



New York State Public Health Law and Regulations Lead Poisoning Prevention and Control

Providers are required to:

- * Test all children at age 1 year and again at age 2 with a blood lead test.
- * At every well child visit, assess all children ages 6 months to 6 years for risk of lead exposure. Also get a blood lead test if there is a positive response to ANY questions in Does Your Child Need a Lead Test?
- * Report point-of-care blood lead test results to the NYS DOH in accordance with guidance.
- * Give the child's parent or guardian of the child the result of the blood lead test. You may also give them this helpful information What Your Child's Blood Lead Test Means.
- * Provide anticipatory guidance to all parents or guardians of children as part of routine care, which may include the Lead Poisoning is a Danger for Every Baby and Child.

Home Heating Related Emergencies

As the weather gets colder, some people may look to alternative methods for heating or lose utility service all together. Here are some resources that may help patients facing a heat-related emergency.

Safety reminders for families:

- Know the Dangers of Carbon Monoxide Poisoning
- Never use a charcoal grill to cook or heat indoors
- Do not use a gas oven to heat a home
- Emergency generators can be dangerous if used improperly. Never use one indoors.
- Install and check the batteries in carbon monoxide detectors

The symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning can vary. People may experience headaches, dizziness, nausea, lightheadedness, weakness, confusion, vomiting, or chest pain.
