage and Hours Provisions.

If this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law or a building service contract covered by Article 9 thereof, neither the Contractor's employees nor the employees of its subcontractors may be required or permitted to work more than the number of hours or days stated in said statutes, except as otherwise provided in the Labor Law and as set forth in prevailing wage and supplement schedules issued by the State Labor Department. Furthermore, the Contractor and its subcontractors must pay at least the prevailing wage rate and pay or provide the prevailing supplements, including the premium rates for overtime pay, as determined by the State Labor Department in accordance with the Labor Law. Additionally, effective April 28, 2008, if this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law, the Contractor understands and agrees that the filing of payrolls in a manner consistent with Subdivision 3-a of Section 220 of the Labor Law shall be a condition precedent to payment by the County of any County approved sums due and owing for work done upon the project.

9. Non-Collusive Bidding Certification.

In accordance with Section 103-d of the General Municipal Law, if this Contract is awarded based upon the submission of bids, the Contractor affirms, under penalty of perjury, that its bid was arrived at independently and without collusion aimed at restricting competition. The Contractor further affirms that, at the time the Contractor submitted its bid, an authorized and responsible person executed and delivered to the County a non-collusive bidding certification on the Contractor's behalf.

10. Records.

The Contractor shall establish and maintain complete and accurate books, records, documents, accounts and other evidence directly pertinent to performance under this Contract (hereinafter, collectively, "the Records"). The Records shall include, but not be limited to, reports, statements, examinations, letters, memoranda, opinions, folders, files, books, manuals, pamphlets, forms, papers, designs, drawings, maps, photos, letters, microfilms, computer tapes or discs, electronic files, e-mails and attachments, rules, regulations and codes. The Records must be kept for the balance of the calendar year in which they were made and for six (6) additional years thereafter. The County Comptroller, the County Attorney and any other person or entity authorized to conduct an examination, as well as the agency or agencies involved in this Contract, shall have access to the Records during normal business hours at an office of the Contractor within the County or, if no such office is available, at a mutually agreeable and reasonable venue within the County, for the term specified above for the purposes of inspection,

The County shall take reasonable steps to protect from public disclosure any of the Records which are exempt from disclosure under Section 87 of the Public Officers Law (the "Statute") provided that: (a) the Contractor shall timely inform an appropriate County official, in writing, that said records should not be disclosed; (b) said records shall be sufficiently identified; and (c) designation of said records as exempt under the Statute is reasonable. Nothing contained herein shall diminish, or in any way adversely affect, the County's right to discovery in any pending or future litigation. Notwithstanding any other language, the Records may be subject to disclosure under the New York Freedom of Information Law, for other applicable state or federal law, rule or regulation.

11. Identifying Information and Privacy Notification.

- a. Identification Number(s). Every invoice or claim for payment submitted to a County agency by a payee, for payment for the sale of goods or service or for transactions (e.g., leases, easements, licenses, etc.) related to real or personal property must include the payee's identification number. The number is any or all of the following: (i) the payee's Federal employer identification number, (ii) the payee's Federal social security number, and/or (iii) the payee's Vendor Identification Number assigned by the Statewide Financial System. Where the payee does not have such number or numbers, the payees, on its invoice or claim for payment, must give the reason or reasons why the payee does not have such number or numbers.
- b. Privacy Notification. (1) The authority to request the above personal information from a seller of goods or services or a lessor of real or personal property, and the authority to maintain such information, is found in Section 5 of the State Tax Law. Disclosure of this information by the seller or lessor to the County is mandatory. The principle purpose for which the information is collected is to enable the State to identify individuals, businesses and others who have been delinquent in filing tax returns or may have understated their liabilities and to generally identify persons affected by the taxes administered by the New York State Commissioner of Taxation and Finance. The information will be used for tax administration purposes and for any other purpose authorized by law. (2) The personal information is requested by the County's purchasing unit contracting to purchase goods or services or lease the real or personal property covered by this Contract.

12. Conflicting Terms.

In the event of a conflict between the terms of the Contract (including any and all attachments thereto and amendments thereof) and the terms of this Addendum, the terms of this Addendum shall control.

13. Governing Law.

This Contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of New York except where the Federal supremacy clause requires otherwise.

14. Prohibition on Purchase of Tropical Hardwoods.

The Contractor certifies and warrants that all wood products to be used under this Contract award will be in accordance with, but not limited to, the specifications and provisions of Section 165 of the State Finance Law (Use of Tropical Hardwoods), which prohibits purchase and use of tropical hardwoods, unless specifically exempted by the State or any governmental agency or political subdivision or public benefit corporation. Qualification for an exemption under this law will be the responsibility of the Contractor to establish to meet with the approval of the County.

In addition, when any portion of this Contract involving the use of woods, whether supply or installation, is to be performed by any subcontractor, the prime Contractor will indicate and certify in the submitted bid proposal that the subcontractor has been informed and is in compliance with specifications and provisions regarding use of tropical hardwoods as detailed in Section 165 of the State Finance Law. Any such use must meet with approval of the County; otherwise, the bid may not be considered responsive. Under bidder certifications, proof of qualification for exemption will be the responsibility of the Contractor to meet with the approval of the County.

15. Compliance with New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act.

The Contractor shall comply with the provisions of the New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act (General Business Law Section 899-aa).

16. Gratuities and Kickbacks.

- a. Gratuities. It shall be unethical for any person to offer, give, or agree to give any County employee or former County employee, or for any County employee or former County employee to solicit, demand, accept, or agree to accept from another person, a gratuity or an offer of employment in connection with any decision, approval, disapproval, recommendation, or preparation of any part of a program requirement or a purchase request, influencing the content of any specification or procurement standard, rendering of advice, investigation, auditing, or in any other advisory capacity in any proceeding or application, request for ruling, determination, claim, or controversy, or other particular matter, pertaining to any program requirement or a contract or subcontract, or to any solicitation or proposal therefor.
- b. Kickbacks. It shall be unethical for any payment, gratuity, or offer of employment to be made by or on behalf of a subcontractor under a contract to the prime contractor or higher tier subcontractor or any person associated therewith, as an inducement for the award of a subcontract or order.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT between Oneida County, by and through its Department of Mental Health, with offices at 120 Airline Street, Suite 200, Oriskany, New York 13424, hereinafter referred to as the "**County**" and Upstate Cerebral Palsy, having its principal office located at 1020 Mary Street, Utica, New York 13501, hereinafter referred to as the "**Provider Agency**".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County through its Department of Mental Health desires to establish a comprehensive and integrated system of community mental health services as required by Article 41 of the Mental Hygiene Law of the State of New York; and

WHEREAS, Article 41 of New York State (hereinafter referred to as the "State") Mental Hygiene Law mandates and authorizes the County through its Department of Mental Health to enter into a series of Agreements, which establish a comprehensive and integrated system of community mental health services that will address the needs of the citizens and residents of Oneida County; and

WHEREAS, the Provider Agency hereby warrants that they have the proper and necessary staff and infrastructure to act as a provider and resource to and for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health; and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants hereinafter expressed, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The term of this Agreement shall be from January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2016 or until terminated according to the stipulations contained within this contract.
 - 2. The **Provider Agency** shall:
 - (A) Provide Psychosocial Club Services for individuals with a major mental illness, to include a focus on socializing, employment and/or education and living environments;
 - (B) Provide Supported Housing to assist consumers in locating and securing housing, and providing supports to include financial assistance with security deposits, and purchasing furniture. Case Management Services will include assistance in choosing housing, negotiating leases, financial consultations, assistance in daily living and linkage to needed services;
 - (C) Facilitate Mentally III Chemical Abuser (MICA) Network Case Management Services to dually diagnosed homeless individuals. Services will include the provision of support, advocacy, and linkage to treatment to avoid contacts with the criminal justice system and prevent homelessness;
 - (D) Facilitate temporarily, short-term supports to individuals interested in returning to the workforce through Assisted Competitive Employment Services. Services include intake/assessment, information and referral, job readiness skills, and job coaching;
 - (E) Provide Ongoing Integrated Supported Employment Services by securing competitive employment, providing on-site coaching, employer consultation, supports in integrated community settings;
 - (F) Provide Advocacy Services to seriously and persistently mentally ill adults on an individualized and as needed basis, 24 hours a day, 7 days a

week. Services will include linkage to mental health legal services and/or access to peer services.

- 3. The **Provider Agency** agrees, where applicable, to provide any and all **Services**, authorized by this agreement or other license or certification, to individuals involved in the NYS OMH Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) Program. This includes individuals under a court order and individuals that meet the criteria for an AOT order but have been diverted from the formal court proceedings. The **Provider Agency** further agrees to provide any and all required client-specific information as required by the State of New York and/or the Oneida County Department of Mental Health for monitoring purposes. It is expressly understood that all information sent to the Oneida County Department of Mental Health will be handled in a <u>safe and confidential</u> manner.
- 4. The **Provider Agency** agrees to participate in the development and implementation of the Local Governmental Plan. Participation may include but not necessarily be limited to: attendance at appropriate subcommittee meetings; notification to a subcommittee of intent to submit a Certificate of Need (CON) application and/or grant application which will modify **Services** offered by the **Provider Agency**; submission of planning reports and CON applications and/or Prior Approval and Review applications to the **County** prior to submission to the **State**; attendance and cooperation with various ad hoc work groups of the subcommittee.
- 5. The **Provider Agency** shall not be entitled to any of the benefits of an employee of the County of Oneida, such as New York State Employee's Retirement Benefits, Unemployment Insurance, Worker's Compensation, Employee's Medical, Hospital, Dental, Prescription, Optical coverage; and any other benefits that an employee of the County of Oneida normally is eligible to receive.
- 6. The **Provider Agency** is an independent contractor under this Agreement to perform a specialized service for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health. The **Provider Agency** further agrees to hold the County of Oneida harmless for all of their actions and warrants.
- 7. For the Services provided, the Oneida County Department of Mental Health will reimburse The **Provider Agency** a maximum of \$765,892.00 (seven hundred sixty-five thousand eight hundred ninety-two dollars) per year. This shall include but not be limited to travel time, evaluation time and any court time as deemed necessary by the court. The payment schedule will be based upon submission of an Oneida County Voucher to the Department of Mental Health. Annexed hereto and made part here of as **Appendix A**.
- 8. In the event that the **State** or **County** approves or makes changes to the funding amount that is listed in **Appendix A**, the **Provider Agency**, at the request of the **County** shall submit a revised budget plan which reflects the approved Operating Costs, Net Operating Costs and funding by the various Deficit Funding Sources. It is expressly understood that the **County** assumes no responsibility for either costs not approved for reimbursements by the either the **County** or the **State**; or changes to the budget anytime during the contract period. Should any expenses be disapproved in a post-audit by the State of New York or funds are not spent in the approved programs during the fiscal year, the **Provider Agency** shall submit a check payable to the **County Commissioner of Finance** equal to the amount of any disallowance already paid to the **Provider Agency** by the **County** within thirty (30) days of notification. This provision shall apply to this agreement and all previous agreements between the **County** and the **Provider Agency**.
- 9. The **County** will make State Aid Payments either monthly or quarterly based on payments made to the **County** by New York State and the timely submission of correct monthly payment vouchers. Payments will be provided subsequent to services rendered and upon review of the voucher receipt submitted by the **Provider Agency**.
- 10. The **Provider Agency** agrees to submit to the **County** on the last business day of the following month at the end of each quarter (i.e. Jan-Mar report due April 30th) a Quarterly Financial Analysis, Performance Analysis, and Service Utilization Report. In addition, the **Provider Agency** agrees to submit the following reports by the listed required dates as applicable to funding received:

and maintain comprehensive general liability insurance satisfactory to the County with a minimum of \$1,000,000 per occurrence coverage. The County of Oneida must be named as an "Additionally Insured" as part of the Provider Agency's insurance policy. Proof of same must be provided to the County at the time of the execution of this contract. It is expressly understood that if during the course of this Agreement, said insurance policy is canceled or otherwise allowed to lapse, the Provider Agency must provide the County proof of insurance consistent with the stipulations listed above. Failure to do may result in the immediate termination of this Agreement.

14. Either party may terminate this Agreement by giving fifteen (15) days prior written notice of such termination to the other party. Notwithstanding the above, if, through any cause, the **Provider Agency** fails to comply with legal, professional, **County** or **State** requirements for the provision of the services covered under this Agreement, or if the **Provider Agency** becomes bankrupt or insolvent or falsify their records or reports, the **County** may terminate this Agreement effective immediately, or, at its option, effective at a later date after sending notice of such termination to the **Provider Agency**.

The **County** shall be released from any and all responsibilities and obligations arising from the services covered by this Agreement, effective as of the date of termination. The **County** shall be responsible for payment of all claims for services provided and costs incurred by the **Provider Agency** prior to the termination of this Agreement that are pursuant to and after **Provider Agency** compliance with the terms and conditions herein.

Notice of termination must be in writing, signed by an authorized official, and sent to the other party by certified mail or messenger, and receipt shall be requested. Notice of termination shall be deemed delivered as of the date of it's posting by certified mail or at the time it is delivered to the other party by messenger.

If any term or provision of this Agreement shall be found to be illegal or unenforceable, then, notwithstanding the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and such term or provision shall be deemed stricken. The laws of the State of New York shall govern this contract and jurisdiction and venue shall lie within the State of New York.

15. The **Provider Agency** agrees to maintain files in a confidential manner pursuant to the applicable statutes contained in New York State Mental Hygiene Law and any Federal Law regulating such files. Information contained in these files shall be released only upon the written consent of the client being served or to the Oneida County Department of Mental Health as outlined below.

It is expressly understood that as a **Provider Agency** for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health, it may and will receive confidential information from the Department of Mental Health and this information may have been received from other independent contractors and/or licensed agencies. The **Provider Agency** agrees that all such information will be considered as being confidential and shall not be re-disclosed without the written consent of the individual.

Accordingly, as a condition of and in consideration of access to confidential information, the **Provider Agency** promises that:

- A. They will use confidential information only as needed to perform the legitimate duties as outlined above for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health and the Tier I program. This means, among other things, that:
- 1. The **Provider Agency** will only access confidential information for which there is a need to know; and
- 2. The **Provider Agency** will not in any way divulge, copy, release, sell, loan review, alter or destroy any confidential information except as properly authorized.
- 3. The **Provider Agency** will not misuse confidential information or carelessly handle confidential information.
 - B. The **Provider Agency** will safeguard and will not disclose any access code or any other authorization that allows access to confidential information. The **Provider Agency** accepts responsibility for all activities undertaken using any access code and

other authorization.

- C. The **Provider Agency** will report activities by any individual or entity that is suspected of or may compromise the confidentiality of confidential information. Reports made in good faith about suspect activities will be held in confidence to the extent permitted by law, including the name of the individual reporting the activities.
- D. The **Provider Agency** understands that the obligations under this Agreement will continue after termination of employment and that it is further understood that any privileges hereunder are subject to periodic review, revision and if appropriate, renewal.
- E. The **Provider Agency** understands that there is no right or ownership interest in any confidential information referred to in this Agreement. The Oneida County Department of Mental Health may at any time revoke any access code, other authorization, or access to confidential information. At all times during the course of providing services under this Agreement, the **Provider Agency** will safeguard the confidentiality of all confidential information.
- F. The **Provider Agency** will be responsible for any misuse or wrongful disclosure of confidential information and for any failure to safeguard an access code or other authorization access to confidential information. It is expressly understood that any failure to comply with this Agreement may result in immediate termination of access to the information system and legal action against the **Provider**.
- 16. The **Provider Agency** agrees not to discriminate or refuse assistance to individuals diagnosed with AIDS or an HIV infection or an HIV related illness. If the **Provider Agency** is provided with any confidential HIV related information during the course of providing services and in accordance with 403 of Title 18 of the NYSDSS regulation and Section 2782 of the Public Health Law, they shall be informed of the penalties and fines for any redisclosure found to be in violation of New York State Law and/or Regulation.

The **Provider Agency** shall include the following written statement when disclosing any confidential HIV related Information:

- "This information has been disclosed to you from confidential records, which are protected by State Law. State Law prohibits you from making any further disclosure of this information without the specific written consent of the person to whom it pertains, or as otherwise permitted by law. Any unauthorized further disclosure in violation of State Law may result in a fine or jail sentence or both. A general authorization for the release of medical or other information is not sufficient authorization for further disclosure."
- 17. The **Provider Agency** agrees that as mandated reporters, all instances of suspected child abuse, neglect, and/or maltreatment, will be reported to the Central Registry as required by law. These verbal reports will be followed by submission of completed 2221A to the local Department of Social Services. The family will be informed in advance of the decision to file a report with the Central Register. The **Provider Agency** shall also notify the Commissioner of Oneida County Department of Mental Health of any and all reports made to the Child Abuse Registry.
- 18. It is understood that this instrument represents the entire Agreement of the parties hereto; both parties shall execute that all previous understandings are merged herein; and that no modifications hereof shall be valid unless written evidence shall be executed thereof.
- 19. **Miscellaneous Provisions:** Annexed hereto and made a part hereof as Appendix A and Appendix B are additional terms, covenants and conditions which the respective parties agree to be bound by and follow as part of this Agreement.

4. Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPPA).

When applicable to the services provided pursuant to the Contract:

- a. The Contractor, as a Business Associate of the County, shall comply with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, hereinafter referred to as "HIPAA," as well as all regulations promulgated by the Federal Government in furtherance thereof, to assure the privacy and security of all protected health information exchanged between the Contractor and the County. In order to assure such privacy and security, the Contractor agrees to enact the following safeguards for protected health information:
 - 1. Establish policies and procedures, in written or electronic form, that are reasonably designed, taking into consideration the size of, and the type of activities undertaken by, the Contractor, to comply with the Standards for Privacy of Individual Identifiable Health Information, commonly referred to as the Privacy Rule;
 - 2. Utilize a combination of electronic hardware and computer software in order to securely store, maintain, transmit, and access, protected health information electronically; and
 - 3. Utilize an adequate amount of physical hardware, including but not limited to filing cabinets, and locks on drawers, cabinets, and office doors, in order to prevent unwarranted and illegal access to computers and paper files that contain protected health information of the County's clients.
- b. This agreement does not authorize the Contractor to use or further disclose the protected health information that the Contractor handles in treating patients of the County in any manner that would violate the requirements of 45 CFR § 164.504(e), if that same use or disclosure were done by the County, except that:
 - 1. The Contractor may use and disclose protected health information for the Contractor's own proper management and administration; and
 - 2. The Contractor may provide data aggregation services relating to the health care operations of the County.
- c. The Contractor shall:
 - 1. Not use or further disclose protected health information other than as permitted or required by this contract or as required by law;
 - 2. Use appropriate safeguards to prevent the use or disclosure of protected health information other than as provided for in this Contract;
 - 3. Report to the County any use or disclosure of the information not provided for by this Contract of which the Contractor becomes aware;
 - 4. Ensure that any agents, including a subcontractor, to whom the Contractor provides protected health information received from, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of, the County agrees to the same restrictions and conditions that apply to the Contractor with respect to such protected health information;
 - 5. Make available protected health information in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.524;
 - 6. Make available protected health information for amendment and incorporate any amendments to protected health information in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528;
 - 7. Make available the information required to provide an accounting of

- disclosures in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528;
- 8. Make its internal practices, books, and records relating to the use and disclosure of protected health information received from, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of, the County available to the Secretary of Health and Human Services for purposes of determining the County's compliance with 45 CFR § 164.504(e)(2)(ii); and
- 9. At the termination of this Contract, if feasible, return or destroy all protected health information received from, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of, the County that the Contractor still maintains in any form and retain no copies of such information or, if such return or destruction is not feasible, extend the protections of this Contract to such information and limit further uses and disclosures to those purposes that make the return or destruction of the information infeasible.
- d. The Contractor agrees that this contract may be amended if any of the following events occurs:
 - 1. HIPAA, or any of the regulations promulgated in furtherance thereof, is modified by Congress or the Department of Health and Human Services;
 - 2. HIPAA, or any of the regulations promulgated in furtherance thereof, is interpreted by a court in a manner impacting the County's HIPAA compliance; or
 - 3. There is a material change in the business practices and procedures of the County.
- e. Pursuant to 45 CFR § 164.504(e)(2)(iii), the County is authorized to unilaterally terminate this Contract if the County determines that the Contractor has violated a material term of this Contract.

5. Non-Assignment Clause.

In accordance with Section 109 of the General Municipal Law, this Contract may not be assigned by the Contractor or its right, title or interest therein assigned, transferred, conveyed, sublet or otherwise disposed of without the County's previous written consent, and attempts to do so are null and void. The Contractor may, however, assign its right to receive payments without the County's prior written consent unless this Contract concerns Certificates of Participation pursuant to Section 109-b of the General Municipal Law.

6. Worker's Compensation Benefits.

In accordance with Section 108 of the General Municipal Law, this Contract shall be void and of no force and effect unless the Contractor shall provide and maintain coverage during the life of this Contract for the benefit of such employees as are required to be covered by the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Law.

7. Non-Discrimination Requirements.

To the extent required by Article 15 of the Executive Law (also known as the Human Rights Law) and all other State and Federal statutory and constitutional non-discrimination provisions, the Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed, color, sex, national origin, sexual orientation, age, disability, genetic predisposition or carrier status, or marital status.

Furthermore, in accordance with Section 220-e of the Labor Law, if this is a Contract for the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work or for the manufacture, sale or distribution of materials, equipment or supplies, and to the extent that this Contract shall be performed within the State of New York, the Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall, by reason of race, creed, color, disability, sex, or national origin: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this Contract. If this is a building service contract as defined in Section 230 of the Labor Law, then, in accordance with Section 239 thereof, the Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall by reason of race, creed, color, national origin, age, sex or disability: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this Contract. The Contractor is subject to fines of \$50.00 per person per day for any violation of Section 220-e or Section 239 as well as possible termination of this Contract and forfeiture of all moneys due hereunder for a second or subsequent violation.

8. Wage and Hours Provisions.

If this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law or a building service contract covered by Article 9 thereof, neither the Contractor's employees nor the employees of its subcontractors may be required or permitted to work more than the number of hours or days stated in said statutes, except as otherwise provided in the Labor Law and as set forth in prevailing wage and supplement schedules issued by the State Labor Department. Furthermore, the Contractor and its subcontractors must pay at least the prevailing wage rate and pay or provide the prevailing supplements, including the premium rates for overtime pay, as determined by the State Labor Department in accordance with the Labor Law. Additionally, effective April 28, 2008, if this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law, the Contractor understands and agrees that the filing of payrolls in a manner consistent with Subdivision 3-a of Section 220 of the Labor Law shall be a condition precedent to payment by the County of any County approved sums due and owing for work done upon the project.

9. Non-Collusive Bidding Certification.

In accordance with Section 103-d of the General Municipal Law, if this Contract is awarded based upon the submission of bids, the Contractor affirms, under penalty of perjury, that its bid was arrived at independently and without collusion aimed at restricting competition. The Contractor further affirms that, at the time the Contractor submitted its bid, an authorized and responsible person executed and delivered to the County a non-collusive bidding certification on the Contractor's behalf.

