As of April 1, 2013, The New York State Department of Health is requiring all municipalities who are approved service providers to complete the provider agreement. Oneida County Health Department staff currently provides service coordination to participants of this program. Based on 2013 budget figures, Oneida County Health Department is expected to provide service coordination to generate revenue in the amount of \$207,200 (Medicaid \$126,392, State \$39,596 and County \$41,212.)

Attached are three (3) copies of an agreement between Oneida County through its Health Department and Kids Oneida, Inc.

The Health Department is the lead agency, in partnership with Kids Oneida, Inc., funded by the New York State Office for Children and Family Services for the implementation and administration of the Healthy Families of Oneida County grant program. The Healthy Families of Oneida County is an intensive home visitation program for expectant and new families to enhance child and family development. Expected outcomes from the implementation of Healthy Families of Oneida County include the reduction of family dependency on government, teen pregnancy rates, child abuse and neglect, and improved family conduct, as well as improving rates of healthy birth outcomes, early prenatal care, age appropriate preventative health care for children and parent-child interactions.

As you recall, the Health Department has had a contract for the Healthy Families of Oneida County grant implementation and administration with Family Nurturing Center of Central New York. Inc. ("FNC") effective July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013. As you are aware, in October of 2012 the Executive Director of FNC passed away and FNC subsequently became an affiliate of Kids Oneida. Inc. effective March 1, 2013.

It is the intent of the Health Department, FNC and Kids Oneida, Inc. that the Health Department cease its contract with FNC and contract with Kids Oneida, Inc. effective March 1, 2013 until the remainder of the grant program so it may implement and administer the remaining Healthy Families of Oneida County grant. Thus, the term of this agreement shall be effective March 1, 2013 and remain in effect through June 30, 2013 with reimbursement in the amount of \$201,877, and is 100% state funded.

This is not a program mandated by Public Health Law.

### **TEMPORARY USE AGREEMENT**

THIS AGREEMENT made as of policy, 2013 by and between the COUNTY OF ONEIDA, a municipal corporation, having its office and principal place of business located at 800 Park Avenue, Utica, New York, hereinafter referred to as the COUNTY, and The Utica City School District of 106 Memorial Parkway, Utica, New York, New York, hereafter referred to as the USER.

### WITNESSETH

**WHEREAS**, the COUNTY and the USER wish to enter into an agreement whereby the COUNTY shall permit the USER to use Optical Scan Voting Systems owned by the COUNTY for the USER'S election, and the USER shall pay the COUNTY for service related to such use, under the terms and conditions described herein;

**NOW, THEREFORE**, in consideration of the mutual promises, terms and obligations hereinafter made, as well as other good and valuable consideration, the COUNTY and the USER mutually agree and obligate themselves as follows:

### 1. PURPOSE.

To enter into a written contract setting forth the terms and obligations of each of the parties under which the COUNTY will provide the Optical Scan Voting Systems and related election materials to the USER, and the USER agrees to pay for the temporary use of the Optical Scan Voting Systems and election materials necessary to conduct USER'S election.

a) The USER shall be responsible for returning to the COUNTY all equipment and nonexpendable materials in the same condition as they were in when provided to the USER by the COUNTY. The USER shall be responsible for any and all damages to the Optical Scan Voting Systems, the privacy booths and related election materials while in the custody of USER, regardless of cause, intent or foreseeability, including any and all damages caused or alleged to be caused by any third party. The USER shall indemnify and hold the COUNTY and any of its officers, employees and agents thereof free and harmless from any and all losses, penalties, damages, settlements, costs, charges, professional fees or other expenses or liability of every kind arising from or relating to any and all claims, liens, demands, obligations, actions, proceedings or causes of action of any kind in connection with, or arising directly or indirectly from the omissions



and/or acts of the COUNTY and /or arising out of the maintenance or use of the Optical Scan Voting Systems, privacy booths or related election materials.

### 2. **GOODS AND/OR SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED.**

As mutually agreed the COUNTY shall provide to the USER 26 Optical Scan Voting Systems, 54 privacy booths and ballot marking devices to conduct the USER's Election at a cost of \$225.00 per Optical Scan Voting System, including machine technical assistance and repairs, which will provided by Board of Elections staff **only**. Contact information for technical assistance will be provided by the Board of Elections. USER is responsible for payment of the transportation fee of the Board of Elections-specified transportation agent, as more fully set forth hereinafter.