10. Records.

The Contractor shall establish and maintain complete and accurate books, records, documents, accounts and other evidence directly pertinent to performance under this Contract (hereinafter, collectively, "the Records"). The Records shall include, but not be limited to, reports, statements, examinations, letters, memoranda, opinions, folders, files, books, manuals, pamphlets, forms, papers, designs, drawings, maps, photos, letters, microfilms, computer tapes or discs, electronic files, e-mails and attachments, rules, regulations and codes. The Records must be kept for the balance of the calendar year in which they were made and for six (6) additional years thereafter. The County Comptroller, the County Attorney and any other person or entity authorized to conduct an examination, as well as the agency or agencies involved in

this Contract, shall have access to the Records during normal business hours at an office of the Contractor within the County or, if no such office is available, at a mutually agreeable and reasonable venue within the County, for the term specified above for the purposes of inspection, auditing and copying. The County shall take reasonable steps to protect from public disclosure any of the Records which are exempt from disclosure under Section 87 of the Public Officers Law (the "Statute") provided that: (a) the Contractor shall timely inform an appropriate County official, in writing, that said records should not be disclosed; (b) said records shall be sufficiently identified; and (c) designation of said records as exempt under the Statute is reasonable. Nothing contained herein shall diminish, or in any way adversely affect, the County's right to discovery in any pending or future litigation. Notwithstanding any other language, the Records may be subject to disclosure under the New York Freedom of Information Law, for other applicable state or federal law, rule or regulation.

11. Identifying Information and Privacy Notification.

- a. Identification Number(s). Every invoice or claim for payment submitted to a County agency by a payee, for payment for the sale of goods or service or for transactions (e.g., leases, easements, licenses, etc.) related to real or personal property must include the payee's identification number. The number is any or all of the following: (i) the payee's Federal employer identification number, (ii) the payee's Federal social security number, and/or (iii) the payee's Vendor Identification Number assigned by the Statewide Financial System. Where the payee does not have such number or numbers, the payees, on its invoice or claim for payment, must give the reason or reasons why the payee does not have such number or numbers.
- b. Privacy Notification. (1) The authority to request the above personal information from a seller of goods or services or a lessor of real or personal property, and the authority to maintain such information, is found in Section 5 of the State Tax Law. Disclosure of this information by the seller or lessor to the County is mandatory. The principle purpose for which the information is collected is to enable the State to identify individuals, businesses and others who have been delinquent in filing tax returns or may have understated their liabilities and to generally identify persons affected by the taxes administered by the New York State Commissioner of Taxation and Finance. The information will be used for tax administration purposes and for any other purpose authorized by law. (2) The personal information is requested by the County's purchasing unit contracting to purchase goods or services or lease the real or personal property covered by this Contract.

12. Conflicting Terms.

In the event of a conflict between the terms of the Contract (including any and all attachments thereto and amendments thereof) and the terms of this Addendum, the terms of this Addendum shall control.

13. Governing Law.

This Contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of New York except where the Federal supremacy clause requires otherwise.

14. Prohibition on Purchase of Tropical Hardwoods.

The Contractor certifies and warrants that all wood products to be used under this Contract award will be

in accordance with, but not limited to, the specifications and provisions of Section 165 of the State Finance Law (Use of Tropical Hardwoods), which prohibits purchase and use of tropical hardwoods, unless specifically exempted by the State or any governmental agency or political subdivision or public benefit corporation. Qualification for an exemption under this law will be the responsibility of the Contractor to establish to meet with the approval of the County.

In addition, when any portion of this Contract involving the use of woods, whether supply or installation, is to be performed by any subcontractor, the prime Contractor will indicate and certify in the submitted bid proposal that the subcontractor has been informed and is in compliance with specifications and provisions regarding use of tropical hardwoods as detailed in Section 165 of the State Finance Law. Any such use must meet with approval of the County; otherwise, the bid may not be considered responsive. Under bidder certifications, proof of qualification for exemption will be the responsibility of the Contractor to meet with the approval of the County.

15. Compliance with New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act.

The Contractor shall comply with the provisions of the New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act (General Business Law Section 899-aa).

16. Gratuities and Kickbacks.

- a. Gratuities. It shall be unethical for any person to offer, give, or agree to give any County employee or former County employee, or for any County employee or former County employee to solicit, demand, accept, or agree to accept from another person, a gratuity or an offer of employment in connection with any decision, approval, disapproval, recommendation, or preparation of any part of a program requirement or a purchase request, influencing the content of any specification or procurement standard, rendering of advice, investigation, auditing, or in any other advisory capacity in any proceeding or application, request for ruling, determination, claim, or controversy, or other particular matter, pertaining to any program requirement or a contract or subcontract, or to any solicitation or proposal therefor.
- b. Kickbacks. It shall be unethical for any payment, gratuity, or offer of employment to be made by or on behalf of a subcontractor under a contract to the prime contractor or higher tier subcontractor or any person associated therewith, as an inducement for the award of a subcontract or order.

17. Audit

The County, the State of New York, and the United States shall have the right at any time during the term of this agreement and for the period limited by the applicable statute of limitations to audit the payment of monies hereunder. The Contractor shall comply with any demands made by the County to provide information with respect to the payment of monies hereunder during the period covered by this paragraph. The Contractor shall maintain its books and records in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles or such other method of account which is approved in writing by the County prior to the date of this agreement. The revenues and expenditures of the Contractor in connection with this agreement shall be separately identifiable. Each expenditure or claim for payment shall be fully documented. Expenditures or claims for payment which are not fully documented may be disallowed. The Contractor agrees to provide to or permit the County to examine or obtain copies of any documents relating to the payment of money to the Contractor or expenditures made by the Contractor for which reimbursement is made to the Contractor by the County. The

Contractor shall maintain all records required by this paragraph for 7 years after the date this agreement is terminated or ends.

If the Contractor has expended, in any fiscal year, \$300,000.00 or more in funds provided by a Federal financial assistance program from a Federal agency pursuant to this agreement and all other contracts with the County, the Contractor shall provide the County with an audit prepared by an independent auditor in accordance with the Single Audit Act of 1984, 31 U.S.C. §§ 7501, et seq., as amended, and the regulations adopted pursuant to such Act.

18. Certification of compliance with the Iran Divestment Act.

Pursuant Section 103-g of the General Municipal Law, by submitting a bid in response to this solicitation or by assuming the responsibility of a Contract awarded hereunder, each Bidder/Contractor, any person signing on behalf of any Bidder/Contractor and any assignee or subcontractor and, in the case of a joint bid, each party thereto, certifies, under penalty of perjury, that once the Prohibited Entities List is posted on the Office of General Services (OGS) website, that to the best of its knowledge and belief, that each Bidder/Contractor and any subcontractor or assignee is not identified on the Prohibited Entities List created pursuant to State Finance Law § 165-a(3)(b).

Additionally, the Bidder/Contractor is advised that once the Prohibited Entities List is posted on the OGS website, any Bidder/Contractor seeking to renew or extend a Contract or assume the responsibility of a Contract awarded in response to this solicitation must certify at the time the Contract is renewed, extended or assigned that it is not included on the Prohibited Entities List.

During the term of the Contract, should the County receive information that a Bidder/Contractor is in violation of the above-referenced certification, the County will offer the person or entity an opportunity to respond. If the person or entity fails to demonstrate that he/she/it has ceased engagement in the investment which is in violation of the Iran Divestment Act of 2012 within 90 days after the determination of such violation, then the County shall take such action as may be appropriate including, but not limited to, imposing sanctions, seeking compliance, recovering damages or declaring the Bidder/Contractor in default.

The County reserves the right to reject any bid or request for assignment for a Bidder/Contractor that appears on the Prohibited Entities List prior to the award of a Contract and to pursue a responsibility review with respect to any Bidder/Contractor that is awarded a Contract and subsequently appears on the Prohibited Entities List.

A. Vocational Rehabilitation Training/Sheltered Workshop (0340) (\$97,754)

This program focuses on teaching the individual social, behavioral and work skills necessary to go into the community and find competitive employment. Individuals who are unable to find competitive employment can remain within the vocational training program and earn money at a level which equals their ability to do work based on industry standards.

B. Transportation (0340) (\$31,760)

This service provides transportation to and from programming within Oneida County; for those individuals in need to improve accessibility of services.

C. Assisted Competitive Employment (1380) (\$37,093)

Assisted Competitive Employment (ACE) is a community-based supported employment program that provides: intake/assessment, individualized job development, job shadowing, community internships, benefits counseling, transportation, and life skills advocacy. This program serves individuals with severe mental illness.

D. Ongoing Integrated Supported Employment (4340) (\$173,376)

Provides individuals with severe mental illness direct placement into community based employment accompanied by needed support and follow along services. Support services include: on-site job coaching, benefits counseling, transportation, life skills advocacy, and long term job retention supports. Extended services are provided to the individual as long as they are needed to ensure gainful employment is successfully maintained.

III. Service/Program Design and Staffing:

The Vocational Rehabilitation Training/Sheltered Workshop is certified by the NYS Office of Persons With Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD). The program design and staffing requirements are in accordance with OPWDD regulations. The Assisted Competitive Employment Program and the Ongoing Integrated Supported Employment Program design and staffing criteria meet the NYS Office of Mental Health guidelines and regulations.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT between Oneida County, by and through its Department of Mental Health, with offices at 120 Airline Street, Suite 200, Oriskany, New York 13424, hereinafter referred to as the "**County**" and The ARC of Oneida and Lewis Counties, Inc., having its principal office located at 245 Genesee Street, Utica, New York 13501, hereinafter referred to as the "**Provider Agency**".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County through its Department of Mental Health desires to establish a comprehensive and integrated system of community mental health services as required by Article 41 of the Mental Hygiene Law of the State of New York; and

WHEREAS, Article 41 of New York State (hereinafter referred to as the "State") Mental Hygiene Law mandates and authorizes the County through its Department of Mental Health to enter into a series of Agreements, which establish a comprehensive and integrated system of community mental health services that will address the needs of the citizens and residents of Oneida County; and

WHEREAS, the Provider Agency hereby warrants that they have the proper and necessary staff and infrastructure to act as a provider and resource to and for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health; and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants hereinafter expressed, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The term of this Agreement shall be from January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2016 or until terminated according to the stipulations contained within this contract.
 - 2. The **Provider Agency** shall:
 - (A) Provide vocational rehabilitation training services, in accordance with NYS Office for People with Developmental Disabilities' (OPWDD) guidelines and regulations, that focus on teaching individuals with developmental disabilities appropriate social, behavioral and work skills necessary to earn money through work while participating in the program and develop the skills to obtain competitive employment in the community;
 - (B) Provide transportation to and from programming within Oneida County to individuals with developmental disabilities to improve accessibility of services;
 - (C) Provide assisted competitive employment services to individuals with severe mental illness, in accordance with NYS Office of Mental Health guidelines and regulations, that include intake/assessment, individualized job development, job shadowing, community internships, benefits counseling, transportation, and life skills advocacy:
 - (D) Provide ongoing integrated supported employment services to individuals with severe mental illness, in accordance to NYS Office of Mental Health guidelines and regulations that include on-site job coaching, benefits counseling, transportation, life skills advocacy, and long-term job retention supports as needed to ensure gainful employment is successfully maintained.

- 3. The **Provider Agency** agrees, where applicable, to provide any and all **Services**, authorized by this agreement or other license or certification, to individuals involved in the NYS OMH Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) Program. This includes individuals under a court order and individuals that meet the criteria for an AOT order but have been diverted from the formal court proceedings. The **Provider Agency** further agrees to provide any and all required client-specific information as required by the State of New York and/or the Oneida County Department of Mental Health for monitoring purposes. It is expressly understood that all information sent to the Oneida County Department of Mental Health will be handled in a <u>safe and confidential</u> manner.
- 4. The **Provider Agency** agrees to participate in the development and implementation of the Local Governmental Plan. Participation may include but not necessarily be limited to: attendance at appropriate subcommittee meetings; notification to a subcommittee of intent to submit a Certificate of Need (CON) application and/or grant application which will modify **Services** offered by the **Provider Agency**; submission of planning reports and CON applications and/or Prior Approval and Review applications to the **County** prior to submission to the **State**; attendance and cooperation with various ad hoc work groups of the subcommittee.
- 5. The **Provider Agency** shall not be entitled to any of the benefits of an employee of the County of Oneida, such as New York State Employee's Retirement Benefits, Unemployment Insurance, Worker's Compensation, Employee's Medical, Hospital, Dental, Prescription, Optical coverage; and any other benefits that an employee of the County of Oneida normally is eligible to receive.
- 6. The **Provider Agency** is an independent contractor under this Agreement to perform a specialized service for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health. The **Provider Agency** further agrees to hold the County of Oneida harmless for all of their actions and warrants.
- 7. For the Services provided, the Oneida County Department of Mental Health will reimburse The **Provider Agency** a maximum of \$339,983.00 (three hundred thirty-nine thousand nine hundred eighty-three dollars) per year. This shall include but not be limited to travel time, evaluation time and any court time as deemed necessary by the court. The payment schedule will be based upon submission of an Oneida County Voucher to the Department of Mental Health. Annexed hereto and made part here of as **Appendix A**.
- 8. In the event that the **State** or **County** approves or makes changes to the funding amount that is listed in **Appendix A**, the **Provider Agency**, at the request of the **County** shall submit a revised budget plan which reflects the approved Operating Costs, Net Operating Costs and funding by the various Deficit Funding Sources. It is expressly understood that the **County** assumes no responsibility for either costs not approved for reimbursements by the either the **County** or the **State**; or changes to the budget anytime during the contract period. Should any expenses be disapproved in a post-audit by the **State** of New York or funds are not spent in the approved programs during the fiscal year, the **Provider Agency** shall submit a check payable to the **County Commissioner of Finance** equal to the amount of any disallowance already paid to the **Provider Agency** by the **County** within thirty (30) days of notification. This provision shall apply to this agreement and all previous agreements between the **County** and the **Provider Agency**.
- 9. The **County** will make State Aid Payments either monthly or quarterly based on payments made to the **County** by New York State and the timely submission of correct monthly payment vouchers. Payments will be provided subsequent to services rendered and upon review of the voucher receipt submitted by the **Provider Agency**.
- 10. The **Provider Agency** agrees to submit to the **County** on the last business day of the following month at the end of each quarter (i.e. Jan-Mar report due April 30th) a Quarterly Financial Analysis, Performance Analysis, and Service Utilization Report. In addition, the **Provider Agency** agrees to submit the following reports by the listed required dates as applicable to funding received:
 - a) *Office of Persons with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD) Budgets* for the current year is required to be received by the **County** by February 1st.

- b) Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) Estimated Claims for the prior year are required to be received by the County by April 15th.
- c) Pre-Approved 30-day Office of Mental Health (OMH) Consolidated Fiscal Report (CFR) Extension Requests for the prior year OMH CFR are required to be received by the County by April 15th.
- d) *OMH*, *OASAS* and *OPWDD* (*Full*) *Audited CFR* for the prior year that do not have a pre-approved 30-day extension (OMH only) are required to be received by the **County** by April 15th. An OPWDD Estimated CFR is required by this date if an extension was filed. An OASAS Estimated Claim is required to be received by this date; no extension allowed for OASAS CFRs.
- e) *Fully Audited CFRs for OMH, OPWDD, and OASAS* for the prior year with an extension submitted for OMH and OPWDD and/or an Estimated OASAS CFR supplied to the **County** by April 15th are required to be received by the **County** by May 15th.
- f) *OASAS Mid-Year Claim* for the current year is required to be received by the **County** by August 1st.
- g) *OASAS Consolidated Budget Report (CBR)* for the next year is (with scope) required to be received by the **County** by September 15th.
- h) *OMH CBRs* for the current year are required to be received by the **County** by October 15th.
- 11. The **Provider Agency** shall submit a copy of the following reports during the first quarter of each Fiscal Year:
 - a) Disaster Response Plan. In addition the **Provider Agency** will participate in the development of an Oneida County plan to respond to man-made or natural disasters.
 - b) Accounting System & Financial Capability Questionnaire (where applicable).
 - c) Corporate Compliance Plan. The plan will reflect efforts to ensure that personnel are aware of and in compliance with relevant laws and regulations.
 - d) Annual Audit and Financial Reports.
 - e) Federal Single Audit Report. If the **Provider Agency** is scheduled to receive funds in excess of \$300,000.00 or more in a year in federal funds, exclusive of Medicaid and Medicare. The Single Audit shall be conducted in accordance with OMB Circular A-133, OMB Circular A-110, the A-102 Common Rule and such other circulars, interpretations, opinions, rules or regulations that may be issued in connection with the single Audit Act Amendments of 1996.
- 12. The **Provider Agency** shall operate all programs in compliance with the laws, rules and regulations as passed and /or promulgated by the **County**, State or Federal governments. It is further understood by the **Provider Agency** that agencies and departments of New York State other than OMH, Office of Alcoholism & Substance Abuse Services (OASAS), and Office of Persons with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD) may promulgate these rules and regulations.
- 13. The Provider Agency further covenants and agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the County, its officers, agents and employees, from and against any and all loss or expenses that may arise by reason of liability for damage, injury or death, or for invasion of personal or property rights, of every name and nature, and whether casual or continuing trespass or nuisance, and any other claims for damages arising at law and equity alleged to have been caused or sustained in whole or in part by or because of any omission of duty, negligence or wrongful act on the part of the Provider Agency and the County, their officers, agents or employees, in connection with this Agreement. In addition, the Provider Agency shall obtain and maintain comprehensive general liability insurance satisfactory to the County with a minimum of \$1,000,000 per occurrence coverage. The County of Oneida must be named as an

"Additionally Insured" as part of the Provider Agency's insurance policy. Proof of same must be provided to the County at the time of the execution of this contract. It is expressly understood that if during the course of this Agreement, said insurance policy is canceled or otherwise allowed to lapse, the Provider Agency must provide the County proof of insurance consistent with the stipulations listed above. Failure to do may result in the immediate termination of this Agreement.

14. Either party may terminate this Agreement by giving fifteen (15) days prior written notice of such termination to the other party. Notwithstanding the above, if, through any cause, the **Provider Agency** fails to comply with legal, professional, **County** or **State** requirements for the provision of the services covered under this Agreement, or if the **Provider Agency** becomes bankrupt or insolvent or falsify their records or reports, the **County** may terminate this Agreement effective immediately, or, at its option, effective at a later date after sending notice of such termination to the **Provider Agency**.

The **County** shall be released from any and all responsibilities and obligations arising from the services covered by this Agreement, effective as of the date of termination. The **County** shall be responsible for payment of all claims for services provided and costs incurred by the **Provider Agency** prior to the termination of this Agreement that are pursuant to and after **Provider Agency** compliance with the terms and conditions herein.

Notice of termination must be in writing, signed by an authorized official, and sent to the other party by certified mail or messenger, and receipt shall be requested. Notice of termination shall be deemed delivered as of the date of it's posting by certified mail or at the time it is delivered to the other party by messenger.

If any term or provision of this Agreement shall be found to be illegal or unenforceable, then, notwithstanding the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and such term or provision shall be deemed stricken. The laws of the State of New York shall govern this contract and jurisdiction and venue shall lie within the State of New York.

15. The **Provider Agency** agrees to maintain files in a confidential manner pursuant to the applicable statutes contained in New York State Mental Hygiene Law and any Federal Law regulating such files. Information contained in these files shall be released only upon the written consent of the client being served or to the Oneida County Department of Mental Health as outlined below.

It is expressly understood that as a **Provider Agency** for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health, it may and will receive confidential information from the Department of Mental Health and this information may have been received from other independent contractors and/or licensed agencies. The **Provider Agency** agrees that all such information will be considered as being confidential and shall not be re-disclosed without the written consent of the individual.

Accordingly, as a condition of and in consideration of access to confidential information, the **Provider Agency** promises that:

- A. They will use confidential information only as needed to perform the legitimate duties as outlined above for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health and the Tier I program. This means, among other things, that:
- 1. The **Provider Agency** will only access confidential information for which there is a need to know; and
- 2. The **Provider Agency** will not in any way divulge, copy, release, sell, loan review, alter or destroy any confidential information except as properly authorized.
- 3. The **Provider Agency** will not misuse confidential information or carelessly handle confidential information.
 - B. The **Provider Agency** will safeguard and will not disclose any access code or any other authorization that allows access to confidential information. The **Provider Agency** accepts responsibility for all activities undertaken using any access code and other authorization.
 - C. The Provider Agency will report activities by any individual or entity that is

suspected of or may compromise the confidentiality of confidential information. Reports made in good faith about suspect activities will be held in confidence to the extent permitted by law, including the name of the individual reporting the activities.

- D. The **Provider Agency** understands that the obligations under this Agreement will continue after termination of employment and that it is further understood that any privileges hereunder are subject to periodic review, revision and if appropriate, renewal.
- E. The **Provider Agency** understands that there is no right or ownership interest in any confidential information referred to in this Agreement. The Oneida County Department of Mental Health may at any time revoke any access code, other authorization, or access to confidential information. At all times during the course of providing services under this Agreement, the **Provider Agency** will safeguard the confidentiality of all confidential information.
- F. The **Provider Agency** will be responsible for any misuse or wrongful disclosure of confidential information and for any failure to safeguard an access code or other authorization access to confidential information. It is expressly understood that any failure to comply with this Agreement may result in immediate termination of access to the information system and legal action against the **Provider**.
- 16. The **Provider Agency** agrees not to discriminate or refuse assistance to individuals diagnosed with AIDS or an HIV infection or an HIV related illness. If the **Provider Agency** is provided with any confidential HIV related information during the course of providing services and in accordance with 403 of Title 18 of the NYSDSS regulation and Section 2782 of the Public Health Law, they shall be informed of the penalties and fines for any redisclosure found to be in violation of New York State Law and/or Regulation.

The **Provider Agency** shall include the following written statement when disclosing any confidential HIV related Information:

"This information has been disclosed to you from confidential records, which are protected by State Law. State Law prohibits you from making any further disclosure of this information without the specific written consent of the person to whom it pertains, or as otherwise permitted by law. Any unauthorized further disclosure in violation of State Law may result in a fine or jail sentence or both. A general authorization for the release of medical or other information is not sufficient authorization for further disclosure."

- 17. The **Provider Agency** agrees that as mandated reporters, all instances of suspected child abuse, neglect, and/or maltreatment, will be reported to the Central Registry as required by law. These verbal reports will be followed by submission of completed 2221A to the local Department of Social Services. The family will be informed in advance of the decision to file a report with the Central Register. The **Provider Agency** shall also notify the Commissioner of Oneida County Department of Mental Health of any and all reports made to the Child Abuse Registry.
- 18. It is understood that this instrument represents the entire Agreement of the parties hereto; both parties shall execute that all previous understandings are merged herein; and that no modifications hereof shall be valid unless written evidence shall be executed thereof.
- 19. **Miscellaneous Provisions:** Annexed hereto and made a part hereof as Appendix A and Appendix B are additional terms, covenants and conditions which the respective parties agree to be bound by and follow as part of this Agreement.

WHEREAS, COUNTY and CONTRACTOR have entered into a contract, license, lease, amendment or other agreement of any kind (hereinafter referred to as the "Contract"), and

WHEREAS, the Oneida County Attorney and the Oneida County Director of Purchasing have recommended the inclusion of the standard clauses set forth in this Addendum to be included in every Contract for which COUNTY is a party, now, thereafter,

The parties to the attached Contract, for good consideration, agree to be bound by the following clauses which are hereby made a part of the Contract.

1. Executor or Non-Appropriation Clause.

The County shall have no liability or obligation under this Contract to the Contractor or to anyone else beyond the annual funds being appropriated and available for this Contract.

2. Oneida County Board of Legislators: Resolution #249 Solid Waste Disposal Requirements.

Pursuant to Oneida County Board of Legislator Resolution No. 249 of May 26, 1999, the Contractor agrees to deliver exclusively to the facilities of the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority, all waste and recyclables generated within the Authority's service area by performance of this Contract by the Contractor and any subcontractors. Upon awarding of this Contract, and before work commences, the Contractor will be required to provide Oneida County with proof that Resolution No. 249 of 1999 has been complied with, and that all wastes and recyclables in the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority's service area which are generated by the Contractor and any subcontractors in performance of this Contract will be delivered exclusively to Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority facilities.

3. Certification Regarding Lobbying; Debarment, Suspension and other Responsibility Matters; and Drug-Free Workplace Requirements.

- a. Lobbying. As required by Section 1352, Title 31 of the U.S. Code and implemented at 34 CFR Part 82 for persons entering into a grant or cooperative agreement over \$100,000, as defined at 34 CFR Part 82, Section 82.105 and 82.110, the Contractor certifies that:
 - 1. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the Contractor, to any persons for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, and officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the making of any Federal Grant, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and

- the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal grant or cooperative agreement.
- 2. If any funds other than federally appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this federal grant or cooperative agreement, the Contractor shall complete and submit Standard Form 111 "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.
- 3. The Contractor shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all subcontracts and that all subcontractors shall certify and disclose accordingly.
- b. Debarment, Suspension and other Responsibility Matters. As required by Executive Order 12549, Debarments and Suspension, and implemented at 34 CFR Part 85, for prospective participants in primary covered transactions, as defined at 34 CFR Part 85, Sections 83.105 and 85.110,
 - 1. The Contractor certifies that it and its principals:
 - a. Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any Federal department or agency;
 - b. Have not within a three-year period preceding this Contract been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (Federal, State or local) transaction or contracts under a public transaction, violation of federal or State antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements, or receiving stolen property;
 - c. Are not presently indicated or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a Government entity (Federal, State or local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in paragraph 1(b) of this certification; and
 - d. Have not within a three-year period preceding this Contract had one or more public transactions (Federal, State, or local) for cause or default; and
 - 2. Where the Contractor is unable to certify to any of the statements in this certification, he or she shall attach an explanation to this Contract.
- c. Drug-Free Workplace (Contractors other than individuals). As required by the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988, and implemented at 34 CFR Part 85, Subpart F, for Contractors, as defined at 34 CFR Part 85, Sections 85.605 and 85.610:
 - 1. The Contractor will or will continue to provide a drug-free workplace by:
 - a. Publishing a statement notifying employees that the manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the Contractor's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violation of such prohibition;
 - b. Establishing an on-going drug-free awareness program to inform employees about:
 - 1. The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
 - 2. The Contractor's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
 - 3. Any available drug counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance program; and

- c. Making it a requirement that each employee to be engaged in the performance of the Contract be given a copy of the statement required by paragraph (a);
- d. Notifying the employee in the statement required by paragraph (a) that as a condition of employment under the Contract, the employee will:
 - 1. Abide by the terms of the statement; and
 - 2. Notify the employer in writing of his or her conviction for a violation of a criminal drug statue occurring in the workplace no later than five (5) calendar days after such conviction;
- e. Notifying the County, in writing within ten (10) calendar days after having received notice under subparagraph (d)(2) from an employee or otherwise receiving actual notice of such conviction. Employers of convicted employees must provide notice, including position title, to: Director Grants Management Bureau, State Office Building Campus, Albany, New York 12240. Notice shall include the identification number(s) of each affected contract.
- f. Taking one of the following actions, within thirty (30) calendar days of receiving notice under subparagraph (d)(2), with respect to any employee who is so convicted;
 - 1. Taking appropriate personnel action against such an employee, up to and including termination, consistent with the Requirements of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended; or
 - 2. Requiring such employee to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by a Federal, State or local health, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency;
- g. Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of paragraphs (a),(b),(c),(d),(e),(f).

4. Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPPA).

When applicable to the services provided pursuant to the Contract:

- a. The Contractor, as a Business Associate of the County, shall comply with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, hereinafter referred to as "HIPAA," as well as all regulations promulgated by the Federal Government in furtherance thereof, to assure the privacy and security of all protected health information exchanged between the Contractor and the County. In order to assure such privacy and security, the Contractor agrees to enact the following safeguards for protected health information:
 - 1. Establish policies and procedures, in written or electronic form, that are reasonably designed, taking into consideration the size of, and the type of activities undertaken by, the Contractor, to comply with the Standards for Privacy of Individual Identifiable Health Information, commonly referred to as the Privacy Rule;
 - 2. Utilize a combination of electronic hardware and computer software in order to securely store, maintain, transmit, and access, protected health information electronically; and
 - 3. Utilize an adequate amount of physical hardware, including but not limited to filing cabinets, and locks on drawers, cabinets, and office doors, in order to prevent unwarranted and illegal access to computers and paper files that contain protected health information of the County's clients.
- b. This agreement does not authorize the Contractor to use or further disclose the protected health information that the Contractor handles in treating patients of the County in any manner that would violate the requirements of 45 CFR § 164.504(e), if that same use or disclosure were done by the County, except that:
 - 1. The Contractor may use and disclose protected health information for the Contractor's own proper management and administration; and
 - 2. The Contractor may provide data aggregation services relating to the health care operations of the County.
- c. The Contractor shall:
 - 1. Not use or further disclose protected health information other than as permitted or required by this contract or as required by law;
 - 2. Use appropriate safeguards to prevent the use or disclosure of protected health information other than as provided for in this Contract;
 - 3. Report to the County any use or disclosure of the information not provided for by this Contract of which the Contractor becomes aware;
 - 4. Ensure that any agents, including a subcontractor, to whom the Contractor provides protected health information received from, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of, the County agrees to the same restrictions and conditions that apply to the Contractor with respect to such protected health information;
 - 5. Make available protected health information in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.524;
 - 6. Make available protected health information for amendment and incorporate any amendments to protected health information in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528;
 - 7. Make available the information required to provide an accounting of

- disclosures in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528;
- 8. Make its internal practices, books, and records relating to the use and disclosure of protected health information received from, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of, the County available to the Secretary of Health and Human Services for purposes of determining the County's compliance with 45 CFR § 164.504(e)(2)(ii); and
- 9. At the termination of this Contract, if feasible, return or destroy all protected health information received from, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of, the County that the Contractor still maintains in any form and retain no copies of such information or, if such return or destruction is not feasible, extend the protections of this Contract to such information and limit further uses and disclosures to those purposes that make the return or destruction of the information infeasible.
- d. The Contractor agrees that this contract may be amended if any of the following events occurs:
 - 1. HIPAA, or any of the regulations promulgated in furtherance thereof, is modified by Congress or the Department of Health and Human Services;
 - 2. HIPAA, or any of the regulations promulgated in furtherance thereof, is interpreted by a court in a manner impacting the County's HIPAA compliance; or
 - 3. There is a material change in the business practices and procedures of the County.
- e. Pursuant to 45 CFR § 164.504(e)(2)(iii), the County is authorized to unilaterally terminate this Contract if the County determines that the Contractor has violated a material term of this Contract.

5. Non-Assignment Clause.

In accordance with Section 109 of the General Municipal Law, this Contract may not be assigned by the Contractor or its right, title or interest therein assigned, transferred, conveyed, sublet or otherwise disposed of without the County's previous written consent, and attempts to do so are null and void. The Contractor may, however, assign its right to receive payments without the County's prior written consent unless this Contract concerns Certificates of Participation pursuant to Section 109-b of the General Municipal Law.

6. Worker's Compensation Benefits.

In accordance with Section 108 of the General Municipal Law, this Contract shall be void and of no force and effect unless the Contractor shall provide and maintain coverage during the life of this Contract for the benefit of such employees as are required to be covered by the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Law.

7. Non-Discrimination Requirements.

To the extent required by Article 15 of the Executive Law (also known as the Human Rights Law) and all other State and Federal statutory and constitutional non-discrimination provisions, the Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed, color, sex, national origin, sexual orientation, age, disability, genetic predisposition or carrier status, or marital status.

Furthermore, in accordance with Section 220-e of the Labor Law, if this is a Contract for the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work or for the manufacture, sale or distribution of materials, equipment or supplies, and to the extent that this Contract shall be performed within the State of New York, the Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall, by reason of race, creed, color, disability, sex, or national origin: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this Contract. If this is a building service contract as defined in Section 230 of the Labor Law, then, in accordance with Section 239 thereof, the Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall by reason of race, creed, color, national origin, age, sex or disability: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this Contract. The Contractor is subject to fines of \$50.00 per person per day for any violation of Section 220-e or Section 239 as well as possible termination of this Contract and forfeiture of all moneys due hereunder for a second or subsequent violation.

8. Wage and Hours Provisions.

If this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law or a building service contract covered by Article 9 thereof, neither the Contractor's employees nor the employees of its subcontractors may be required or permitted to work more than the number of hours or days stated in said statutes, except as otherwise provided in the Labor Law and as set forth in prevailing wage and supplement schedules issued by the State Labor Department. Furthermore, the Contractor and its subcontractors must pay at least the prevailing wage rate and pay or provide the prevailing supplements, including the premium rates for overtime pay, as determined by the State Labor Department in accordance with the Labor Law. Additionally, effective April 28, 2008, if this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law, the Contractor understands and agrees that the filing of payrolls in a manner consistent with Subdivision 3-a of Section 220 of the Labor Law shall be a condition precedent to payment by the County of any County approved sums due and owing for work done upon the project.

9. Non-Collusive Bidding Certification.

In accordance with Section 103-d of the General Municipal Law, if this Contract is awarded based upon the submission of bids, the Contractor affirms, under penalty of perjury, that its bid was arrived at independently and without collusion aimed at restricting competition. The Contractor further affirms that, at the time the Contractor submitted its bid, an authorized and responsible person executed and delivered to the County a non-collusive bidding certification on the Contractor's behalf.

10. Records.

The Contractor shall establish and maintain complete and accurate books, records, documents, accounts and other evidence directly pertinent to performance under this Contract (hereinafter, collectively, "the Records"). The Records shall include, but not be limited to, reports, statements, examinations, letters, memoranda, opinions, folders, files, books, manuals, pamphlets, forms, papers, designs, drawings, maps, photos, letters, microfilms, computer tapes or discs, electronic files, e-mails and attachments, rules, regulations and codes. The Records must be kept for the balance of the calendar year in which they were made and for six (6) additional years thereafter. The County Comptroller, the County Attorney and any other person or entity authorized to conduct an examination, as well as the agency or agencies involved in

this Contract, shall have access to the Records during normal business hours at an office of the Contractor within the County or, if no such office is available, at a mutually agreeable and reasonable venue within the County, for the term specified above for the purposes of inspection, auditing and copying. The County shall take reasonable steps to protect from public disclosure any of the Records which are exempt from disclosure under Section 87 of the Public Officers Law (the "Statute") provided that: (a) the Contractor shall timely inform an appropriate County official, in writing, that said records should not be disclosed; (b) said records shall be sufficiently identified; and (c) designation of said records as exempt under the Statute is reasonable. Nothing contained herein shall diminish, or in any way adversely affect, the County's right to discovery in any pending or future litigation. Notwithstanding any other language, the Records may be subject to disclosure under the New York Freedom of Information Law, for other applicable state or federal law, rule or regulation.

11. Identifying Information and Privacy Notification.

- a. Identification Number(s). Every invoice or claim for payment submitted to a County agency by a payee, for payment for the sale of goods or service or for transactions (e.g., leases, easements, licenses, etc.) related to real or personal property must include the payee's identification number. The number is any or all of the following: (i) the payee's Federal employer identification number, (ii) the payee's Federal social security number, and/or (iii) the payee's Vendor Identification Number assigned by the Statewide Financial System. Where the payee does not have such number or numbers, the payees, on its invoice or claim for payment, must give the reason or reasons why the payee does not have such number or numbers.
- b. Privacy Notification. (1) The authority to request the above personal information from a seller of goods or services or a lessor of real or personal property, and the authority to maintain such information, is found in Section 5 of the State Tax Law. Disclosure of this information by the seller or lessor to the County is mandatory. The principle purpose for which the information is collected is to enable the State to identify individuals, businesses and others who have been delinquent in filing tax returns or may have understated their liabilities and to generally identify persons affected by the taxes administered by the New York State Commissioner of Taxation and Finance. The information will be used for tax administration purposes and for any other purpose authorized by law. (2) The personal information is requested by the County's purchasing unit contracting to purchase goods or services or lease the real or personal property covered by this Contract.

12. Conflicting Terms.

In the event of a conflict between the terms of the Contract (including any and all attachments thereto and amendments thereof) and the terms of this Addendum, the terms of this Addendum shall control.

13. Governing Law.

This Contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of New York except where the Federal supremacy clause requires otherwise.

14. Prohibition on Purchase of Tropical Hardwoods.

The Contractor certifies and warrants that all wood products to be used under this Contract award will be

in accordance with, but not limited to, the specifications and provisions of Section 165 of the State Finance Law (Use of Tropical Hardwoods), which prohibits purchase and use of tropical hardwoods, unless specifically exempted by the State or any governmental agency or political subdivision or public benefit corporation. Qualification for an exemption under this law will be the responsibility of the Contractor to establish to meet with the approval of the County.

In addition, when any portion of this Contract involving the use of woods, whether supply or installation, is to be performed by any subcontractor, the prime Contractor will indicate and certify in the submitted bid proposal that the subcontractor has been informed and is in compliance with specifications and provisions regarding use of tropical hardwoods as detailed in Section 165 of the State Finance Law. Any such use must meet with approval of the County; otherwise, the bid may not be considered responsive. Under bidder certifications, proof of qualification for exemption will be the responsibility of the Contractor to meet with the approval of the County.

15. Compliance with New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act.

The Contractor shall comply with the provisions of the New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act (General Business Law Section 899-aa).

16. Gratuities and Kickbacks.

- a. Gratuities. It shall be unethical for any person to offer, give, or agree to give any County employee or former County employee, or for any County employee or former County employee to solicit, demand, accept, or agree to accept from another person, a gratuity or an offer of employment in connection with any decision, approval, disapproval, recommendation, or preparation of any part of a program requirement or a purchase request, influencing the content of any specification or procurement standard, rendering of advice, investigation, auditing, or in any other advisory capacity in any proceeding or application, request for ruling, determination, claim, or controversy, or other particular matter, pertaining to any program requirement or a contract or subcontract, or to any solicitation or proposal therefor.
- b. Kickbacks. It shall be unethical for any payment, gratuity, or offer of employment to be made by or on behalf of a subcontractor under a contract to the prime contractor or higher tier subcontractor or any person associated therewith, as an inducement for the award of a subcontract or order.

17. Audit

The County, the State of New York, and the United States shall have the right at any time during the term of this agreement and for the period limited by the applicable statute of limitations to audit the payment of monies hereunder. The Contractor shall comply with any demands made by the County to provide information with respect to the payment of monies hereunder during the period covered by this paragraph. The Contractor shall maintain its books and records in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles or such other method of account which is approved in writing by the County prior to the date of this agreement. The revenues and expenditures of the Contractor in connection with this agreement shall be separately identifiable. Each expenditure or claim for payment shall be fully documented. Expenditures or claims for payment which are not fully documented may be disallowed. The Contractor agrees to provide to or permit the County to examine or obtain copies of any documents relating to the payment of money to the Contractor or expenditures made by the Contractor for which reimbursement is made to the Contractor by the County. The

Contractor shall maintain all records required by this paragraph for 7 years after the date this agreement is terminated or ends.

If the Contractor has expended, in any fiscal year, \$300,000.00 or more in funds provided by a Federal financial assistance program from a Federal agency pursuant to this agreement and all other contracts with the County, the Contractor shall provide the County with an audit prepared by an independent auditor in accordance with the Single Audit Act of 1984, 31 U.S.C. §§ 7501, et seq., as amended, and the regulations adopted pursuant to such Act.

18. Certification of compliance with the Iran Divestment Act.

Pursuant Section 103-g of the General Municipal Law, by submitting a bid in response to this solicitation or by assuming the responsibility of a Contract awarded hereunder, each Bidder/Contractor, any person signing on behalf of any Bidder/Contractor and any assignee or subcontractor and, in the case of a joint bid, each party thereto, certifies, under penalty of perjury, that once the Prohibited Entities List is posted on the Office of General Services (OGS) website, that to the best of its knowledge and belief, that each Bidder/Contractor and any subcontractor or assignee is not identified on the Prohibited Entities List created pursuant to State Finance Law § 165-a(3)(b).

Additionally, the Bidder/Contractor is advised that once the Prohibited Entities List is posted on the OGS website, any Bidder/Contractor seeking to renew or extend a Contract or assume the responsibility of a Contract awarded in response to this solicitation must certify at the time the Contract is renewed, extended or assigned that it is not included on the Prohibited Entities List.

During the term of the Contract, should the County receive information that a Bidder/Contractor is in violation of the above-referenced certification, the County will offer the person or entity an opportunity to respond. If the person or entity fails to demonstrate that he/she/it has ceased engagement in the investment which is in violation of the Iran Divestment Act of 2012 within 90 days after the determination of such violation, then the County shall take such action as may be appropriate including, but not limited to, imposing sanctions, seeking compliance, recovering damages or declaring the Bidder/Contractor in default.

The County reserves the right to reject any bid or request for assignment for a Bidder/Contractor that appears on the Prohibited Entities List prior to the award of a Contract and to pursue a responsibility review with respect to any Bidder/Contractor that is awarded a Contract and subsequently appears on the Prohibited Entities List.

Summary Statements:

I. Narrative Description of Service/Program:

A. Outreach-Court/Forensic Evaluation Unit (0690) (\$676,434)

- 1. <u>Screening and Jail Diversion</u>: The Courts refer individuals for screening, case planning, employment services and monitoring. These individuals have a mental illness, substance abuse addiction or dual diagnosis. They are diverted from the Correctional Facility and receive treatment and other services from community providers. Successful completion of the Mental Health Court treatment plan results in dismissal of the charges.
- 2. <u>Suicide Prevention And Screening:</u> Located at Oneida County Correctional Facility. All persons admitted to the Oneida County Correctional Facility are assessed for lethality (potential for suicide); individuals assessed as needing supports are monitored for possible symptoms of depression or decompensation. Crisis intervention services and medication assessments are available.
- 3. <u>Enhanced Forensic Case Management:</u> Located at 1411 Genesee Street. Follow-up discharge planning for incarcerated individuals to improve the compliance rate for engagement in the community supports, reduce homelessness, reduces recidivism and to reduce ED/Inpatient treatment. This includes providing and arranging transportation, home visitations, attending case management consultations and monitoring court process.
- 4. <u>Mandated OMH Services:</u> a) CPL 730 evaluations ordered by Oneida County Courts to determine if defendants with mental defects can understand criminal charges and assist in their own defense; b) Medication Grant Program- provides short term medications for mentally ill individuals released from jails, prisons and psychiatric hospitals; c) Adult Single Point of Access and Accountability- for care coordination and residential services

B. Transition Management Services (1970) (\$108,484)

Located within the Forensic Behavioral Health Unit at Oneida County Correctional Facility, provides initial referral and linkage to appropriate treatment services, including employment training, support and readiness, for inmates upon their discharged from jail.

C. Advocacy (1760) (\$170,996)

Located within the Forensic Behavioral Health Unit at Oneida County Correctional Facility and integral to the Bridger Program, Advocacy, provides initial referral and linkage to treatment, and employment training for inmates upon their discharged from jail.

D. Coordinated Children's Services Initiative (CCSI) (2990) (\$71,330)

a) Staff located at Oneida Count Probation Department uses an assessment tool to assist in the management and planning of services to children and adolescents with juvenile justice involvement; b) Clinical oversight of Parent Advocates whom provide support to parents and arrange for community services for children with mental illness.

E. Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) Service Dollars (8810) (\$44,224)

Administers wrap-around service funds to assist the ACT Team @ Mohawk Valley Psychiatric Center to sustain a person within the larger community and/or to assist them in reduction of hospital stays and/or contact with the criminal justice system.

F. Mentally Ill Chemical Abuse Network (5990) (\$108,227)

This case management service assists the individual to avoid additional contacts with the criminal justice system by obtaining treatment that addresses all of the disability issues concurrently, sustaining the individual through the inevitable short-term setbacks and providing case management support and advocacy for the dually diagnosed person.

G. Advocacy/Support Shelter Plus Care (3078/52147) (\$123,750)

Shelter Plus Care Housing assists 240+ persons and their families in obtaining and sustaining quality housing to help ensure continuing participation in treatment, employment and other services aiding in their recovery from substance abuse. Individuals are assisted in finding affordable housing within Oneida County, establish income eligibility for a Section 8 housing subsidy and understand the Public Assistance/Social Security benefits process.

II. Service/Program Objectives and Outcomes:

All services provided through the court system are intended to divert individuals with a mental illness from the criminal justice system and jail. Suicide screening and assessment services, in particular, are designed as a proactive, preventative measure to eliminate the risk of potential cases. Community based services are designed to meet the care coordination needs of those with mental illness including both adults and children, co-occurring disorders, and OMH mandated services.