- a) **BALLOTS:** USER will be responsible for payment of all fees and costs associated with the preparation and printing of the ballots. This includes payment to the Optical Scan Voting System vendor "Dominion Voting," which is the sole source company associated with Ballot definition and generation. Further, USER will be responsible for payment of all costs and fees to the certified vendor, "Fort Orange Press, Inc.," which is the designated vendor for the printing and delivery of the ballots and test decking ballots. USER is responsible for the ordering of, proofing and approval of all ballots, which will be shipped to the USER for verification and secure storage prior to the Election. USER is responsible for transporting ballots to the specified poll sites prior to the Election. All ballots are the property of the USER.
- b) **iBUTTONS & DATA CARDS:** COUNTY will generate "iButtons" and data cards as programmed by "Dominion Voting," and will perform the test decking of the Optical Scan Voting Systems. USER will pay COUNTY any and all fees associated with "iButton" and data card generation and actual supplies, as well as fees associated with the mandatory test decking. All "iButtons" and data cards will be returned by USER to the COUNTY. All fees and expenses associated with these activities are more fully described on EXHIBIT A attached.
- c) **DELIVERY & PICKUP**: The Optical Scan Voting Systems equipment and peripherals will be delivered not later than the day of the Election (see ITEM 3) and will be picked up

not later than the day after the Election by the designated Board of Elections transportation vendor. USER, and/or their designated representative, will be required to meet the Board of Elections representative at the time of delivery of the Optical Scan Voting System at each poll site designated by USER and is responsible to maintain the Optical Scan Voting System(s) and the Purple Election Supply Bag(s) in a secure location. USER will facilitate access to Optical Scan Voting Systems and related equipment and materials for pickup and return to the Board of Elections.

- d) **ELECTION DAY INSPECTORS:** COUNTY will provide the names of trained inspectors certified by the Board of Elections to operate the Optical Scan Voting System. USER will be responsible to hire, assign and pay the inspectors for the Election. Only Inspectors certified by the Board of Elections will be employed to operate the Optical Scan Voting System. In the event USER desires to hire individuals who have not previously been trained as Inspectors, COUNTY will provide training to Inspectors at the COUNTY-established rate which shall be reimbursed by the USER. The USER will be responsible for paying the Election Inspectors the standard County Inspector pay rate for their service at the polls. Inspectors must be in place not less than one-half hour prior to the opening of the polls and are paid through one-half hour after the close of polls. There must be a minimum of three (3) inspectors assigned to each election district.
- e) **POLL SITE LOCATIONS**: USER is responsible for all poll-site use fees and for completion of use-site applications and assurances.
- **3. TERM**. The Optical Scan Voting Systems and other services are to be provided for the USER'S election to take place on May 21, 2013. All Optical Scan Voting Systems and peripheral accessories will be delivered on May 20, 2013 and picked up on May 22, 2013. Delivery and pick-up will take place between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 4:30 P.M. on those dates and USER agrees to keep poll sites open for those times for that purpose. Determination of acceptable vendors for the transportation of the Optical Scan Voting Systems is the sole discretion of COUNTY.

**4. INSURANCE**. The USER agrees that it will, at its own expense, at all times during the term of this agreement, maintain in force a policy of insurance which will insure against liability for property damage and injury/death with regard to any property or persons. The liability and property damage coverage of such insurance shall not be less than One Million dollars (\$ 1,000,000). The USER agrees to have the COUNTY added to said insurance policies as named additional insured, as their interest may appear, and to provide the COUNTY with a certificate from said insurance company, or companies, showing coverage as herein before required, such certification to show the COUNTY as additional insured and to provide that such coverage shall not be terminated without written prior notice to the COUNTY.

### WAYS & MEANS

Dear Chairman Fiorini:

In fiscal year 2012 Oneida County realized an operating surplus of approximately \$8.4M. As you know, this is the result of many difficult choices in the past five years. We are smaller, more efficient, fiscally sound and moving in the right direction. However, we can not lose sight of where we were just a few short years ago. We can accomplish more toward our long term goals, but only if we maintain a proper fiscal discipline to sustain us through uncertain times.