III. Service/Program Design and Staffing:

All programs and individual staffing criteria meet NYS Office of Mental Health (OMH) and NYS Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) guidelines and regulations.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT between Oneida County, by and through its Department of Mental Health, with offices at 120 Airline Street, Suite 200, Oriskany, New York 13424, hereinafter referred to as the "County" and Central New York Services, Inc., having its principal office located at 518 James Street, Suite 240, Syracuse, New York 13203, hereinafter referred to as the "Provider Agency".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County through its Department of Mental Health desires to establish a comprehensive and integrated system of community mental health services as required by Article 41 of the Mental Hygiene Law of the State of New York; and

WHEREAS, Article 41 of New York State (hereinafter referred to as the "State") Mental Hygiene Law mandates and authorizes the County through its Department of Mental Health to enter into a series of Agreements, which establish a comprehensive and integrated system of community mental health services that will address the needs of the citizens and residents of Oneida County; and

WHEREAS, the Provider Agency hereby warrants that they have the proper and necessary staff and infrastructure to act as a provider and resource to and for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health; and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants hereinafter expressed, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The term of this Agreement shall be from January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2016 or until terminated according to the stipulations contained within this contract.
 - 2. The **Provider Agency** shall:
 - (A) Provide the following Outreach Services for the Courts and Oneida County Correctional Facility consistent with New York State Office of Mental Health (OMH) regulation:
 - 1. Screening, case planning, employment services, referrals and monitoring for adults referred by the court system whom have a mental illness and or substance abuse/addiction;
 - 2. Case Management services for individuals whom are being considered, referred or terminated from Mental Health Court;
 - 3. Suicide prevention and screening at the time of booking into Oneida County Correctional Facility. Services to include assessment of lethality and monitoring for possible symptoms of depression or decompensating, crisis intervention, medication assessment and referrals to providers upon release;
 - 4. Follow-up discharge planning for incarcerated individuals including transportation, home visitations, attending case management consultations with providers, liaison between community providers and staff at the jail.
 - (B) Coordination of CPL 730 evaluations, Adult Single Point of Access and Accountability (SPOAA) process, and administration of the Medication Grant Program;
 - (C) Provide Transition Management Services for inmates being released from jail including initial referral and linkage to appropriate treatment services,

- and assistance in obtaining benefits;
- (D) Provide Advocacy services to inmates at Oneida County Correctional Facility including employment/training;
- (E) Monitoring of the Coordinated Children's Services Initiative through involvement with the juvenile justice system including the Committee for Alternative Placement and clinical oversight of Parent Advocates whom arrange for services for children with mental illness;
- (F) Administer Service Dollars to the Oneida County Assertive Community Treatment Team located at Mohawk Valley Psychiatric Center, processing requests for funds for emergency and non-emergency services;
- (G) Mentally Ill Chemical Abuser (MICA) Network case management services to homeless individuals and provide support, advocacy, and linkage to treatment;
- (H) Administer Shelter Plus Care Housing program, including arranging assistance in obtaining and sustaining housing, performing annual apartment safety inspections and referral and linkage to service providers.
- 3. The **Provider Agency** agrees, where applicable, to provide any and all **Services**, authorized by this agreement or other license or certification, to individuals involved in the NYS OMH Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) Program. This includes individuals under a court order and individuals that meet the criteria for an AOT order but have been diverted from the formal court proceedings. The **Provider Agency** further agrees to provide any and all required client-specific information as required by the State of New York and/or the Oneida County Department of Mental Health for monitoring purposes. It is expressly understood that all information sent to the Oneida County Department of Mental Health will be handled in a <u>safe and confidential</u> manner.
- 4. The **Provider Agency** agrees to participate in the development and implementation of the Local Governmental Plan. Participation may include but not necessarily be limited to: attendance at appropriate subcommittee meetings; notification to a subcommittee of intent to submit a Certificate of Need (CON) application and/or grant application which will modify **Services** offered by the **Provider Agency**; submission of planning reports and CON applications and/or Prior Approval and Review applications to the **County** prior to submission to the **State**; attendance and cooperation with various ad hoc work groups of the subcommittee.
- 5. The **Provider Agency** shall not be entitled to any of the benefits of an employee of the County of Oneida, such as New York State Employee's Retirement Benefits, Unemployment Insurance, Worker's Compensation, Employee's Medical, Hospital, Dental, Prescription, Optical coverage; and any other benefits that an employee of the County of Oneida normally is eligible to receive.
- 6. The **Provider Agency** is an independent contractor under this Agreement to perform a specialized service for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health. The **Provider Agency** further agrees to hold the County of Oneida harmless for all of their actions and warrants.
- 7. For the Services provided, the Oneida County Department of Mental Health will reimburse The **Provider Agency** a maximum of \$1,518,261.00 (one million five hundred eighteen thousand two hundred sixty one dollars) per year. This shall include but not be limited to travel time, evaluation time and any court time as deemed necessary by the court. The payment schedule will be based upon submission of an Oneida County Voucher to the Department of Mental Health. Annexed hereto and made part here of as **Appendix A**.
- 8. In the event that the **State** or **County** approves or makes changes to the funding amount that is listed in **Appendix A**, the **Provider Agency**, at the request of the **County** shall submit a revised budget plan which reflects the approved Operating Costs, Net Operating Costs and funding by the various Deficit Funding Sources. It is expressly understood that the **County** assumes no responsibility for either costs not approved for reimbursements by the either the **County** or the **State**;

or changes to the budget anytime during the contract period. Should any expenses be disapproved in a post-audit by the State of New York or funds are not spent in the approved programs during the fiscal year, the **Provider Agency** shall submit a check payable to the **County Commissioner of Finance** equal to the amount of any disallowance already paid to the **Provider Agency** by the **County** within thirty (30) days of notification. This provision shall apply to this agreement and all previous agreements between the **County** and the **Provider Agency**.

- 9. The **County** will make State Aid Payments either monthly or quarterly based on payments made to the **County** by New York State and the timely submission of correct monthly payment vouchers. Payments will be provided subsequent to services rendered and upon review of the voucher receipt submitted by the **Provider Agency**.
- 10. The **Provider Agency** agrees to submit to the **County** on the last business day of the following month at the end of each quarter (i.e. Jan-Mar report due April 30th) a Quarterly Financial Analysis, Performance Analysis, and Service Utilization Report. In addition, the **Provider Agency** agrees to submit the following reports by the listed required dates as applicable to funding received:
 - a) Office of Persons with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD) Budgets for the current year is required to be received by the County by February 1st.
 - b) Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) Estimated Claims for the prior year are required to be received by the County by April 15th.
 - c) Pre-Approved 30-day Office of Mental Health (OMH) Consolidated Fiscal Report (CFR) Extension Requests for the prior year OMH CFR are required to be received by the County by April 15th.
 - d) *OMH*, *OASAS* and *OPWDD* (Full) Audited CFR for the prior year that do not have a pre-approved 30-day extension (OMH only) are required to be received by the County by April 15th. An OPWDD Estimated CFR is required by this date if an extension was filed. An OASAS Estimated Claim is required to be received by this date; no extension allowed for OASAS CFRs.
 - e) Fully Audited CFRs for OMH, OPWDD, and OASAS for the prior year with an extension submitted for OMH and OPWDD and/or an Estimated OASAS CFR supplied to the County by April 15th are required to be received by the County by May 15th.
 - f) OASAS Mid-Year Claim for the current year is required to be received by the County by August 1st.
 - g) OASAS Consolidated Budget Report (CBR) for the next year is (with scope) required to be received by the County by September 15th.
 - h) **OMH CBRs** for the current year are required to be received by the **County** by October 15th.
- 11. The **Provider Agency** shall submit a copy of the following reports during the first quarter of each Fiscal Year:
 - a) Disaster Response Plan. In addition the **Provider Agency** will participate in the development of an Oneida County plan to respond to man-made or natural disasters.
 - b) Accounting System & Financial Capability Questionnaire (where applicable).
 - c) Corporate Compliance Plan. The plan will reflect efforts to ensure that personnel are aware of and in compliance with relevant laws and regulations.
 - d) Annual Audit and Financial Reports.
 - e) Federal Single Audit Report. If the **Provider Agency** is scheduled to receive funds in excess of \$300,000.00 or more in a year in federal funds, exclusive of Medicaid and Medicare. The Single Audit shall be conducted in accordance with OMB Circular A-133, OMB Circular A-110, the A-102 Common Rule and

such other circulars, interpretations, opinions, rules or regulations that may be issued in connection with the single Audit Act Amendments of 1996.

- 12. The **Provider Agency** shall operate all programs in compliance with the laws, rules and regulations as passed and /or promulgated by the **County**, State or Federal governments. It is further understood by the **Provider Agency** that agencies and departments of New York State other than OMH, Office of Alcoholism & Substance Abuse Services (OASAS), and Office of Persons with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD) may promulgate these rules and regulations.
- 13. The Provider Agency further covenants and agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the County, its officers, agents and employees, from and against any and all loss or expenses that may arise by reason of liability for damage, injury or death, or for invasion of personal or property rights, of every name and nature, and whether casual or continuing trespass or nuisance, and any other claims for damages arising at law and equity alleged to have been caused or sustained in whole or in part by or because of any omission of duty, negligence or wrongful act on the part of the Provider Agency and the County, their officers, agents or employees, in connection with this Agreement. In addition, the Provider Agency shall obtain and maintain comprehensive general liability insurance satisfactory to the County with a minimum of \$1,000,000 per occurrence coverage. The County of Oneida must be named as an "Additionally Insured" as part of the Provider Agency's insurance policy. Proof of same must be provided to the County at the time of the execution of this contract. It is expressly understood that if during the course of this Agreement, said insurance policy is canceled or otherwise allowed to lapse, the Provider Agency must provide the County proof of insurance consistent with the stipulations listed above. Failure to do may result in the immediate termination of this Agreement.
- 14. Either party may terminate this Agreement by giving fifteen (15) days prior written notice of such termination to the other party. Notwithstanding the above, if, through any cause, the **Provider Agency** fails to comply with legal, professional, **County** or **State** requirements for the provision of the services covered under this Agreement, or if the **Provider Agency** becomes bankrupt or insolvent or falsify their records or reports, the **County** may terminate this Agreement effective immediately, or, at its option, effective at a later date after sending notice of such termination to the **Provider Agency**.

The **County** shall be released from any and all responsibilities and obligations arising from the services covered by this Agreement, effective as of the date of termination. The **County** shall be responsible for payment of all claims for services provided and costs incurred by the **Provider Agency** prior to the termination of this Agreement that are pursuant to and after **Provider Agency** compliance with the terms and conditions herein.

Notice of termination must be in writing, signed by an authorized official, and sent to the other party by certified mail or messenger, and receipt shall be requested. Notice of termination shall be deemed delivered as of the date of it's posting by certified mail or at the time it is delivered to the other party by messenger.

If any term or provision of this Agreement shall be found to be illegal or unenforceable, then, notwithstanding the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and such term or provision shall be deemed stricken. The laws of the State of New York shall govern this contract and jurisdiction and venue shall lie within the State of New York.

15. The **Provider Agency** agrees to maintain files in a confidential manner pursuant to the applicable statutes contained in New York State Mental Hygiene Law and any Federal Law regulating such files. Information contained in these files shall be released only upon the written consent of the client being served or to the Oneida County Department of Mental Health as outlined below.

It is expressly understood that as a **Provider Agency** for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health, it may and will receive confidential information from the Department of Mental Health and this information may have been received from other independent contractors and/or

licensed agencies. The **Provider Agency** agrees that all such information will be considered as being confidential and shall not be re-disclosed without the written consent of the individual.

Accordingly, as a condition of and in consideration of access to confidential information, the **Provider Agency** promises that:

- A. They will use confidential information only as needed to perform the legitimate duties as outlined above for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health and the Tier I program. This means, among other things, that:
- 1. The **Provider Agency** will only access confidential information for which there is a need to know; and
- 2. The **Provider Agency** will not in any way divulge, copy, release, sell, loan review, alter or destroy any confidential information except as properly authorized.
- 3. The **Provider Agency** will not misuse confidential information or carelessly handle confidential information.
 - B. The **Provider Agency** will safeguard and will not disclose any access code or any other authorization that allows access to confidential information. The **Provider Agency** accepts responsibility for all activities undertaken using any access code and other authorization.
 - C. The **Provider Agency** will report activities by any individual or entity that is suspected of or may compromise the confidentiality of confidential information. Reports made in good faith about suspect activities will be held in confidence to the extent permitted by law, including the name of the individual reporting the activities.
 - D. The **Provider Agency** understands that the obligations under this Agreement will continue after termination of employment and that it is further understood that any privileges hereunder are subject to periodic review, revision and if appropriate, renewal.
 - E. The **Provider Agency** understands that there is no right or ownership interest in any confidential information referred to in this Agreement. The Oneida County Department of Mental Health may at any time revoke any access code, other authorization, or access to confidential information. At all times during the course of providing services under this Agreement, the **Provider Agency** will safeguard the confidentiality of all confidential information.
 - F. The **Provider Agency** will be responsible for any misuse or wrongful disclosure of confidential information and for any failure to safeguard an access code or other authorization access to confidential information. It is expressly understood that any failure to comply with this Agreement may result in immediate termination of access to the information system and legal action against the **Provider**.
- 16. The **Provider Agency** agrees not to discriminate or refuse assistance to individuals diagnosed with AIDS or an HIV infection or an HIV related illness. If the **Provider Agency** is provided with any confidential HIV related information during the course of providing services and in accordance with 403 of Title 18 of the NYSDSS regulation and Section 2782 of the Public Health Law, they shall be informed of the penalties and fines for any redisclosure found to be in violation of New York State Law and/or Regulation.

The **Provider Agency** shall include the following written statement when disclosing any confidential HIV related Information:

"This information has been disclosed to you from confidential records, which are protected by State Law. State Law prohibits you from making any further disclosure of this information without the specific written consent of the person to whom it pertains, or as otherwise permitted by law. Any unauthorized further disclosure in violation of State Law may result in a fine or jail sentence or both. A general authorization for the release of medical or other information is not sufficient authorization for further disclosure."

17. The **Provider Agency** agrees that as mandated reporters, all instances of suspected child abuse, neglect, and/or maltreatment, will be reported to the Central Registry as required by law. These

verbal reports will be followed by submission of completed 2221A to the local Department of Social Services. The family will be informed in advance of the decision to file a report with the Central Register. The **Provider Agency** shall also notify the Commissioner of Oneida County Department of Mental Health of any and all reports made to the Child Abuse Registry.

- 18. It is understood that this instrument represents the entire Agreement of the parties hereto; both parties shall execute that all previous understandings are merged herein; and that no modifications hereof shall be valid unless written evidence shall be executed thereof.
- 19. **Miscellaneous Provisions:** Annexed hereto and made a part hereof as Appendix A and Appendix B are additional terms, covenants and conditions which the respective parties agree to be bound by and follow as part of this Agreement.

WHEREAS, COUNTY and CONTRACTOR have entered into a contract, license, lease, amendment or other agreement of any kind (hereinafter referred to as the "Contract"), and

WHEREAS, the Oneida County Attorney and the Oneida County Director of Purchasing have recommended the inclusion of the standard clauses set forth in this Addendum to be included in every Contract for which COUNTY is a party, now, thereafter,

The parties to the attached Contract, for good consideration, agree to be bound by the following clauses which are hereby made a part of the Contract.

1. Executor or Non-Appropriation Clause.

The County shall have no liability or obligation under this Contract to the Contractor or to anyone else beyond the annual funds being appropriated and available for this Contract.

2. Oneida County Board of Legislators: Resolution #249 Solid Waste Disposal Requirements.

Pursuant to Oneida County Board of Legislator Resolution No. 249 of May 26, 1999, the Contractor agrees to deliver exclusively to the facilities of the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority, all waste and recyclables generated within the Authority's service area by performance of this Contract by the Contractor and any subcontractors. Upon awarding of this Contract, and before work commences, the Contractor will be required to provide Oneida County with proof that Resolution No. 249 of 1999 has been complied with, and that all wastes and recyclables in the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority's service area which are generated by the Contractor and any subcontractors in performance of this Contract will be delivered exclusively to Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority facilities.

3. Certification Regarding Lobbying; Debarment, Suspension and other Responsibility Matters; and Drug-Free Workplace Requirements.

- a. Lobbying. As required by Section 1352, Title 31 of the U.S. Code and implemented at 34 CFR Part 82 for persons entering into a grant or cooperative agreement over \$100,000, as defined at 34 CFR Part 82, Section 82.105 and 82.110, the Contractor certifies that:
 - 1. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the Contractor, to any persons for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, and officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the making of any Federal Grant, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and

- the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal grant or cooperative agreement.
- 2. If any funds other than federally appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this federal grant or cooperative agreement, the Contractor shall complete and submit Standard Form 111 "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.
- 3. The Contractor shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all subcontracts and that all subcontractors shall certify and disclose accordingly.
- b. Debarment, Suspension and other Responsibility Matters. As required by Executive Order 12549, Debarments and Suspension, and implemented at 34 CFR Part 85, for prospective participants in primary covered transactions, as defined at 34 CFR Part 85, Sections 83.105 and 85.110,
 - 1. The Contractor certifies that it and its principals:
 - a. Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any Federal department or agency;
 - b. Have not within a three-year period preceding this Contract been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (Federal, State or local) transaction or contracts under a public transaction, violation of federal or State antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements, or receiving stolen property;
 - c. Are not presently indicated or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a Government entity (Federal, State or local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in paragraph 1(b) of this certification; and
 - d. Have not within a three-year period preceding this Contract had one or more public transactions (Federal, State, or local) for cause or default; and
 - 2. Where the Contractor is unable to certify to any of the statements in this certification, he or she shall attach an explanation to this Contract.
- c. Drug-Free Workplace (Contractors other than individuals). As required by the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988, and implemented at 34 CFR Part 85, Subpart F, for Contractors, as defined at 34 CFR Part 85, Sections 85.605 and 85.610:
 - 1. The Contractor will or will continue to provide a drug-free workplace by:
 - a. Publishing a statement notifying employees that the manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the Contractor's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violation of such prohibition;

- e. Notifying the County, in writing within ten (10) calendar days after having received notice under subparagraph (d)(2) from an employee or otherwise receiving actual notice of such conviction. Employers of convicted employees must provide notice, including position title, to: Director Grants Management Bureau, State Office Building Campus, Albany, New York 12240. Notice shall include the identification number(s) of each affected contract.
- f. Taking one of the following actions, within thirty (30) calendar days of receiving notice under subparagraph (d)(2), with respect to any employee who is so convicted;
 - 1. Taking appropriate personnel action against such an employee, up to and including termination, consistent with the Requirements of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended; or
 - 2. Requiring such employee to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by a Federal, State or local health, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency;
- g. Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of paragraphs (a),(b),(c),(d),(e),(f).
- 2. The Contractor may insert in the space provided below the site(s) for the performance of work done in connection with the specific contract.

 - 1. As a condition of the contract, the Contractor certifies that he or she will not engage in the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance in conducting any activity with the Contract; and
 - 2. 4. Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPPA).

When applicable to the services provided pursuant to the Contract:

- a. The Contractor, as a Business Associate of the County, shall comply with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, hereinafter referred to as "HIPAA," as well as all regulations promulgated by the Federal Government in furtherance thereof, to assure the privacy and security of all protected health information exchanged between the Contractor and the County. In order to assure such privacy and security, the Contractor agrees to enact the following safeguards for protected health information:
 - 1. Establish policies and procedures, in written or electronic form, that are reasonably designed, taking into consideration the size of, and the type of activities undertaken by, the Contractor, to comply with the Standards for Privacy of Individual Identifiable Health Information, commonly referred to as the Privacy Rule;
 - 2. Utilize a combination of electronic hardware and computer software in order to securely store, maintain, transmit, and access, protected health information electronically; and
 - 3. Utilize an adequate amount of physical hardware, including but not limited to filing cabinets, and locks on drawers, cabinets, and office doors, in order to prevent unwarranted and illegal access to computers and paper files that contain protected health information of the County's clients.
- This agreement does not authorize the Contractor to use or further disclose the protected health information that the Contractor handles in treating patients of the County in any manner that would violate the requirements of 45 CFR §

 164.504(e), if that same use or disclosure were done by the County, except that:
 - 1. The Contractor may use and disclose protected health information for the Contractor's own proper management and administration; and
 - 2. The Contractor may provide data aggregation services relating to the health care operations of the County.
- c. The Contractor shall:
 - 1. Not use or further disclose protected health information other than as permitted or required by this contract or as required by law;
 - 2. Use appropriate safeguards to prevent the use or disclosure of protected health information other than as provided for in this Contract;
 - 3. Report to the County any use or disclosure of the information not provided for by this Contract of which the Contractor becomes aware;
 - 4. Ensure that any agents, including a subcontractor, to whom the Contractor provides protected health information received from, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of, the County agrees to the same restrictions and conditions that apply to the Contractor with respect to such protected health information;
 - 5. Make available protected health information in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.524;
 - 6. Make available protected health information for amendment and incorporate any amendments to protected health information in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528;
 - 7. Make available the information required to provide an accounting of

Furthermore, in accordance with Section 220-e of the Labor Law, if this is a Contract for the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work or for the manufacture, sale or distribution of materials, equipment or supplies, and to the extent that this Contract shall be performed within the State of New York, the Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall, by reason of race, creed, color, disability, sex, or national origin: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this Contract. If this is a building service contract as defined in Section 230 of the Labor Law, then, in accordance with Section 239 thereof, the Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall by reason of race, creed, color, national origin, age, sex or disability: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this Contract. The Contractor is subject to fines of \$50.00 per person per day for any violation of Section 220-e or Section 239 as well as possible termination of this Contract and forfeiture of all moneys due hereunder for a second or subsequent violation.

8. Wage and Hours Provisions.

If this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law or a building service contract covered by Article 9 thereof, neither the Contractor's employees nor the employees of its subcontractors may be required or permitted to work more than the number of hours or days stated in said statutes, except as otherwise provided in the Labor Law and as set forth in prevailing wage and supplement schedules issued by the State Labor Department. Furthermore, the Contractor and its subcontractors must pay at least the prevailing wage rate and pay or provide the prevailing supplements, including the premium rates for overtime pay, as determined by the State Labor Department in accordance with the Labor Law. Additionally, effective April 28, 2008, if this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law, the Contractor understands and agrees that the filing of payrolls in a manner consistent with Subdivision 3-a of Section 220 of the Labor Law shall be a condition precedent to payment by the County of any County approved sums due and owing for work done upon the project.

9. Non-Collusive Bidding Certification.

In accordance with Section 103-d of the General Municipal Law, if this Contract is awarded based upon the submission of bids, the Contractor affirms, under penalty of perjury, that its bid was arrived at independently and without collusion aimed at restricting competition. The Contractor further affirms that, at the time the Contractor submitted its bid, an authorized and responsible person executed and delivered to the County a non-collusive bidding certification on the Contractor's behalf.

10. Records.

The Contractor shall establish and maintain complete and accurate books, records, documents, accounts and other evidence directly pertinent to performance under this Contract (hereinafter, collectively, "the Records"). The Records shall include, but not be limited to, reports, statements, examinations, letters, memoranda, opinions, folders, files, books, manuals, pamphlets, forms, papers, designs, drawings, maps, photos, letters, microfilms, computer tapes or discs, electronic files, e-mails and attachments, rules, regulations and codes. The Records must be kept for the balance of the calendar year in which they were made and for six (6) additional years thereafter. The County Comptroller, the County Attorney and any other person or entity authorized to conduct an examination, as well as the agency or agencies involved in

this Contract, shall have access to the Records during normal business hours at an office of the Contractor within the County or, if no such office is available, at a mutually agreeable and reasonable venue within the County, for the term specified above for the purposes of inspection, auditing and copying. The County shall take reasonable steps to protect from public disclosure any of the Records which are exempt from disclosure under Section 87 of the Public Officers Law (the "Statute") provided that: (a) the Contractor shall timely inform an appropriate County official, in writing, that said records should not be disclosed; (b) said records shall be sufficiently identified; and (c) designation of said records as exempt under the Statute is reasonable. Nothing contained herein shall diminish, or in any way adversely affect, the County's right to discovery in any pending or future litigation. Notwithstanding any other language, the Records may be subject to disclosure under the New York Freedom of Information Law, for other applicable state or federal law, rule or regulation.

11. Identifying Information and Privacy Notification.

- a. Identification Number(s). Every invoice or claim for payment submitted to a County agency by a payee, for payment for the sale of goods or service or for transactions (e.g., leases, easements, licenses, etc.) related to real or personal property must include the payee's identification number. The number is any or all of the following: (i) the payee's Federal employer identification number, (ii) the payee's Federal social security number, and/or (iii) the payee's Vendor Identification Number assigned by the Statewide Financial System. Where the payee does not have such number or numbers, the payees, on its invoice or claim for payment, must give the reason or reasons why the payee does not have such number or numbers.
- b. Privacy Notification. (1) The authority to request the above personal information from a seller of goods or services or a lessor of real or personal property, and the authority to maintain such information, is found in Section 5 of the State Tax Law. Disclosure of this information by the seller or lessor to the County is mandatory. The principle purpose for which the information is collected is to enable the State to identify individuals, businesses and others who have been delinquent in filing tax returns or may have understated their liabilities and to generally identify persons affected by the taxes administered by the New York State Commissioner of Taxation and Finance. The information will be used for tax administration purposes and for any other purpose authorized by law. (2) The personal information is requested by the County's purchasing unit contracting to purchase goods or services or lease the real or personal property covered by this Contract.

12. Conflicting Terms.

In the event of a conflict between the terms of the Contract (including any and all attachments thereto and amendments thereof) and the terms of this Addendum, the terms of this Addendum shall control.

13. Governing Law.

This Contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of New York except where the Federal supremacy clause requires otherwise.

14. Prohibition on Purchase of Tropical Hardwoods.

The Contractor certifies and warrants that all wood products to be used under this Contract award will be

in accordance with, but not limited to, the specifications and provisions of Section 165 of the State Finance Law (Use of Tropical Hardwoods), which prohibits purchase and use of tropical hardwoods, unless specifically exempted by the State or any governmental agency or political subdivision or public benefit corporation. Qualification for an exemption under this law will be the responsibility of the Contractor to establish to meet with the approval of the County.

In addition, when any portion of this Contract involving the use of woods, whether supply or installation, is to be performed by any subcontractor, the prime Contractor will indicate and certify in the submitted bid proposal that the subcontractor has been informed and is in compliance with specifications and provisions regarding use of tropical hardwoods as detailed in Section 165 of the State Finance Law. Any such use must meet with approval of the County; otherwise, the bid may not be considered responsive. Under bidder certifications, proof of qualification for exemption will be the responsibility of the Contractor to meet with the approval of the County.

15. Compliance with New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act.

The Contractor shall comply with the provisions of the New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act (General Business Law Section 899-aa).

16. Gratuities and Kickbacks.

- a. Gratuities. It shall be unethical for any person to offer, give, or agree to give any County employee or former County employee, or for any County employee or former County employee to solicit, demand, accept, or agree to accept from another person, a gratuity or an offer of employment in connection with any decision, approval, disapproval, recommendation, or preparation of any part of a program requirement or a purchase request, influencing the content of any specification or procurement standard, rendering of advice, investigation, auditing, or in any other advisory capacity in any proceeding or application, request for ruling, determination, claim, or controversy, or other particular matter, pertaining to any program requirement or a contract or subcontract, or to any solicitation or proposal therefor.
- b. Kickbacks. It shall be unethical for any payment, gratuity, or offer of employment to be made by or on behalf of a subcontractor under a contract to the prime contractor or higher tier subcontractor or any person associated therewith, as an inducement for the award of a subcontract or order.

17. Audit

The County, the State of New York, and the United States shall have the right at any time during the term of this agreement and for the period limited by the applicable statute of limitations to audit the payment of monies hereunder. The Contractor shall comply with any demands made by the County to provide information with respect to the payment of monies hereunder during the period covered by this paragraph. The Contractor shall maintain its books and records in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles or such other method of account which is approved in writing by the County prior to the date of this agreement. The revenues and expenditures of the Contractor in connection with this agreement shall be separately identifiable. Each expenditure or claim for payment shall be fully documented. Expenditures or claims for payment which are not fully documented may be disallowed. The Contractor agrees to provide to or permit the County to examine or obtain copies of any documents relating to the payment of money to the Contractor or expenditures made by the Contractor for which reimbursement is made to the Contractor by the County. The

Contractor shall maintain all records required by this paragraph for 7 years after the date this agreement is terminated or ends.

If the Contractor has expended, in any fiscal year, \$300,000.00 or more in funds provided by a Federal financial assistance program from a Federal agency pursuant to this agreement and all other contracts with the County, the Contractor shall provide the County with an audit prepared by an independent auditor in accordance with the Single Audit Act of 1984, 31 U.S.C. §§ 7501, et seq., as amended, and the regulations adopted pursuant to such Act.

18. Certification of compliance with the Iran Divestment Act.

Pursuant Section 103-g of the General Municipal Law, by submitting a bid in response to this solicitation or by assuming the responsibility of a Contract awarded hereunder, each Bidder/Contractor, any person signing on behalf of any Bidder/Contractor and any assignee or subcontractor and, in the case of a joint bid, each party thereto, certifies, under penalty of perjury, that once the Prohibited Entities List is posted on the Office of General Services (OGS) website, that to the best of its knowledge and belief, that each Bidder/Contractor and any subcontractor or assignee is not identified on the Prohibited Entities List created pursuant to State Finance Law § 165-a(3)(b).

Additionally, the Bidder/Contractor is advised that once the Prohibited Entities List is posted on the OGS website, any Bidder/Contractor seeking to renew or extend a Contract or assume the responsibility of a Contract awarded in response to this solicitation must certify at the time the Contract is renewed, extended or assigned that it is not included on the Prohibited Entities List.

During the term of the Contract, should the County receive information that a Bidder/Contractor is in violation of the above-referenced certification, the County will offer the person or entity an opportunity to respond. If the person or entity fails to demonstrate that he/she/it has ceased engagement in the investment which is in violation of the Iran Divestment Act of 2012 within 90 days after the determination of such violation, then the County shall take such action as may be appropriate including, but not limited to, imposing sanctions, seeking compliance, recovering damages or declaring the Bidder/Contractor in default.

The County reserves the right to reject any bid or request for assignment for a Bidder/Contractor that appears on the Prohibited Entities List prior to the award of a Contract and to pursue a responsibility review with respect to any Bidder/Contractor that is awarded a Contract and subsequently appears on the Prohibited Entities List.

I. Narrative Description of Service/Program:

A. Service: Social Recreation (0770) (\$87,395)

Program: Psychosocial Club

Social Recreation is provided via a psychosocial club format primarily on evenings and weekends. This program serves all adults meeting NY State Office of Mental Health (OMH) criteria for serious and persistent mental illness with the goal of assisting them to develop or reestablish a positive sense of self-esteem, group affiliation and normative community integration.

B. Service/Program: Transportation (0670) (\$87,515)

The Transportation Program provides services to individuals meeting OMH criteria for serious and persistent mental illness to attend a variety of local mental health programs.

C.1. Service/Program: Residential Services -OMH Supported Housing (6050) (\$255,499); (6060) (\$317,154)

OMH Supported Housing includes Regular Supported Housing and Long Stay Supported Housing. The primary goal of the Supported Housing Program is to enhance the quality of life for seriously and persistently mentally ill adults ages 18 and over, who find themselves homeless at risk of becoming homeless or in a substandard housing environment. Individuals in this program have their own lease with a landlord and are responsible for their own living arrangement, all of which affords them a greater sense of independence and self-sufficiency.

C.2. Service: Residential Services: a) Men's Halfway House- (3570) (\$244,761); b) Women's House (3570) (\$228,317)

Program: OASAS-Certified Chemical Dependency Community Residence

Both are 16-bed supervised community residences, which operate 24 hours/day, 7 days/week, and 52 weeks/year. The program is designed to assist residents in expanding competencies required for successful independent living and continued recovery. Services provided include: Case Management; Service Plan Development; Training in activities of daily living; Supportive Counseling; Information & Referral to Community Services; Financial Management; Assistance in obtaining permanent housing, training and employment linkages.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT by and between the Oneida County, by and through its Department of Mental Health, with offices at 120 Airline Street, Suite 200, Oriskany, New York 13424, hereinafter referred to as the "County" and Catholic Charities of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Syracuse, NY, having its principal office located at 1408 Genesee Street, Utica, New York 13502, hereinafter referred to as the "Provider Agency".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County through its Department of Mental Health desires to establish a comprehensive and integrated system of community mental health services as required by Article 41 of the Mental Hygiene Law of the State of New York; and

WHEREAS, Article 41 of New York State (hereinafter referred to as the "State") Mental Hygiene Law mandates and authorizes the County through its Department of Mental Health to enter into a series of Agreements, which establish a comprehensive and integrated system of community mental health services that will address the needs of the citizens and residents of Oneida County; and

WHEREAS, the Provider Agency hereby warrants that they have the proper and necessary staff and infrastructure to act as a provider and resource to and for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health; and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants hereinafter expressed, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The term of this Agreement shall be from January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2016 or until terminated according to the stipulations contained within this contract.
 - 2. The **Provider Agency** shall:
 - (A) Provide Social Recreation and Psychosocial Club for adults meeting New York State Office of Mental Health (OMH) criteria for serious and persistent mental illness;
 - (B) Provide transportation services to individuals meeting OMH criteria for serious and persistent mental illness to attend a variety of local mental health programs;
 - (C) Provide Supported Housing services for Regular and Long Stay Housing. The services provided will include either:
 - One-time financial assistance to eligible individuals to meet costs associated with establishing and maintaining a residence in the community.
 - 2. On-going rental stipends until the consumer's acquisition of funding from Section 8 Housing.
 - (D) Provide both Men's and Women's 16 beds supervised Chemically Dependent Community Residences which operate 24 hours/day, 7 days/week. The program will provide case management, service planning, trainings in activities of daily living, supportive counseling, information & referral to community services, financial management, and discharge planning.
- 3. The **Provider Agency** agrees, where applicable, to provide any and all **Services**, authorized by this agreement or other license or certification, to individuals involved in the NYS OMH Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) Program. This includes individuals under a court order and

individuals that meet the criteria for an AOT order but have been diverted from the formal court proceedings. The **Provider Agency** further agrees to provide any and all required client-specific information as required by the State of New York and/or the Oneida County Department of Mental Health for monitoring purposes. It is expressly understood that all information sent to the Oneida County Department of Mental Health will be handled in a <u>safe and confidential</u> manner.

- 4. The **Provider Agency** agrees to participate in the development and implementation of the Local Governmental Plan. Participation may include but not necessarily be limited to: attendance at appropriate subcommittee meetings; notification to a subcommittee of intent to submit a Certificate of Need (CON) application and/or grant application which will modify **Services** offered by the **Provider Agency**; submission of planning reports and CON applications and/or Prior Approval and Review applications to the **County** prior to submission to the **State**; attendance and cooperation with various ad hoc work groups of the subcommittee.
- 5. The **Provider Agency** shall not be entitled to any of the benefits of an employee of the County of Oneida, such as New York State Employee's Retirement Benefits, Unemployment Insurance, Worker's Compensation, Employee's Medical, Hospital, Dental, Prescription, Optical coverage; and any other benefits that an employee of the County of Oneida normally is eligible to receive.
- 6. The **Provider Agency** is an independent contractor under this Agreement to perform a specialized service for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health. The **Provider Agency** further agrees to hold the County of Oneida harmless for all of their actions and warrants.
- 7. For the Services provided, the Oneida County Department of Mental Health will reimburse The **Provider Agency** a maximum of \$1,220,641.00 (One Million two hundred twenty thousand six hundred forty one dollars) per year. This shall include but not be limited to travel time, evaluation time and any court time as deemed necessary by the court. The payment schedule will be based upon submission of an Oneida County Voucher to the Department of Mental Health. Annexed hereto and made part here of as **Appendix A**.
- 8. In the event that the **State** or **County** approves or makes changes to the funding amount that is listed in **Appendix A**, the **Provider Agency**, at the request of the **County** shall submit a revised budget plan which reflects the approved Operating Costs, Net Operating Costs and funding by the various Deficit Funding Sources. It is expressly understood that the **County** assumes no responsibility for either costs not approved for reimbursements by the either the **County** or the **State**; or changes to the budget anytime during the contract period. Should any expenses by disapproved in a post-audit by the State of New York or funds are not spent in the approved programs during the fiscal year, the **Provider Agency** shall submit a check payable to the **County Commissioner of Finance** equal to the amount of any disallowance already paid to the **Provider Agency** by the **County** within thirty (30) days of notification. This provision shall apply to this agreement and all previous agreements between the **County** and the **Provider Agency**.
- 9. The **County** will make State Aid Payments either monthly or quarterly based on payments made to the **County** by New York State and the timely submission of correct monthly payment vouchers. Payments will be provided subsequent to services rendered and upon review of the voucher receipt submitted by the **Provider Agency**.
- 10. The **Provider Agency** agrees to submit to the **County** on the last business day of the following month at the end of each quarter (i.e. Jan-Mar report due April 30th) a Quarterly Financial Analysis, Performance Analysis, and Service Utilization Report. In addition, the **Provider Agency** agrees to submit the following reports by the listed required dates as applicable to funding received:
 - a) Office of Persons with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD) Budgets for the current year is required to be received by the County by February 1st.
 - b) Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) Estimated Claims for the prior year are required to be received by the County by April 15th.

- c) Pre-Approved 30-day Office of Mental Health (OMH) Consolidated Fiscal Report (CFR) Extension Requests for the prior year OMH CFR are required to be received by the County by April 15th.
- d) *OMH*, *OASAS* and *OPWDD* (*Full*) Audited *CFR* for the prior year that do not have a pre-approved 30-day extension (OMH only) are required to be received by the *County* by April 15th. An OPWDD Estimated CFR is required by this date if an extension was filed. An OASAS Estimated Claim is required to be received by this date; no extension allowed for OASAS CFRs.
- e) Fully Audited CFRs for OMH, OPWDD, and OASAS for the prior year with an extension submitted for OMH and OPWDD and/or an Estimated OASAS CFR supplied to the County by April 15th are required to be received by the County by May 15th.
- f) OASAS Mid-Year Claim for the current year is required to be received by the County by August 1st.
- g) OASAS Consolidated Budget Report (CBR) for the next year is (with scope) required to be received by the County by September 15th.
- h) **OMH CBRs** for the current year are required to be received by the **County** by October 15th.
- 11. The **Provider Agency** shall submit a copy of the following reports during the first quarter of each Fiscal Year:
 - a) Disaster Response Plan. In addition the **Provider Agency** will participate in the development of an Oneida County plan to respond to man-made or natural disasters.
 - b) Accounting System & Financial Capability Questionnaire (where applicable).
 - c) Corporate Compliance Plan. The plan will reflect efforts to ensure that personnel are aware of and in compliance with relevant laws and regulations.
 - d) Annual Audit and Financial Reports.
 - e) Federal Single Audit Report. If the **Provider Agency** is scheduled to receive funds in excess of \$300,000.00 or more in a year in federal funds, exclusive of Medicaid and Medicare. The Single Audit shall be conducted in accordance with OMB Circular A-133, OMB Circular A-110, the A-102 Common Rule and such other circulars, interpretations, opinions, rules or regulations that may be issued in connection with the single Audit Act Amendments of 1996.
- 12. The **Provider Agency** shall operate all programs in compliance with the laws, rules and regulations as passed and /or promulgated by the **County**, State or Federal governments. It is further understood by the **Provider Agency** that agencies and departments of New York State other than OMH, Office of Alcoholism & Substance Abuse Services (OASAS), and Office of Persons with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD) may promulgate these rules and regulations.
- 13. The Provider Agency further covenants and agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the County, its officers, agents and employees, from and against any and all loss or expenses that may arise by reason of liability for damage, injury or death, or for invasion of personal or property rights, of every name and nature, and whether casual or continuing trespass or nuisance, and any other claims for damages arising at law and equity alleged to have been caused or sustained in whole or in part by or because of any omission of duty, negligence or wrongful act on the part of the Provider Agency and the County, their officers, agents or employees, in connection with this Agreement. In addition, the Provider Agency shall obtain and maintain comprehensive general liability insurance satisfactory to the County with a minimum of \$1,000,000 per occurrence coverage. The County of Oneida must be named as an "Additionally Insured" as part of the Provider Agency's insurance policy. Proof of same must be provided to the County at the time of the execution of this contract. It is expressly

understood that if during the course of this Agreement, said insurance policy is canceled or otherwise allowed to lapse, the Provider Agency must provide the County proof of insurance consistent with the stipulations listed above. Failure to do may result in the immediate termination of this Agreement.

14. Either party may terminate this Agreement by giving fifteen (15) days prior written notice of such termination to the other party. Notwithstanding the above, if, through any cause, the **Provider Agency** fails to comply with legal, professional, **County** or **State** requirements for the provision of the services covered under this Agreement, or if the **Provider Agency** becomes bankrupt or insolvent or falsify their records or reports, the **County** may terminate this Agreement effective immediately, or, at its option, effective at a later date after sending notice of such termination to the **Provider Agency**.

The **County** shall be released from any and all responsibilities and obligations arising from the services covered by this Agreement, effective as of the date of termination. The **County** shall be responsible for payment of all claims for services provided and costs incurred by the **Provider Agency** prior to the termination of this Agreement that are pursuant to and after **Provider Agency** compliance with the terms and conditions herein.

Notice of termination must be in writing, signed by an authorized official, and sent to the other party by certified mail or messenger, and receipt shall be requested. Notice of termination shall be deemed delivered as of the date of it's posting by certified mail or at the time it is delivered to the other party by messenger.

If any term or provision of this Agreement shall be found to be illegal or unenforceable, then, notwithstanding the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and such term or provision shall be deemed stricken. The laws of the State of New York shall govern this contract and jurisdiction and venue shall lie within the State of New York.

15. The **Provider Agency** agrees to maintain files in a confidential manner pursuant to the applicable statutes contained in New York State Mental Hygiene Law and any Federal Law regulating such files. Information contained in these files shall be released only upon the written consent of the client being served or to the Oneida County Department of Mental Health as outlined below.

It is expressly understood that as a **Provider Agency** for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health, it may and will receive confidential information from the Department of Mental Health and this information may have been received from other independent contractors and/or licensed agencies. The **Provider Agency** agrees that all such information will be considered as being confidential and shall not be re-disclosed without the written consent of the individual.

Accordingly, as a condition of and in consideration of access to confidential information, the **Provider Agency** promises that:

- A. They will use confidential information only as needed to perform the legitimate duties as outlined above for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health and the Tier I program. This means, among other things, that:
- 1. The **Provider Agency** will only access confidential information for which there is a need to know; and
- 2. The **Provider Agency** will not in any way divulge, copy, release, sell, loan review, alter or destroy any confidential information except as properly authorized.
- 3. The **Provider Agency** will not misuse confidential information or carelessly handle confidential information.
 - B. The **Provider Agency** will safeguard and will not disclose any access code or any other authorization that allows access to confidential information. The **Provider Agency** accepts responsibility for all activities undertaken using any access code and other authorization.
 - C. The **Provider Agency** will report activities by any individual or entity that is suspected of or may compromise the confidentiality of confidential information. Reports made in good faith about suspect activities will be held in confidence to the extent

permitted by law, including the name of the individual reporting the activities.

- D. The **Provider Agency** understands that the obligations under this Agreement will continue after termination of employment and that it is further understood that any privileges hereunder are subject to periodic review, revision and if appropriate, renewal.
- E. The **Provider Agency** understands that there is no right or ownership interest in any confidential information referred to in this Agreement. The Oneida County Department of Mental Health may at any time revoke any access code, other authorization, or access to confidential information. At all times during the course of providing services under this Agreement, the **Provider Agency** will safeguard the confidentiality of all confidential information.
- F. The **Provider Agency** will be responsible for any misuse or wrongful disclosure of confidential information and for any failure to safeguard an access code or other authorization access to confidential information. It is expressly understood that any failure to comply with this Agreement may result in immediate termination of access to the information system and legal action against the **Provider**.
- 16. The **Provider Agency** agrees not to discriminate or refuse assistance to individuals diagnosed with AIDS or an HIV infection or an HIV related illness. If the **Provider Agency** is provided with any confidential HIV related information during the course of providing services and in accordance with 403 of Title 18 of the NYSDSS regulation and Section 2782 of the Public Health Law, they shall be informed of the penalties and fines for any redisclosure found to be in violation of New York State Law and/or Regulation.

The **Provider Agency** shall include the following written statement when disclosing any confidential HIV related Information:

"This information has been disclosed to you from confidential records, which are protected by State Law. State Law prohibits you from making any further disclosure of this information without the specific written consent of the person to whom it pertains, or as otherwise permitted by law. Any unauthorized further disclosure in violation of State Law may result in a fine or jail sentence or both. A general authorization for the release of medical or other information is not sufficient authorization for further disclosure."

- 17. The **Provider Agency** agrees that as mandated reporters, all instances of suspected child abuse, neglect, and/or maltreatment, will be reported to the Central Registry as required by law. These verbal reports will be followed by submission of completed 2221A to the local Department of Social Services. The family will be informed in advance of the decision to file a report with the Central Register. The **Provider Agency** shall also notify the Commissioner of Oneida County Department of Mental Health of any and all reports made to the Child Abuse Registry.
- 18. It is understood that this instrument represents the entire Agreement of the parties hereto; both parties shall execute that all previous understandings are merged herein; and that no modifications hereof shall be valid unless written evidence shall be executed thereof.
- 19. **Miscellaneous Provisions:** Annexed hereto and made a part hereof as Appendix A and Appendix B are additional terms, covenants and conditions which the respective parties agree to be bound by and follow as part of this Agreement.

County of Oneida, hereinafter known as COUNTY, and a contractor	or, subcontractor, vendor, vendee,
licensor, licensee, lessor, lessee or any third party, hereinafter know	vn as CONTRACTOR.

WHEREAS, COUNTY and CONTRACTOR have entered into a contract, license, lease, amendment or other agreement of any kind (hereinafter referred to as the "Contract"), and

WHEREAS, the Oneida County Attorney and the Oneida County Director of Purchasing have recommended the inclusion of the standard clauses set forth in this Addendum to be included in every Contract for which COUNTY is a party, now, thereafter,

The parties to the attached Contract, for good consideration, agree to be bound by the following clauses which are hereby made a part of the Contract.

1. Executor or Non-Appropriation Clause.

The County shall have no liability or obligation under this Contract to the Contractor or to anyone else beyond the annual funds being appropriated and available for this Contract.

2. Oneida County Board of Legislators: Resolution #249 Solid Waste Disposal Requirements.

Pursuant to Oneida County Board of Legislator Resolution No. 249 of May 26, 1999, the Contractor agrees to deliver exclusively to the facilities of the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority, all waste and recyclables generated within the Authority's service area by performance of this Contract by the Contractor and any subcontractors. Upon awarding of this Contract, and before work commences, the Contractor will be required to provide Oneida County with proof that Resolution No. 249 of 1999 has been complied with, and that all wastes and recyclables in the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority's service area which are generated by the Contractor and any subcontractors in performance of this Contract will be delivered exclusively to Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority facilities.