Keeping in mind the difficult challenges Oneida County will continue to face in the future, I propose the following financial plan:

- 1) The amount restricted for fiscal stability currently at \$12,000,000 is increased to \$12,500,000 necessitated for timing delays in state and federal funding and maintaining cash flow stability;
- 2) The economic development fund is increased by \$1,000,000 for future investment whether Marcy-Nano, Airport, or any other bona-fide economic opportunity. We must be ready when opportunities arise that have the potential to benefit our region;
- 3) The amount of \$2,000,000 reserved for retirement costs. Out of this we will propose to appropriate & disburse to the NYS Retirement System another early payout against previous Retirement deferrals. You will recall the decision to defer helped us to mitigate property tax spikes due to large expenses required by NYS. This action will represent our 2<sup>nd</sup> early payoff and continues our plan for early payoff of the Retirement System deferrals, as financial conditions permit;
- 4) An amount of \$2,000,000 added to the amount restricted for present tax certiorari cases. During tough economic times large assessments are always under challenge. We are not an exception in that regard and have a potential exposure of over \$4,000,000 on four large cases;
- 5) The amount of \$2,500,000 restricted toward future health insurance costs and uncertainties due to the Affordable Care act beginning 2014. We need to keep in mind that we are self-insured and this will help buffer or hedge any catastrophic costs that can occur in any one year.
- 6) The amount of \$230,000 restricted toward Pay-As-You-Go Capital Projects to pay for anticipated improvements needed to the Oriskany Salt Garage.

All other restricted funds remain as is and that the remaining dollars stay in unrestricted fund balance for tax stabilization.

This continues the practice of fiscal prudence since the beginning of my administration toward a sound fiscal plan for the county of Oneida. All municipalities are required to have a financial plan and this proposal meets that requirement.

I respectfully request that the Board of Legislators adopt this financial plan at your May 8, 2013 meeting.

However, Mr. Amoroso has advised that the legislation is not subject to mandatory referendum and to take this action would require the approval of the Senate and Assembly as well as changes to the length of each of the specific terms of office.

With public sentiment clearly in favor of term limits (86% Republicans and 77% Democrats in support) and the clear display of support for the downsizing of government at the last election with regard to the reduction of the size of the Board of Legislators, I believe it crucial to move this legislation forward as expeditiously as possible. To that end, the attached legislation is the amended version that I would request you move to Ways and Means for consideration at the May meeting. It can then lie on the legislators' desks until the June meeting. In the interim a notice of public hearing and hearing can be scheduled.

I appreciate your consideration of this amendment and believe it will enhance the public's opinion of this Board of Legislators. We need to demonstrate and acknowledge that we are public servants and this legislation satisfies those requirements. RE: PROPOSED LOCAL LAW \_\_\_\_ of 2013

A LOCAL LAW TO REFORM COUNTY GOVERNMENT AND RESTRICT SPECIAL INTERESTS BY LIMITING THE TERMS OF OFFICE OF CERTAIN COUNTY ELECTED OFFICIALS

**LEGISLATIVE INTENT:** The public has clearly demonstrated its dissatisfaction with elected officials holding office for extended periods of time resulting in voter apathy and disinterest. The public perceives that elected officials are not only able to entrench themselves in public office at the taxpayers' expense, but are also able to insulate themselves from the true needs and wishes of the people. Finally, special interests are able to wield great influence on the governmental process when there is no limit on the terms of office of elected officials. All such elements were decisively presented with the approval of the reduction of the Board of Legislators. Additionally, this is not simply a local determination, it is also carried out nation-wide with similar local laws in numerous states and cities including (but not limited to): Oklahoma; California; Colorado; Nebraska; Ohio; Arizona; Michigan; Montana; Arkansas; North and South Dakota; Oregon; Washington; Wyoming; San Antonio and Houston, Texas; Jacksonville, The New York State counties of Florida; and Wichita, Kansas. Westchester, Broome, Suffolk, Cattaraugus, New York City, Steuben and Monroe have previously implemented this citizen representation approach to county government as clearly stipulated in the Constitution of the United States.

**PURPOSE:** Therefore, the purpose of this law is to prospectively impose a ten (10) year term limit on consecutive service by Oneida County Legislators and an eight (8) year term limit on consecutive service by the elected county-wide officials specified as County Executive and County Comptroller.

The Oneida County Charter and Administrative Code, Article 1 shall be amended to add the following section:

**SECTION 107.** <u>Limited Terms of Office for Certain Elected Officials.</u> The term of office for Oneida County Legislators shall be two (2) years with no person serving as a County Legislator for more than ten (10) consecutive years.

The term of office of the County Executive shall be four (4) years with no person serving as County Executive for more than eight (8) consecutive years.

The term of office of the County Comptroller shall be four (4) years with no person serving as County Comptroller for more than eight (8) consecutive years.

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED,** that this Legislation is approved by the Oneida County Board of Legislators and will be effective immediately upon the affirmative action of this Board.