3. Certification Regarding Lobbying; Debarment, Suspension and other Responsibility Matters; and Drug-Free Workplace Requirements.

- a. Lobbying. As required by Section 1352, Title 31 of the U.S. Code and implemented at 34 CFR Part 82 for persons entering into a grant or cooperative agreement over \$100,000, as defined at 34 CFR Part 82, Section 82.105 and 82.110, the Contractor certifies that:
 - 1. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the Contractor, to any persons for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, and officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the making of any Federal Grant, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and

- the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal grant or cooperative agreement.
- 2. If any funds other than federally appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this federal grant or cooperative agreement, the Contractor shall complete and submit Standard Form 111 "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.
- 3. The Contractor shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all subcontracts and that all subcontractors shall certify and disclose accordingly.
- b. Debarment, Suspension and other Responsibility Matters. As required by Executive Order 12549, Debarments and Suspension, and implemented at 34 CFR Part 85, for prospective participants in primary covered transactions, as defined at 34 CFR Part 85, Sections 83.105 and 85.110,
 - 1. The Contractor certifies that it and its principals:
 - Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any Federal department or agency;
 - b. Have not within a three-year period preceding this Contract been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (Federal, State or local) transaction or contracts under a public transaction, violation of federal or State antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements, or receiving stolen property;
 - c. Are not presently indicated or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a Government entity (Federal, State or local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in paragraph 1(b) of this certification; and
 - d. Have not within a three-year period preceding this Contract had one or more public transactions (Federal, State, or local) for cause or default; and
 - 2. Where the Contractor is unable to certify to any of the statements in this certification, he or she shall attach an explanation to this Contract.
- c. Drug-Free Workplace (Contractors other than individuals). As required by the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988, and implemented at 34 CFR Part 85, Subpart F, for Contractors, as defined at 34 CFR Part 85, Sections 85.605 and 85.610:
 - 1. The Contractor will or will continue to provide a drug-free workplace by:
 - a. Publishing a statement notifying employees that the manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the Contractor's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violation of such prohibition;
 - b. Establishing an on-going drug-free awareness program to inform employees about:
 - 1. The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
 - 2. The Contractor's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
 - 3. Any available drug counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance program; and
 - 4. The penalties that may be imposed upon an employee for drug abuse violation occurring in the workplace;

- c. Making it a requirement that each employee to be engaged in the performance of the Contract be given a copy of the statement required by paragraph (a);
- d. Notifying the employee in the statement required by paragraph (a) that as a condition of employment under the Contract, the employee will:
 - 1. Abide by the terms of the statement; and
 - 2. Notify the employer in writing of his or her conviction for a violation of a criminal drug statue occurring in the workplace no later than five (5) calendar days after such conviction;
- e. Notifying the County, in writing within ten (10) calendar days after having received notice under subparagraph (d)(2) from an employee or otherwise receiving actual notice of such conviction. Employers of convicted employees must provide notice, including position title, to: Director Grants Management Bureau, State Office Building Campus, Albany, New York 12240. Notice shall include the identification number(s) of each affected contract.
- f. Taking one of the following actions, within thirty (30) calendar days of receiving notice under subparagraph (d)(2), with respect to any employee who is so convicted;
 - 1. Taking appropriate personnel action against such an employee, up to and including termination, consistent with the Requirements of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended; or
 - 2. Requiring such employee to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by a Federal, State or local health, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency;
- g. Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of paragraphs (a),(b),(c),(d),(e),(f).

- d. Drug-Free Workplace (Contractors who are individuals). As required by the Drug-Free Workplace act of 1988, and implemented at 34 CFR Part 85, Subpart F. for Contractors, as defined at 34 CFR Part 85, Sections 85.605 and 85.610:
 - 1. As a condition of the contract, the Contractor certifies that he or she will not engage in the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance in conducting any activity with the Contract; and
 - 2. If convicted of a criminal drug offense resulting from a violation occurring during the conduct of any contract activity, the Contractor will report the conviction, in writing, within ten (10) calendar days of the conviction, to: Director, Grants Management Bureau, State Office Building Campus, Albany, NY 12240. Notice shall include the identification number(s) of each affected Contract.

4. Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPPA).

When applicable to the services provided pursuant to the Contract:

- a. The Contractor, as a Business Associate of the County, shall comply with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, hereinafter referred to as "HIPAA," as well as all regulations promulgated by the Federal Government in furtherance thereof, to assure the privacy and security of all protected health information exchanged between the Contractor and the County. In order to assure such privacy and security, the Contractor agrees to enact the following safeguards for protected health information:
 - 1. Establish policies and procedures, in written or electronic form, that are reasonably designed, taking into consideration the size of, and the type of activities undertaken by, the Contractor, to comply with the Standards for Privacy of Individual Identifiable Health Information, commonly referred to as the Privacy Rule;
 - 2. Utilize a combination of electronic hardware and computer software in order to securely store, maintain, transmit, and access, protected health information electronically; and
 - 3. Utilize an adequate amount of physical hardware, including but not limited to filing cabinets, and locks on drawers, cabinets, and office doors, in order to prevent unwarranted and illegal access to computers and paper files that contain protected health information of the County's clients.
- b. This agreement does not authorize the Contractor to use or further disclose the protected health information that the Contractor handles in treating patients of the County in any manner that would violate the requirements of 45 CFR § 164.504(e), if that same use or disclosure were done by the County, except that:
 - 1. The Contractor may use and disclose protected health information for the Contractor's own proper management and administration; and
 - 2. The Contractor may provide data aggregation services relating to the health care operations of the County.
- c. The Contractor shall:
 - 1. Not use or further disclose protected health information other than as permitted or required by this contract or as required by law;
 - 2. Use appropriate safeguards to prevent the use or disclosure of protected health information other than as provided for in this Contract;
 - 3. Report to the County any use or disclosure of the information not provided for by this Contract of which the Contractor becomes aware;
 - 4. Ensure that any agents, including a subcontractor, to whom the Contractor provides protected health information received from, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of, the County agrees to the same restrictions and conditions that apply to the Contractor with respect to such protected health information;
 - 5. Make available protected health information in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.524;
 - 6. Make available protected health information for amendment and incorporate any amendments to protected health information in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528;
 - 7. Make available the information required to provide an accounting of

- disclosures in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.528;
- 8. Make its internal practices, books, and records relating to the use and disclosure of protected health information received from, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of, the County available to the Secretary of Health and Human Services for purposes of determining the County's compliance with 45 CFR § 164.504(e)(2)(ii); and
- 9. At the termination of this Contract, if feasible, return or destroy all protected health information received from, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of, the County that the Contractor still maintains in any form and retain no copies of such information or, if such return or destruction is not feasible, extend the protections of this Contract to such information and limit further uses and disclosures to those purposes that make the return or destruction of the information infeasible.
- d. The Contractor agrees that this contract may be amended if any of the following events occurs:
 - 1. HIPAA, or any of the regulations promulgated in furtherance thereof, is modified by Congress or the Department of Health and Human Services;
 - 2. HIPAA, or any of the regulations promulgated in furtherance thereof, is interpreted by a court in a manner impacting the County's HIPAA compliance; or
 - 3. There is a material change in the business practices and procedures of the County.
- e. Pursuant to 45 CFR § 164.504(e)(2)(iii), the County is authorized to unilaterally terminate this Contract if the County determines that the Contractor has violated a material term of this Contract.

5. Non-Assignment Clause.

In accordance with Section 109 of the General Municipal Law, this Contract may not be assigned by the Contractor or its right, title or interest therein assigned, transferred, conveyed, sublet or otherwise disposed of without the County's previous written consent, and attempts to do so are null and void. The Contractor may, however, assign its right to receive payments without the County's prior written consent unless this Contract concerns Certificates of Participation pursuant to Section 109-b of the General Municipal Law.

6. Worker's Compensation Benefits.

In accordance with Section 108 of the General Municipal Law, this Contract shall be void and of no force and effect unless the Contractor shall provide and maintain coverage during the life of this Contract for the benefit of such employees as are required to be covered by the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Law.

7. Non-Discrimination Requirements.

To the extent required by Article 15 of the Executive Law (also known as the Human Rights Law) and all other State and Federal statutory and constitutional non-discrimination provisions, the Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed, color, sex, national origin, sexual orientation, age, disability, genetic predisposition or carrier status, or marital status.

Furthermore, in accordance with Section 220-e of the Labor Law, if this is a Contract for the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work or for the manufacture, sale or distribution of materials, equipment or supplies, and to the extent that this Contract shall be performed within the State of New York, the Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall, by reason of race, creed, color, disability, sex, or national origin: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this Contract. If this is a building service contract as defined in Section 230 of the Labor Law, then, in accordance with Section 239 thereof, the Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall by reason of race, creed, color, national origin, age, sex or disability: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this Contract. The Contractor is subject to fines of \$50.00 per person per day for any violation of Section 220-e or Section 239 as well as possible termination of this Contract and forfeiture of all moneys due hereunder for a second or subsequent violation.

8. Wage and Hours Provisions.

If this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law or a building service contract covered by Article 9 thereof, neither the Contractor's employees nor the employees of its subcontractors may be required or permitted to work more than the number of hours or days stated in said statutes, except as otherwise provided in the Labor Law and as set forth in prevailing wage and supplement schedules issued by the State Labor Department. Furthermore, the Contractor and its subcontractors must pay at least the prevailing wage rate and pay or provide the prevailing supplements, including the premium rates for overtime pay, as determined by the State Labor Department in accordance with the Labor Law. Additionally, effective April 28, 2008, if this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law, the Contractor understands and agrees that the filing of payrolls in a manner consistent with Subdivision 3-a of Section 220 of the Labor Law shall be a condition precedent to payment by the County of any County approved sums due and owing for work done upon the project.

9. Non-Collusive Bidding Certification.

In accordance with Section 103-d of the General Municipal Law, if this Contract is awarded based upon the submission of bids, the Contractor affirms, under penalty of perjury, that its bid was arrived at independently and without collusion aimed at restricting competition. The Contractor further affirms that, at the time the Contractor submitted its bid, an authorized and responsible person executed and delivered to the County a non-collusive bidding certification on the Contractor's behalf.

10. Records.

The Contractor shall establish and maintain complete and accurate books, records, documents, accounts and other evidence directly pertinent to performance under this Contract (hereinafter, collectively, "the Records"). The Records shall include, but not be limited to, reports, statements, examinations, letters, memoranda, opinions, folders, files, books, manuals, pamphlets, forms, papers, designs, drawings, maps, photos, letters, microfilms, computer tapes or discs, electronic files, e-mails and attachments, rules, regulations and codes. The Records must be kept for the balance of the calendar year in which they were made and for six (6) additional years thereafter. The County Comptroller, the County Attorney and any other person or entity authorized to conduct an examination, as well as the agency or agencies involved in

this Contract, shall have access to the Records during normal business hours at an office of the Contractor within the County or, if no such office is available, at a mutually agreeable and reasonable venue within the County, for the term specified above for the purposes of inspection, auditing and copying. The County shall take reasonable steps to protect from public disclosure any of the Records which are exempt from disclosure under Section 87 of the Public Officers Law (the "Statute") provided that: (a) the Contractor shall timely inform an appropriate County official, in writing, that said records should not be disclosed; (b) said records shall be sufficiently identified; and (c) designation of said records as exempt under the Statute is reasonable. Nothing contained herein shall diminish, or in any way adversely affect, the County's right to discovery in any pending or future litigation. Notwithstanding any other language, the Records may be subject to disclosure under the New York Freedom of Information Law, for other applicable state or federal law, rule or regulation.

11. Identifying Information and Privacy Notification.

- a. Identification Number(s). Every invoice or claim for payment submitted to a County agency by a payee, for payment for the sale of goods or service or for transactions (e.g., leases, easements, licenses, etc.) related to real or personal property must include the payee's identification number. The number is any or all of the following: (i) the payee's Federal employer identification number, (ii) the payee's Federal social security number, and/or (iii) the payee's Vendor Identification Number assigned by the Statewide Financial System. Where the payee does not have such number or numbers, the payees, on its invoice or claim for payment, must give the reason or reasons why the payee does not have such number or numbers.
- b. Privacy Notification. (1) The authority to request the above personal information from a seller of goods or services or a lessor of real or personal property, and the authority to maintain such information, is found in Section 5 of the State Tax Law. Disclosure of this information by the seller or lessor to the County is mandatory. The principle purpose for which the information is collected is to enable the State to identify individuals, businesses and others who have been delinquent in filing tax returns or may have understated their liabilities and to generally identify persons affected by the taxes administered by the New York State Commissioner of Taxation and Finance. The information will be used for tax administration purposes and for any other purpose authorized by law. (2) The personal information is requested by the County's purchasing unit contracting to purchase goods or services or lease the real or personal property covered by this Contract.

12. Conflicting Terms.

In the event of a conflict between the terms of the Contract (including any and all attachments thereto and amendments thereof) and the terms of this Addendum, the terms of this Addendum shall control.

13. Governing Law.

This Contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of New York except where the Federal supremacy clause requires otherwise.

14. Prohibition on Purchase of Tropical Hardwoods.

The Contractor certifies and warrants that all wood products to be used under this Contract award will be

in accordance with, but not limited to, the specifications and provisions of Section 165 of the State Finance Law (Use of Tropical Hardwoods), which prohibits purchase and use of tropical hardwoods, unless specifically exempted by the State or any governmental agency or political subdivision or public benefit corporation. Qualification for an exemption under this law will be the responsibility of the Contractor to establish to meet with the approval of the County.

In addition, when any portion of this Contract involving the use of woods, whether supply or installation, is to be performed by any subcontractor, the prime Contractor will indicate and certify in the submitted bid proposal that the subcontractor has been informed and is in compliance with specifications and provisions regarding use of tropical hardwoods as detailed in Section 165 of the State Finance Law. Any such use must meet with approval of the County; otherwise, the bid may not be considered responsive. Under bidder certifications, proof of qualification for exemption will be the responsibility of the Contractor to meet with the approval of the County.

15. Compliance with New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act.

The Contractor shall comply with the provisions of the New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act (General Business Law Section 899-aa).

16. Gratuities and Kickbacks.

- a. Gratuities. It shall be unethical for any person to offer, give, or agree to give any County employee or former County employee, or for any County employee or former County employee to solicit, demand, accept, or agree to accept from another person, a gratuity or an offer of employment in connection with any decision, approval, disapproval, recommendation, or preparation of any part of a program requirement or a purchase request, influencing the content of any specification or procurement standard, rendering of advice, investigation, auditing, or in any other advisory capacity in any proceeding or application, request for ruling, determination, claim, or controversy, or other particular matter, pertaining to any program requirement or a contract or subcontract, or to any solicitation or proposal therefor.
- b. Kickbacks. It shall be unethical for any payment, gratuity, or offer of employment to be made by or on behalf of a subcontractor under a contract to the prime contractor or higher tier subcontractor or any person associated therewith, as an inducement for the award of a subcontract or order.

17. Audit

The County, the State of New York, and the United States shall have the right at any time during the term of this agreement and for the period limited by the applicable statute of limitations to audit the payment of monies hereunder. The Contractor shall comply with any demands made by the County to provide information with respect to the payment of monies hereunder during the period covered by this paragraph. The Contractor shall maintain its books and records in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles or such other method of account which is approved in writing by the County prior to the date of this agreement. The revenues and expenditures of the Contractor in connection with this agreement shall be separately identifiable. Each expenditure or claim for payment shall be fully documented. Expenditures or claims for payment which are not fully documented may be disallowed. The Contractor agrees to provide to or permit the County to examine or obtain copies of any documents relating to the payment of money to the Contractor or expenditures made by the Contractor for which reimbursement is made to the Contractor by the County. The

Contractor shall maintain all records required by this paragraph for 7 years after the date this agreement is terminated or ends.

If the Contractor has expended, in any fiscal year, \$300,000.00 or more in funds provided by a Federal financial assistance program from a Federal agency pursuant to this agreement and all other contracts with the County, the Contractor shall provide the County with an audit prepared by an independent auditor in accordance with the Single Audit Act of 1984, 31 U.S.C. §§ 7501, et seq., as amended, and the regulations adopted pursuant to such Act.

18. Certification of compliance with the Iran Divestment Act.

Pursuant Section 103-g of the General Municipal Law, by submitting a bid in response to this solicitation or by assuming the responsibility of a Contract awarded hereunder, each Bidder/Contractor, any person signing on behalf of any Bidder/Contractor and any assignee or subcontractor and, in the case of a joint bid, each party thereto, certifies, under penalty of perjury, that once the Prohibited Entities List is posted on the Office of General Services (OGS) website, that to the best of its knowledge and belief, that each Bidder/Contractor and any subcontractor or assignee is not identified on the Prohibited Entities List created pursuant to State Finance Law § 165-a(3)(b).

Additionally, the Bidder/Contractor is advised that once the Prohibited Entities List is posted on the OGS website, any Bidder/Contractor seeking to renew or extend a Contract or assume the responsibility of a Contract awarded in response to this solicitation must certify at the time the Contract is renewed, extended or assigned that it is not included on the Prohibited Entities List.

During the term of the Contract, should the County receive information that a Bidder/Contractor is in violation of the above-referenced certification, the County will offer the person or entity an opportunity to respond. If the person or entity fails to demonstrate that he/she/it has ceased engagement in the investment which is in violation of the Iran Divestment Act of 2012 within 90 days after the determination of such violation, then the County shall take such action as may be appropriate including, but not limited to, imposing sanctions, seeking compliance, recovering damages or declaring the Bidder/Contractor in default.

The County reserves the right to reject any bid or request for assignment for a Bidder/Contractor that appears on the Prohibited Entities List prior to the award of a Contract and to pursue a responsibility review with respect to any Bidder/Contractor that is awarded a Contract and subsequently appears on the Prohibited Entities List.

The Mobile Crisis Assessment Team provides emergency/crisis psychiatric services, crisis assessment and intervention services 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Services are provided in the community, and at the Oneida County 911 Center. Extensive outreach and public education are also provided to build awareness of services and maintain strong relationships with community agencies, hospitals, and law enforcement.

The Neighborhood Center will provide a transportation program for family members to visit individuals that are inpatient at Hutchings Psychiatric Center.

Supportive Case Management Program provides services to adults who are 18 years of age and older that meet NYS OMH criteria for severe and persistent mental illness.

D. SCM Service Dollars (2740) (\$215,424)

Supportive Case Management utilizes service dollars to assist the clients in developing and maintaining situations for living, working and socializing in the community

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT between Oneida County, by and through its Department of Mental Health, with offices at 120 Airline Street, Suite 200, Oriskany, New York 13424, hereinafter referred to as the "County" and The Neighborhood Center, Inc., having its principal office located at 293 Genesee Street, Utica, New York 13501, hereinafter referred to as the "Provider Agency".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County through its Department of Mental Health desires to establish a comprehensive and integrated system of community mental health services as required by Article 41 of the Mental Hygiene Law of the State of New York; and

WHEREAS, Article 41 of New York State (hereinafter referred to as the "State") Mental Hygiene Law mandates and authorizes the County through its Department of Mental Health to enter into a series of Agreements, which establish a comprehensive and integrated system of community mental health services that will address the needs of the citizens and residents of Oneida County; and

WHEREAS, the Provider Agency hereby warrants that they have the proper and necessary staff and infrastructure to act as a provider and resource to and for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health; and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants hereinafter expressed, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The term of this Agreement shall be from January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2016 or until terminated according to the stipulations contained within this contract.
 - 2. The Provider Agency shall:
 - (A) Provide emergency/crisis psychiatric assessment, follow-up and outreach services 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and arrange for transportation for visitation for families who have relatives in Hutchings Psychiatric Center;
 - (B) Offer psycho-social club recovery services to mentally ill adults through specialized programs in both Utica and Rome;
 - (C) Provide Supportive Case Management services to mentally ill adults in Oneida County:
 - (D) Administer Service Dollars for the Supportive Case Management Program for emergency and non-emergency purposes;
 - (E) Provide Assisted Competitive Employment services to mentally ill adults including resume writing, interviews, life skills, and job-search;
 - (F) Provide Outreach programs in a psychosocial club setting to enhance independent living skills, increase wellness and understanding of mental illness, provide socialization, and peer-support for adults diagnosed with mental illness;
 - (G) Provide Advocacy services for clients served by the Mobile Crisis Assessment Team to include linkages to services, follow-up phone calls or visits and community education.
- 3. The **Provider Agency** agrees, where applicable, to provide any and all **Services**, authorized by this agreement or other license or certification, to individuals involved in the NYS OMH Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) Program. This includes individuals under a court order and individuals that meet the criteria for an AOT order but have been diverted from the formal court

proceedings. The **Provider Agency** further agrees to provide any and all required client-specific information as required by the State of New York and/or the Oneida County Department of Mental Health for monitoring purposes. It is expressly understood that all information sent to the Oneida County Department of Mental Health will be handled in a <u>safe and confidential</u> manner.

- 4. The **Provider Agency** agrees to participate in the development and implementation of the Local Governmental Plan. Participation may include but not necessarily be limited to: attendance at appropriate subcommittee meetings; notification to a subcommittee of intent to submit a Certificate of Need (CON) application and/or grant application which will modify **Services** offered by the **Provider Agency**; submission of planning reports and CON applications and/or Prior Approval and Review applications to the **County** prior to submission to the **State**; attendance and cooperation with various ad hoc work groups of the subcommittee.
- 5. The **Provider Agency** shall not be entitled to any of the benefits of an employee of the County of Oneida, such as New York State Employee's Retirement Benefits, Unemployment Insurance, Worker's Compensation, Employee's Medical, Hospital, Dental, Prescription, Optical coverage; and any other benefits that an employee of the County of Oneida normally is eligible to receive.
- 6. The **Provider Agency** is an independent contractor under this Agreement to perform a specialized service for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health. The **Provider Agency** further agrees to hold the County of Oneida harmless for all of their actions and warrants.
- 7. For the Services provided, the Oneida County Department of Mental Health will reimburse The **Provider Agency** a maximum of \$1,742,566.00 (one million seven hundred forty two thousand five hundred sixty six dollars) per year. This shall include but not be limited to travel time, evaluation time and any court time as deemed necessary by the court. The payment schedule will be based upon submission of an Oneida County Voucher to the Department of Mental Health. Annexed hereto and made part here of as **Appendix A**.
- 8. In the event that the **State** or **County** approves or makes changes to the funding amount that is listed in **Appendix A**, the **Provider Agency**, at the request of the **County** shall submit a revised budget plan which reflects the approved Operating Costs, Net Operating Costs and funding by the various Deficit Funding Sources. It is expressly understood that the **County** assumes no responsibility for either costs not approved for reimbursements by the either the **County** or the **State**; or changes to the budget anytime during the contract period. Should any expenses be disapproved in a post-audit by the State of New York or funds are not spent in the approved programs during the fiscal year, the **Provider Agency** shall submit a check payable to the **County Commissioner of Finance** equal to the amount of any disallowance already paid to the **Provider Agency** by the **County** within thirty (30) days of notification. This provision shall apply to this agreement and all previous agreements between the **County** and the **Provider Agency**.
- 9. The **County** will make State Aid Payments either monthly or quarterly based on payments made to the **County** by New York State and the timely submission of correct monthly payment vouchers. Payments will be provided subsequent to services rendered and upon review of the voucher receipt submitted by the **Provider Agency**.
- 10. The **Provider Agency** agrees to submit to the **County** on the last business day of the following month at the end of each quarter (i.e. Jan-Mar report due April 30th) a Quarterly Financial Analysis, Performance Analysis, and Service Utilization Report. In addition, the **Provider Agency** agrees to submit the following reports by the listed required dates as applicable to funding received:
 - a) Office of Persons with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD) Budgets for the current year is required to be received by the County by February 1st.
 - b) Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) Estimated Claims for the prior year are required to be received by the County by April 15th.

- c) Pre-Approved 30-day Office of Mental Health (OMH) Consolidated Fiscal Report (CFR) Extension Requests for the prior year OMH CFR are required to be received by the County by April 15th.
- d) *OMH*, *OASAS* and *OPWDD* (*Full*) Audited *CFR* for the prior year that do not have a pre-approved 30-day extension (OMH only) are required to be received by the **County** by April 15th. An OPWDD Estimated CFR is required by this date if an extension was filed. An OASAS Estimated Claim is required to be received by this date; no extension allowed for OASAS CFRs.
- e) *Fully Audited CFRs for OMH, OPWDD, and OASAS* for the prior year with an extension submitted for OMH and OPWDD and/or an Estimated OASAS CFR supplied to the **County** by April 15th are required to be received by the **County** by May 15th.
- f) **OASAS Mid-Year Claim** for the current year is required to be received by the **County** by August 1st.
- g) **OASAS Consolidated Budget Report (CBR)** for the next year is (with scope) required to be received by the **County** by September 15th.
- h) *OMH CBRs* for the current year are required to be received by the **County** by October 15th.
- 11. The **Provider Agency** shall submit a copy of the following reports during the first quarter of each Fiscal Year:
 - a) Disaster Response Plan. In addition the **Provider Agency** will participate in the development of an Oneida County plan to respond to man-made or natural disasters.
 - b) Accounting System & Financial Capability Questionnaire (where applicable).
 - c) Corporate Compliance Plan. The plan will reflect efforts to ensure that personnel are aware of and in compliance with relevant laws and regulations.
 - d) Annual Audit and Financial Reports.
 - e) Federal Single Audit Report. If the **Provider Agency** is scheduled to receive funds in excess of \$300,000.00 or more in a year in federal funds, exclusive of Medicaid and Medicare. The Single Audit shall be conducted in accordance with OMB Circular A-133, OMB Circular A-110, the A-102 Common Rule and such other circulars, interpretations, opinions, rules or regulations that may be issued in connection with the single Audit Act Amendments of 1996.
- 12. The **Provider Agency** shall operate all programs in compliance with the laws, rules and regulations as passed and /or promulgated by the **County**, State or Federal governments. It is further understood by the **Provider Agency** that agencies and departments of New York State other than OMH, Office of Alcoholism & Substance Abuse Services (OASAS), and Office of Persons with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD) may promulgate these rules and regulations.
- 13. The Provider Agency further covenants and agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the County, its officers, agents and employees, from and against any and all loss or expenses that may arise by reason of liability for damage, injury or death, or for invasion of personal or property rights, of every name and nature, and whether casual or continuing trespass or nuisance, and any other claims for damages arising at law and equity alleged to have been caused or sustained in whole or in part by or because of any omission of duty, negligence or wrongful act on the part of the Provider Agency and the County, their officers, agents or employees, in connection with this Agreement. In addition, the Provider Agency shall obtain and maintain comprehensive general liability insurance satisfactory to the County with a minimum of \$1,000,000 per occurrence coverage. The County of Oneida must be named as an "Additionally Insured" as part of the Provider Agency's insurance policy. Proof of same must be provided to the County at the time of the execution of this contract. It is expressly

understood that if during the course of this Agreement, said insurance policy is canceled or otherwise allowed to lapse, the Provider Agency must provide the County proof of insurance consistent with the stipulations listed above. Failure to do may result in the immediate termination of this Agreement.

14. Either party may terminate this Agreement by giving fifteen (15) days prior written notice of such termination to the other party. Notwithstanding the above, if, through any cause, the **Provider Agency** fails to comply with legal, professional, **County** or **State** requirements for the provision of the services covered under this Agreement, or if the **Provider Agency** becomes bankrupt or insolvent or falsify their records or reports, the **County** may terminate this Agreement effective immediately, or, at its option, effective at a later date after sending notice of such termination to the **Provider Agency**.

The **County** shall be released from any and all responsibilities and obligations arising from the services covered by this Agreement, effective as of the date of termination. The **County** shall be responsible for payment of all claims for services provided and costs incurred by the **Provider Agency** prior to the termination of this Agreement that are pursuant to and after **Provider Agency** compliance with the terms and conditions herein.

Notice of termination must be in writing, signed by an authorized official, and sent to the other party by certified mail or messenger, and receipt shall be requested. Notice of termination shall be deemed delivered as of the date of it's posting by certified mail or at the time it is delivered to the other party by messenger.

If any term or provision of this Agreement shall be found to be illegal or unenforceable, then, notwithstanding the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and such term or provision shall be deemed stricken. The laws of the State of New York shall govern this contract and jurisdiction and venue shall lie within the State of New York.

15. The **Provider Agency** agrees to maintain files in a confidential manner pursuant to the applicable statutes contained in New York State Mental Hygiene Law and any Federal Law regulating such files. Information contained in these files shall be released only upon the written consent of the client being served or to the Oneida County Department of Mental Health as outlined below.

It is expressly understood that as a **Provider Agency** for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health, it may and will receive confidential information from the Department of Mental Health and this information may have been received from other independent contractors and/or licensed agencies. The **Provider Agency** agrees that all such information will be considered as being confidential and shall not be re-disclosed without the written consent of the individual.

Accordingly, as a condition of and in consideration of access to confidential information, the **Provider Agency** promises that:

- A. They will use confidential information only as needed to perform the legitimate duties as outlined above for the Oneida County Department of Mental Health and the Tier I program. This means, among other things, that:
- 1. The **Provider Agency** will only access confidential information for which there is a need to know; and
- 2. The **Provider Agency** will not in any way divulge, copy, release, sell, loan review, alter or destroy any confidential information except as properly authorized.
- 3. The **Provider Agency** will not misuse confidential information or carelessly handle confidential information.
 - B. The **Provider Agency** will safeguard and will not disclose any access code or any other authorization that allows access to confidential information. The **Provider Agency** accepts responsibility for all activities undertaken using any access code and other authorization.
 - C. The **Provider Agency** will report activities by any individual or entity that is suspected of or may compromise the confidentiality of confidential information. Reports made in good faith about suspect activities will be held in confidence to the extent

permitted by law, including the name of the individual reporting the activities.

- D. The **Provider Agency** understands that the obligations under this Agreement will continue after termination of employment and that it is further understood that any privileges hereunder are subject to periodic review, revision and if appropriate, renewal.
- E. The **Provider Agency** understands that there is no right or ownership interest in any confidential information referred to in this Agreement. The Oneida County Department of Mental Health may at any time revoke any access code, other authorization, or access to confidential information. At all times during the course of providing services under this Agreement, the **Provider Agency** will safeguard the confidentiality of all confidential information.
- F. The **Provider Agency** will be responsible for any misuse or wrongful disclosure of confidential information and for any failure to safeguard an access code or other authorization access to confidential information. It is expressly understood that any failure to comply with this Agreement may result in immediate termination of access to the information system and legal action against the **Provider**.
- 16. The **Provider Agency** agrees not to discriminate or refuse assistance to individuals diagnosed with AIDS or an HIV infection or an HIV related illness. If the **Provider Agency** is provided with any confidential HIV related information during the course of providing services and in accordance with 403 of Title 18 of the NYSDSS regulation and Section 2782 of the Public Health Law, they shall be informed of the penalties and fines for any redisclosure found to be in violation of New York State Law and/or Regulation.

The **Provider Agency** shall include the following written statement when disclosing any confidential HIV related Information:

"This information has been disclosed to you from confidential records, which are protected by State Law. State Law prohibits you from making any further disclosure of this information without the specific written consent of the person to whom it pertains, or as otherwise permitted by law. Any unauthorized further disclosure in violation of State Law may result in a fine or jail sentence or both. A general authorization for the release of medical or other information is not sufficient authorization for further disclosure."

- 17. The **Provider Agency** agrees that as mandated reporters, all instances of suspected child abuse, neglect, and/or maltreatment, will be reported to the Central Registry as required by law. These verbal reports will be followed by submission of completed 2221A to the local Department of Social Services. The family will be informed in advance of the decision to file a report with the Central Register. The **Provider Agency** shall also notify the Commissioner of Oneida County Department of Mental Health of any and all reports made to the Child Abuse Registry.
- 18. It is understood that this instrument represents the entire Agreement of the parties hereto; both parties shall execute that all previous understandings are merged herein; and that no modifications hereof shall be valid unless written evidence shall be executed thereof.
- 19. **Miscellaneous Provisions:** Annexed hereto and made a part hereof as Appendix A and Appendix B are additional terms, covenants and conditions which the respective parties agree to be bound by and follow as part of this Agreement.

WHEREAS, COUNTY and CONTRACTOR have entered into a contract, license, lease, amendment or other agreement of any kind (hereinafter referred to as the "Contract"), and

WHEREAS, the Oneida County Attorney and the Oneida County Director of Purchasing have recommended the inclusion of the standard clauses set forth in this Addendum to be included in every Contract for which COUNTY is a party, now, thereafter,

The parties to the attached Contract, for good consideration, agree to be bound by the following clauses which are hereby made a part of the Contract.

1. Executor or Non-Appropriation Clause.

The County shall have no liability or obligation under this Contract to the Contractor or to anyone else beyond the annual funds being appropriated and available for this Contract.

2. Oneida County Board of Legislators: Resolution #249 Solid Waste Disposal Requirements.

Pursuant to Oneida County Board of Legislator Resolution No. 249 of May 26, 1999, the Contractor agrees to deliver exclusively to the facilities of the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority, all waste and recyclables generated within the Authority's service area by performance of this Contract by the Contractor and any subcontractors. Upon awarding of this Contract, and before work commences, the Contractor will be required to provide Oneida County with proof that Resolution No. 249 of 1999 has been complied with, and that all wastes and recyclables in the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority's service area which are generated by the Contractor and any subcontractors in performance of this Contract will be delivered exclusively to Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority facilities.

3. Certification Regarding Lobbying; Debarment, Suspension and other Responsibility Matters; and Drug-Free Workplace Requirements.

- a. Lobbying. As required by Section 1352, Title 31 of the U.S. Code and implemented at 34 CFR Part 82 for persons entering into a grant or cooperative agreement over \$100,000, as defined at 34 CFR Part 82, Section 82.105 and 82.110, the Contractor certifies that:
 - 1. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the Contractor, to any persons for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, and officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the making of any Federal Grant, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and

- the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal grant or cooperative agreement.
- 2. If any funds other than federally appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this federal grant or cooperative agreement, the Contractor shall complete and submit Standard Form 111 "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.
- 3. The Contractor shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all subcontracts and that all subcontractors shall certify and disclose accordingly.

Furthermore, in accordance with Section 220-e of the Labor Law, if this is a Contract for the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work or for the manufacture, sale or distribution of materials, equipment or supplies, and to the extent that this Contract shall be performed within the State of New York, the Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall, by reason of race, creed, color, disability, sex, or national origin: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this Contract. The Contractor shall establish and maintain complete and accurate books, records, documents, accounts and other evidence directly pertinent to performance under this Contract (hereinafter, collectively, "the Records"). The Records shall include, but not be limited to, reports, statements, examinations, letters, memoranda, opinions, folders, files, books, manuals, pamphlets, forms, papers, designs, drawings, maps, photos, letters, microfilms, computer tapes or discs, electronic files, e-mails and attachments, rules, regulations and codes. The Records must be kept for the balance of the calendar year in which they were made and for six (6) additional years thereafter. The County Comptroller, the County Attorney and any other person or entity authorized to conduct an examination, as well as the agency or agencies involved in

this Contract, shall have access to the Records during normal business hours at an office of the Contractor within the County or, if no such office is available, at a mutually agreeable and reasonable venue within the County, for the term specified above for the purposes of inspection, auditing and copying. The County shall take reasonable steps to protect from public disclosure any of the Records which are exempt from disclosure under Section 87 of the Public Officers Law (the "Statute") provided that: (a) the Contractor shall timely inform an appropriate County official, in writing, that said records should not be disclosed; (b) said records shall be sufficiently identified; and (c) designation of said records as exempt under the Statute is reasonable. Nothing contained herein shall diminish, or in any way adversely affect, the County's right to discovery in any pending or future litigation. Notwithstanding any other language, the Records may be subject to disclosure under the New York Freedom of Information Law, for other applicable state or federal law, rule or regulation.

11. Identifying Information and Privacy Notification.

- a. Identification Number(s). Every invoice or claim for payment submitted to a County agency by a payee, for payment for the sale of goods or service or for transactions (e.g., leases, easements, licenses, etc.) related to real or personal property must include the payee's identification number. The number is any or all of the following: (i) the payee's Federal employer identification number, (ii) the payee's Federal social security number, and/or (iii) the payee's Vendor Identification Number assigned by the Statewide Financial System. Where the payee does not have such number or numbers, the payees, on its invoice or claim for payment, must give the reason or reasons why the payee does not have such number or numbers.
- b. Privacy Notification. (1) The authority to request the above personal information from a seller of goods or services or a lessor of real or personal property, and the authority to maintain such information, is found in Section 5 of the State Tax Law. Disclosure of this information by the seller or lessor to the County is mandatory. The principle purpose for which the information is collected is to enable the State to identify individuals, businesses and others who have been delinquent in filing tax returns or may have understated their liabilities and to generally identify persons affected by the taxes administered by the New York State Commissioner of Taxation and Finance. The information will be used for tax administration purposes and for any other purpose authorized by law. (2) The personal information is requested by the County's purchasing unit contracting to purchase goods or services or lease the real or personal property covered by this Contract.

12. Conflicting Terms.

In the event of a conflict between the terms of the Contract (including any and all attachments thereto and amendments thereof) and the terms of this Addendum, the terms of this Addendum shall control.

13. Governing Law.

This Contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of New York except where the Federal supremacy clause requires otherwise.

14. Prohibition on Purchase of Tropical Hardwoods.

The Contractor certifies and warrants that all wood products to be used under this Contract award will be

in accordance with, but not limited to, the specifications and provisions of Section 165 of the State Finance Law (Use of Tropical Hardwoods), which prohibits purchase and use of tropical hardwoods, unless specifically exempted by the State or any governmental agency or political subdivision or public benefit corporation. Qualification for an exemption under this law will be the responsibility of the Contractor to establish to meet with the approval of the County.

In addition, when any portion of this Contract involving the use of woods, whether supply or installation, is to be performed by any subcontractor, the prime Contractor will indicate and certify in the submitted bid proposal that the subcontractor has been informed and is in compliance with specifications and provisions regarding use of tropical hardwoods as detailed in Section 165 of the State Finance Law. Any such use must meet with approval of the County; otherwise, the bid may not be considered responsive. Under bidder certifications, proof of qualification for exemption will be the responsibility of the Contractor to meet with the approval of the County.

15. Compliance with New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act

The Contractor shall comply with the provisions of the New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act (General Business Law Section 899-aa).

16. Gratuities and Kickbacks.

- a. Gratuities. It shall be unethical for any person to offer, give, or agree to give any County employee or former County employee, or for any County employee or former County employee to solicit, demand, accept, or agree to accept from another person, a gratuity or an offer of employment in connection with any decision, approval, disapproval, recommendation, or preparation of any part of a program requirement or a purchase request, influencing the content of any specification or procurement standard, rendering of advice, investigation, auditing, or in any other advisory capacity in any proceeding or application, request for ruling, determination, claim, or controversy, or other particular matter, pertaining to any program requirement or a contract or subcontract, or to any solicitation or proposal therefor.
- b. Kickbacks. It shall be unethical for any payment, gratuity, or offer of employment to be made by or on behalf of a subcontractor under a contract to the prime contractor or higher tier subcontractor or any person associated therewith, as an inducement for the award of a subcontract or order.

17. Audit

The County, the State of New York, and the United States shall have the right at any time during the term of this agreement and for the period limited by the applicable statute of limitations to audit the payment of monies hereunder. The Contractor shall comply with any demands made by the County to provide information with respect to the payment of monies hereunder during the period covered by this paragraph. The Contractor shall maintain its books and records in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles or such other method of account which is approved in writing by the County prior to the date of this agreement. The revenues and expenditures of the Contractor in connection with this agreement shall be separately identifiable. Each expenditure or claim for payment shall be fully documented. Expenditures or claims for payment which are not fully documented may be disallowed. The Contractor agrees to provide to or permit the County to examine or obtain copies of any documents relating to the payment of money to the Contractor or expenditures made by the Contractor for which reimbursement is made to the Contractor by the County. The

Contractor shall maintain all records required by this paragraph for 7 years after the date this agreement is terminated or ends.

If the Contractor has expended, in any fiscal year, \$300,000.00 or more in funds provided by a Federal financial assistance program from a Federal agency pursuant to this agreement and all other contracts with the County, the Contractor shall provide the County with an audit prepared by an independent auditor in accordance with the Single Audit Act of 1984, 31 U.S.C. §§ 7501, et seq., as amended, and the regulations adopted pursuant to such Act.

18. Certification of compliance with the Iran Divestment Act.

Pursuant Section 103-g of the General Municipal Law, by submitting a bid in response to this solicitation or by assuming the responsibility of a Contract awarded hereunder, each Bidder/Contractor, any person signing on behalf of any Bidder/Contractor and any assignee or subcontractor and, in the case of a joint bid, each party thereto, certifies, under penalty of perjury, that once the Prohibited Entities List is posted on the Office of General Services (OGS) website, that to the best of its knowledge and belief, that each Bidder/Contractor and any subcontractor or assignee is not identified on the Prohibited Entities List created pursuant to State Finance Law § 165-a(3)(b).

Additionally, the Bidder/Contractor is advised that once the Prohibited Entities List is posted on the OGS website, any Bidder/Contractor seeking to renew or extend a Contract or assume the responsibility of a Contract awarded in response to this solicitation must certify at the time the Contract is renewed, extended or assigned that it is not included on the Prohibited Entities List.

During the term of the Contract, should the County receive information that a Bidder/Contractor is in violation of the above-referenced certification, the County will offer the person or entity an opportunity to respond. If the person or entity fails to demonstrate that he/she/it has ceased engagement in the investment which is in violation of the Iran Divestment Act of 2012 within 90 days after the determination of such violation, then the County shall take such action as may be appropriate including, but not limited to, imposing sanctions, seeking compliance, recovering damages or declaring the Bidder/Contractor in default.

The County reserves the right to reject any bid or request for assignment for a Bidder/Contractor that appears on the Prohibited Entities List prior to the award of a Contract and to pursue a responsibility review with respect to any Bidder/Contractor that is awarded a Contract and subsequently appears on the Prohibited Entities List.

The Contractor may, however, assign its right to receive payment without the State's prior written consent unless this contract concerns Certificates of Participation pursuant to Article 5-A of the State Finance Law.
- 3. COMPTROLLER'S APPROVAL. In accordance with Section 112 of the State Finance Law (or, if this contract is with the State University or City University of New York, Section 355 or Section 6218 of the Education Law), if this contract exceeds \$50,000 (or the minimum thresholds agreed to by the Office of the State Comptroller for certain S.U.N.Y. and C.U.N.Y. contracts), or if this is an amendment for any amount to a contract which, as so amended, exceeds said statutory amount, or if, by this contract, the State agrees to give something other than money when the value or reasonably estimated value of such consideration exceeds \$10,000, it shall not be valid, effective or binding upon the State until it has been approved by the State Comptroller and filed in his office. Comptroller's approval of contracts let by the Office of General Services is required when such contracts exceed \$85,000 (State Finance Law Section 163.6.a).
- 4. WORKERS' COMPENSATION BENEFITS. In accordance with Section 142 of the State Finance Law, this contract shall be void and of no force and effect unless the Contractor shall provide and maintain coverage during the life of this contract for the benefit of such employees as are required to be covered by the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Law.
- 5. NON-DISCRIMINATION REQUIREMENTS. To the extent required by Article 15 of the Executive Law (also known as the Human Rights Law) and all other State and Federal statutory and constitutional non-discrimination provisions, the Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed, color, sex, national origin, sexual orientation, age, disability, genetic predisposition or carrier status, or marital status. Furthermore, in accordance with Section 220-e of the Labor Law, if this is a contract for the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work or for the manufacture, sale or distribution of materials, equipment or supplies, and to the extent that this contract shall be performed within the State of New York, Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall, by reason of race, creed, color, disability, sex, or national origin: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this contract. If this is a building service contract as defined in Section 230 of the Labor Law, then, in accordance with Section 239 thereof, Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall by reason of race, creed, color, national origin, age, sex or disability: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this contract. Contractor is subject to fines of \$50.00 per person per day for any violation of Section 220-e or Section 239 as well as possible termination of this contract and forfeiture of all moneys due hereunder for a second or subsequent violation.
- 6. WAGE AND HOURS PROVISIONS. If this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law or a

building service contract covered by Article 9 thereof, neither Contractor's employees nor the employees of its subcontractors may be required or permitted to work more than the number of hours or days stated in said statutes, except as otherwise provided in the Labor Law and as set forth in prevailing wage and supplement schedules issued by the State Labor Department. Furthermore, Contractor and its subcontractors must pay at least the prevailing wage rate and pay or provide the prevailing supplements, including the premium rates for overtime pay, as determined by the State Labor Department in accordance with the Labor Law.

- 7. NON-COLLUSIVE BIDDING CERTIFICATION. In accordance with Section 139-d of the State Finance Law, if this contract was awarded based upon the submission of bids, Contractor affirms, under penalty of perjury, that its bid was arrived at independently and without collusion aimed at restricting competition. Contractor further affirms that, at the time Contractor submitted its bid, an authorized and responsible person executed and delivered to the State a non-collusive bidding certification on Contractor's behalf.
- 8. INTERNATIONAL BOYCOTT PROHIBITION. In accordance with Section 220-f of the Labor Law and Section 139-h of the State Finance Law, if this contract exceeds \$5,000, the Contractor agrees, as a material condition of the contract, that neither the Contractor nor any substantially owned or affiliated person, firm, partnership or corporation has participated, is participating, or shall participate in an international boycott in violation of the federal Export Administration Act of 1979 (50 USC App. Sections 2401 et seq.) or regulations thereunder. If such Contractor, or any of the aforesaid affiliates of Contractor, is convicted or is otherwise found to have violated said laws or regulations upon the final determination of the United States Commerce Department or any other appropriate agency of the United States subsequent to the contract's execution, such contract, amendment or modification thereto shall be rendered forfeit and void. The Contractor shall so notify the State Comptroller within five (5) business days of such conviction, determination or disposition of appeal (2NYCRR 105.4).
- 9. SET-OFF RIGHTS. The State shall have all of its common law, equitable and statutory rights of set-off. These rights shall include, but not be limited to, the State's option to withhold for the purposes of set-off any moneys due to the Contractor under this contract up to any amounts due and owing to the State with regard to this contract, any other contract with any State department or agency, including any contract for a term commencing prior to the term of this contract, plus any amounts due and owing to the State for any other reason including, without limitation, tax delinquencies, fee delinquencies or monetary penalties relative thereto. The State shall exercise its set-off rights in accordance with normal State practices including, in cases of set-off pursuant to an audit, the finalization of such audit by the State agency, its representatives, or the State Comptroller.
- 10. RECORDS. The Contractor shall establish and maintain complete and accurate books, records, documents, accounts and other evidence directly pertinent to performance under this contract (hereinafter, collectively, 'the Records'). The Records must be kept for the balance of the calendar year in which they were made and for six (6) additional years thereafter. The State Comptroller, the Attorney General and any other person or entity authorized to conduct an examination, as well as the agency or agencies involved in this contract, shall have access to the Records during normal business hours at an office of the Contractor within the State of New York or, if no such office is available, at a mutually agreeable and reasonable venue within the State, for the term specified above for the purposes of inspection, auditing and copying. The State shall take reasonable steps to protect from public disclosure any of the Records which are exempt from disclosure under Section 87 of the Public Officers Law (the 'Statute') provided that: (i) the Contractor shall timely inform an appropriate State official, in writing, that said records should not be disclosed; and (ii) said records shall be sufficiently identified; and (iii) designation of said records as exempt under the Statute is reasonable. Nothing contained herein shall diminish, or in any way adversely affect, the State's right to discovery in any pending or future litigation.
- 11. IDENTIFYING INFORMATION AND PRIVACY NOTIFICATION.
- (a) FEDERAL EMPLOYER IDENTIFICATION NUMBER and/or FEDERAL SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER. All invoices or New York State standard vouchers submitted for payment for the sale of goods or services or the lease of real or personal property to a New York State agency must include the payee's identification number, i.e., the seller's or lessor's identification number. The number is either the payee's Federal employer identification number or Federal social security number, or both such numbers when the payee has both such numbers. Failure to include this number or numbers may delay payment. Where the payee does not have such number or numbers, the payee, on its invoice or New York State standard voucher, must give the reason or reasons why the payee does not have such number or numbers.
- (b) PRIVACY NOTIFICATION.
- (1) The authority to request the above personal information from a seller of goods or services or a lessor of real or personal property, and the authority to maintain such information, is found in Section 5 of the State Tax Law.

- 13. CONFLICTING TERMS. In the event of a conflict between the terms of the contract (including any and all attachments thereto and amendments thereof) and the terms of this Appendix A, the terms of this Appendix A shall control.
- 14. GOVERNING LAW. This contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of New York except where the Federal supremacy clause requires otherwise.
- 15. LATE PAYMENT. Timeliness of payment and any interest to be paid to Contractor for late payment shall be governed by Article 11-A of the State Finance Law to the extent required by law.
- 16. NO ARBITRATION. Disputes involving this contract, including the breach or alleged breach thereof, may not be submitted to binding arbitration (except where statutorily authorized), but must, instead, be heard in a court of

competent jurisdiction of the State of New York.

17. SERVICE OF PROCESS. In addition to the methods of service allowed by the State Civil Practice Law & Rules ('CPLR'), Contractor hereby consents to service of process upon it by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested. RE: A LOCAL LAW PROHIBITING CYBERBULLYING WITHIN ONEIDA COUNTY

Section1. Legislative Intent.

Bullying is a long-standing problem in Oneida County and throughout the country. With the proliferation of the use of electronic means of communication, bullying has transformed from a predominately school-based issue among youth to a broader societal problem affecting both youths and adults.

Researchers have demonstrated that bullying has long-term consequences. Furthermore, bullying goes beyond the classroom to the internet, athletic teams, college campuses, work places, and amongst the general public.

Victims of cyberbullying suffer very real and serious harm as a result of these incidents, often showing signs of depression, anxiety, social isolation, nervousness when interacting with technology, low self-esteem, declining school and work performance, hyper-vigilance and nightmares, changed eating and sleeping habits, and fear for their safety.

Cyberbullying has been shown to cause significant psychological trauma to victims. In some cases, victims attempt or commit suicide due to, in part, the cyberbullying they have endured.

Perpetrators of cyberbullying are often more extreme in the threats and taunts they inflict on their victims, as they do not actually see their victim's emotional reaction to the abuse and may believe that they are anonymous.

Researchers have identified *negative impacts to all* who are involved in cyberbullying, including the victims, perpetrators, and bystanders, as well as their families. "Bullying is associated with other forms of antisocial behavior such as vandalism, shoplifting, and truancy [workplace absences] dropping out of school [high workplace turnover], fighting [hostile work environment], and drug use, as well as negative emotions which are sometimes resolved in deviant ways."

Cyberbullying frequently escalates into off-line stalking and harassment, including harassing and repeated phone calls, threats, obscene mail, vandalism, trespassing and physical assault.

Cyberbullying is far more than a social issue and has short-term and long-term negative impacts on health, schools, workplaces and society. There are increased costs to the health care system for treating bullying-related health conditions; "Bullying behavior affects a target's ability to perform their jobs, which can impact the morale of employees and the financial performance of an organization."²; schools experience an adverse effect on their environments and a loss of revenue due to drop out rates³; Society suffers from a drain on resources within the justice and social service systems.³

Experts have suggested that one tool for schools and workplaces to use in combating bullying, is to maintain and enforce consistent policies against bullying and harassment, including cyberbullying. Such enforcement is not always possible when bullying occurs away from school or away from the workplace or by a non-student or non-employee. A bullied victim can no longer count on respite from attacks upon returning home from school or work. Cyberbullying can be an inescapable 24-hour, 7-day a week problem.

Several states have enacted laws criminalizing cyberbullying. To date, the New York State Legislature has failed to fully take action on this problem. Oneida County should not wait for New York State to take action, and should implement legislation to discourage and prevent cyberbullying from occurring.

Therefore, the purpose of this Local Law is to prohibit cyberbullying in Oneida County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the Board of County Legislators of the County of Oneida, State of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Definitions.

As used in this Local Law, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

- A. County -shall mean the County of Oneida, New York.
- B. Cyberbullying shall mean harassment or bullying accomplished by publishing, communicating or causing a communication to be initiated or displayed, through

mechanical or electronic means, including, but not limited to, internet-based communication, electronic mail, social networking sites, web sites, and cellular telephones.

C. Harassment or bullying – shall mean:

- 1. The creation and/or publishing of any form of verbal or written communication, or visual material, with the malicious and willful intent to coerce, extort, abuse, torment, threaten, terrify or intimidate a specific other person, that serves no legitimate purpose, and causes such other person to suffer:
 - a. Actual and reasonable fear of physical harm to himself or herself, a member of such person's immediate family or a third party with whom such person is acquainted; or
 - b Actual and reasonable fear of damage to the property of such person or member of such person's immediate family or a third party with whom such person is acquainted; or
 - c. A substantially detrimental effect on his or her physical, mental or emotional health.
- 2. For the purposes of subdivision one of this section, "form of verbal or written communication, or visual material" shall include, but not be limited to, a 'recording' as defined in Penal Law § 275.00(6), but shall not include constitutionally protected speech.
- 3. Harassment or bullying includes, but is not limited to:
 - a. Constructing a fake profile or website; or
 - b. Posting a real or doctored image on the Internet of such other person; or
 - c. Using a computer system for repeated, continuing or sustained electronic communications to such other person, including, but not limited to electronic mail or other transmissions; or
 - d. Making any statement, whether true or false intended to immediately provoke, and that is likely to provoke, any third party to harass or bully, as defined in subdivision one of this section, another person.
- D. Person shall mean any natural person or individual, corporation, unincorporated association, proprietorship, firm, partnership, joint venture, joint-stock association, or other entity or business organization of any kind.
- E. Publishing shall mean the issuing, printing, reproducing, distributing, circulating or any other means of communicating to other individuals, including through mechanical or electronic means.

Section 2. Prohibitions.

No person shall engage in cyberbullying against any other person when such other person is located in the county of Oneida.

Section 3. Enforcement

This Local Law shall be enforced by any certified law enforcement officer within his or her respective jurisdiction within the geographical boundaries of Oneida County, by either arrest of, or the issuance of a summons to, a person violating the provisions of this law and requiring his or her appearance before a court of competent jurisdiction.

Section 4. Prosecution.

Pursuant to Section 1702 of the Oneida County Charter, the District Attorney is required and delegated the duty to prosecute any and all violations of this Local Law, provided the alleged perpetrator is over sixteen years of age. If the alleged perpetrator is over seven and less than sixteen years of age, then the County Attorney shall present any and all violations of this Local Law by way of a juvenile delinquency petition in Family Court.

Section 5. Penalties.

Any person found to be in violation of this Local Law shall be guilty of an unclassified misdemeanor, and shall be subject to a fine of no less than \$500, but not to exceed \$1,000, and/or a term of imprisonment not to exceed one year.

Section 6. Applicability.

This Local Law shall apply to all actions occurring on or after the effective date of this Local Law.

Section 7. Reverse Preemption.

This added Local Law shall be null and void on the day that statewide or federal legislation goes into effect, incorporating either the same or substantially similar provisions as are contained in this Local Law, or in the event that a pertinent state or federal administrative agency issues and promulgates regulations preempting such action by the County of Oneida. The County Legislature may determine by resolution whether or not identical or substantially similar statewide or federal legislation has been enacted for the purposes of triggering the provisions of this section.

Section 8. Effective Date.

This Local Law shall become effective immediately upon the filing with the New York Secretary of State pursuant to Section 27 of the Municipal Home Rule Law.

Section 9. Severability.

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this Local Law or the application thereof, to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity or circumstance, shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order of judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this Local Law or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or order shall be rendered.

Thomas Zalocha, owner of the property at 355 Higby Road, New Hartford, NY has contacted WQPC requesting refund of sewer charges paid to the Oneida County Sewer District.

The Zalocha residence at 355 Higby Road, New Hartford (Tax map ID 304889 340.000-2-2), due to the distance from the nearest available point of sewer connection, was built with a septic system installed. The property has been serviced by Mohawk Valley Water Authority (MVWA) for water delivery since completion of construction in 2003. Unfortunately, the MVWA account was not coded correctly for billing purposes upon activation of the account. Mr. Zalocha has been incorrectly billed for, and paid, Oneida County sewer charges since 2003.

WQPC inspected the property at 355 Higby Road, New Hartford and confirmed that the house is connected to a septic system and not the OCSD. Mr. Zalocha provided a copy of the septic plans for our records. WQPC then contacted the MVWA to request correction of the account code. MVWA confirmed that they corrected their billing to reflect the property is not connected to OCSD, and no further charges will be levied.

The Oneida County Sewer District Rate Schedule allows for refund of erroneously billed wastewater treatment services up to a maximum of 6 years. The calculated refund for this time period is \$1,371.01, for which a breakdown is attached.

As per the Schedule, all requests for refund or adjustment of residential accounts in excess of \$1,000 must be approved by the Oneida County Board of Legislators. The refund of charges for this property is warranted, as they are not connected to the County sewer system. Therefore, please request the Board to authorize refund of County sewer charges in the amount of \$1,371.01.



ONEIDA COUNTY SEWER DISTRICT RATE SCHEDULE EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2013

This rate schedule will apply to all bills issued after the effective date. It will remain in effect until modified by the Oneida County Board of Legislators

A. RESIDENTIAL CUSTOMER FEES

1. Metered Consumption

Customers will be charged a wastewater treatment fee based on metered water usage. The rate charged will be \$3.76 per 1000 gallons of water consumed. The customer will receive a bill for these services through contract billing services provided by the Mohawk Valley Water Authority, the Sauquoit Water District or the Clayville Water District. The Sewer District wastewater treatment fee can be calculated using the following equation.

Billable Amount = (cubic feet of water consumed)*(7.481 gallons/cubic foot)*(\$3.76) (1000 gallons)

2. Unmetered Consumption

Customers who do not have water meters will have a usage calculated based on an estimated water consumption rate of 50 gallons per person per day. The maximum charge per household will be based on 200 gallons per day. The rate charged will be \$3.76 per 1000 gallons of water consumed. The customer will receive a bill directly from the Sewer District for these services. The Sewer District wastewater treatment fee can be calculated using the following equation.

Billable Amount = (days in billing period)*(50 gallons/ day)*(number of people)*(\$3.76) (1000 gallons)

Customers covered under this section of the rate schedule will be required to complete a form certifying as to the number of persons occupying the property serviced by the account. Customers who do not submit the required certification form will be charged the maximum household rate of 200 gallons per day. Customers who intentionally misrepresent the number of occupants per household can be charged with a Class A misdemeanor pursuant to Section 210.45 of the Penal Law. Furthermore, restitution will be required as per Section D-3 of this rate schedule.

3. Sauquoit Creek Basin Surcharge

In addition to the charges listed in sections 1 and 2, customers whose discharge is tributary to the Sauquoit Creek Pumping Station will be assessed an additional surcharge to pay for capital expenditures and system repairs associated with the NYSDEC Consent Order. Like regular residential fees, the surcharge is based on metered or unmetered water consumption as listed in the formulas below. The rate charged will be \$1.05 per 1000 gallons of water consumed. The customer will receive a bill for these services through contract billing services provided by the Mohawk Valley Water Authority, the Sauquoit Water District, and the Clayville Water District or directly from the Oneida County Sewer District.

Billable Amount = (cubic feet of water consumed)*(7.481 gallons/cubic foot)*(\$1.05) (1000 gallons)

Billable Amount = $\underline{\text{(days in billing period)*(50 gallons/day)*(number of people)*($1.05)}}$ (1000 gallons)

B. INDUSTRIAL CUSTOMER FEES

1. Basic Rate

Industrial customers will be charged a fee based on metered water consumption and be subject to the same rates as residential customers. In addition to these fees, industrial customers who require a permit under Oneida County Sewer Use Rules and Regulations will be charged an annual permit fee of \$660 to cover monitoring and administrative costs. Additional or modified charges may apply as detailed in subsequent sections of this schedule.

2. High Strength Wastewater

Industrial customers who discharge high strength wastewater, as defined by the Sewer District, will be subject to fees in addition to those calculated using the basic rate. A surcharge will apply to discharges with total suspended solids (TSS) exceeding 290 mg/l and/or Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD) exceeding 330 mg/l. This surcharge will be \$0.02 per pound of TSS and/or BOD that exceed the limits as stated in this section. If insufficient BOD data exists to accurately determine the surcharge, Chemical Oxygen Demand (COD) can be substituted for BOD. In this case, the surcharge will be \$0.02 per pound of COD that exceeds 350 mg/l.

3. Federal Categorical Pretreatment Standards

Federal Categorical Pretreatment Standards have additional monitoring and administrative cost associated with them. Accordingly, an annual permit fee of \$1,100 will be charged to industrial customers who are subject to these standards.

4. Additional Sampling Fees

A fee of \$200 per sample may be charged if more than four (4) twenty-four hour composite samples are needed on an annual basis to characterize the discharge of an industrial customer.

5. Groundwater Remediation Projects

Groundwater clean up and site remediation projects approved by the Sewer District for discharge directly to the sewer system will be charged the basic rate, as indicated in Section B-1, for wastewater generated. An annual permit fee of \$100 will be assessed to cover monitoring and administrative fees. The customer will be required to provide accurate discharge data on a semi-annual basis for billing purposes.



C. FEES FOR WASTEWATER HAULED DIRECTLY TO THE TREATMENT PLANT

1. Basic Rate

Wastewater haulers who discharge directly to the wastewater treatment plant will be charged based on the actual amount of wastewater contained in each load. This fee will be \$0.08 per gallon of wastewater delivered. In addition, an annual permit fee of \$100 will be charged to cover monitoring and administrative costs. Additional or modified charges may apply as detailed in subsequent sections of this schedule.

2. Domestic Wastewater

Haulers of septage, cesspool and portable toilet wastewater, containing only household type wastewater, will be subject to all charges as detailed in Section C-1 of this schedule.

3. Non-Domestic Wastewater

Non-domestic wastewater, as approved by the Sewer District on a case-by-case basis, will be subject to all charges as detailed in Section C-1 of this schedule. In addition, the cost of contract laboratory services, plus 10%, will be billed to the permit holder for analytical analysis required by the Sewer District to accurately characterize the wastewater.

4. Municipal or Private Sewage Treatment Systems

Wastewater from municipal and private sewage treatment systems, as approved by the Sewer District on a case-by-case basis, will be subject to the charges as detailed in Section C-1 of this schedule.

5. Low Solids Wastewater and Leachate

Low solids wastewater, as approved by the Sewer District on a case-by-case basis, will be charged \$0.04 per gallon based on the actual amount of wastewater delivered. In addition, the cost of contract laboratory services, plus 10%, will be billed to the permit holder for analytical analysis required by the Sewer District to accurately characterize the wastewater.

6. Landfill Leachate

Landfill Leachate, as approved by the Sewer District on a case-by-case basis, will be charged \$0.02 per gallon based on the actual amount of wastewater delivered. In addition, the cost of contract laboratory services, plus 10%, will be billed to the permit holder for analytical analysis required by the Sewer District to accurately characterize the wastewater.

D. OTHER CHARGES AND ADJUSTMENTS

1. Late Charges

A late charge of 10% will be charged to all accounts that are not paid by the date they are due. This fee will be assessed at the start of every billing cycle and only imposed on newly accrued late balances from the previous billing cycle.

2. Delinquent Charges

All accounts that are overdue after October 31st and have a balance greater than or equal to \$50 will be declared delinquent and added to the tax rolls of the appropriate municipality. Once the delinquent accounts are transmitted to the Oneida County Department of Finance for processing, this department will be responsible for the collection activities associated with these accounts. Once declared delinquent, an additional charge of 10% will be assessed to the account. Delinquent charges are in addition to any other charges, including late charges.

Delinquent charges will be equally divided between the Oneida County Sewer District and the Oneida County Department of Finance as compensation for the cost of processing the delinquency. If the account actually is relevied on the tax rolls, the delinquent charge will rise to 12% with the Oneida County Sewer District receiving 5% and the Oneida County Finance Department receiving 7% as compensation for the cost of processing the delinquency.

3. Uncompensated Use of Sewer District Services

Sewer customers who have been found utilizing Sewer District wastewater treatment services without paying for them will be assessed fees for these services. The fee will be based on actual meter readings or a consumption rate of 200 gallons per day and the user fees in effect during the time the services were being utilized. Charges will be calculated based on the amount of time the service was being utilized but in no case shall it exceed 6 years.

It is the responsibility of the sewer customer to provide the Sewer District adequate information so that the length of time service was rendered can be established. The Sewer District may, at it own discretion, conduct an investigation to establish the length of time service was rendered and bill the customer accordingly.

4. Refunds

Customers who have been incorrectly billed for Sewer District wastewater treatment services may be entitled to a refund. The customer must petition the Sewer District in writing to have a refund considered. The refund will be based on the fees in effect during the time services were being utilized and will be calculated based on actual billing records. In no case shall the refund period exceed 6 years.

It is the responsibility of the customer to provide the Sewer District with adequate information to determine the amount of the refund. The Sewer District may, at its own discretion, conduct an investigation to establish the length of time service was incorrectly billed and base the refund to the customer accordingly.

Refunds for charges occurring in the current year will be processed as a credit to the customer's account. If the refunds encompass more than one year, or an active account no longer exists, the customer will receive reimbursement directly from the Sewer District, once the appropriate documents have been filed and processed by the County. If the refund is associated with a property that has a County tax lien, the refund will not be processed until this tax lien is satisfied.

The Commissioner of Water Quality and Water Pollution Control, upon thorough review of the documentation, may approve refunds up to \$1,000 per account. The Oneida County Board of Legislators must approve refunds over this amount.

5. Adjustments

Customers may request an adjustment to an account for abnormal water consumption that was not discharged to the sewer system. Adjustments will be considered only if water consumption records indicate an abnormal pattern of water use and if physical evidence exists to support the adjustment claim. The customer must petition the Sewer District in writing within 180 days of the occurrence of the event causing abnormal water consumption to have an adjustment considered.

Customers may request adjustments to an account for water consumed in industrial or manufacturing processes. The customer must petition the Sewer District in writing to have such an adjustment considered. Supporting documentation must accompany the petition. The Sewer District may require additional engineering analysis to support a petition. The cost of this analysis is the responsibility of the petitioner.

The Sewer District may, at it own discretion, conduct an investigation, including a physical inspection of the property, to establish the legitimacy of an adjustment claim. Normal water consuming activities such as routine swimming pool maintenance, car washing and lawn or garden watering are not grounds for an adjustment.

The Commissioner of Water Quality and Water Pollution Control, upon thorough review of the documentation, may approve adjustments up to \$5,000 per account. The Oneida County Board of Legislators must approve adjustments over this amount.

Governor Cuomo announced the availability of grants for Round 11 of the Water Quality Improvement Project (WQIP) program. The WQIP program is a competitive, reimbursement grant program funded primarily by the Environmental Protection Fund (EPF) and NY Works II for projects that reduce polluted runoff, improve water quality and restore habitat in New York's waterbodies. Municipalities are eligible to apply for this funding. Individual county funding requests can be submitted on behalf of one or more municipalities within the county.

Oneida County has received a request from the Sauquoit Creek Basin Intermunicpal Commission (the Commission) to submit an application to New York State for funding under the Water Ouality Improvement Project program. Since its creation in 2004 as a legal entity under Article 5-G of the General Municipal Law, the Commission has worked diligently to better manage the Sauquoit Creek watershed within the seven current member municipalities (Towns of Whitestown, New Hartford and Paris, Villages of Whitesboro, Yorkville, New York Mills and New Hartford). The Commission has developed a prioritized list of potential bank stabilization projects throughout the Basin for submittal under the WQIP program.

The WQIP program requires a local match of 25% which can be made up of in-kind work by the Commission, no Oneida County dollars will be expended on these projects. Upon award of the grant, the Commission will administer the program on behalf of Oneida County.

Therefore, we respectfully request that you submit to the Oneida County Board of Legislators a request to authorize you to submit an application to the WQIP program for an amount not to exceed \$750,000. Included in this resolution is the authorization to conduct any public hearings on the WQIP program, as required, and, if awarded the grant, authorization to enter into an agreement with the Sauquoit Creek Basin Intermunicipal Commission to administer the program.

Since the deadline for applications to the Water Quality Improvement Project (WQIP) program is November 8, 2013, it is essential that the Board of Legislators take action on this matter at their <u>October 9, 2013</u> meeting.
