Happy New Year! Throughout 2022, under the leadership of County Executive Anthony J. Picente Jr., the Oneida County Health Department, along with MVHS and Rome Health have spent much of the year working on the 2022-2024 Community Health Assessment, Community Service Plan and Improvement Plan (CHA/CSP/CHIP). Within the parameters of the NYS Prevention Agenda, this assessment is the first since the start of the COVID pandemic and provides us with a look at our county's current health status, needs, and issues. The COVID-19 pandemic touched the health and wellness of the entire community in a variety of ways but also highlighted the value of collaboration with community partners. Community input was gathered through surveys, focus groups and in-depth interviews with key stake holders.

This process led us to select the following needs themes as the key focus in the upcoming CHIP:

Mental Health/Children Teens Social Emotional Health

Chronic Disease Preventive Care/Screenings

Goals include:

Increasing breast cancer screening rates.

Increasing early detection and promoting evidence-based care to prevent and manage diabetes and prediabetes. Preventing suicides.

Facilitating supportive environments that promote respect and dignity for people of all ages.

Supporting and enhancing children and adolescents' social-emotional development and relationships.

Lead Testing

If a child has <u>an elevated capillary</u> blood lead level $\geq 5 \,\mu g/dL$, confirmation with a venous sample is required. In the case of EBLL $\geq 45 \,\mu g/dL$, <u>you must</u> notify OCHD at 315-798-5064 within 24 hours.

To be discharged from the Health Department's care coordination services, two venous tests at least three months apart are required, and both of them must be less than $5\mu g/dL$.


Increase in Pediatric Invasive Group A

NYS Influenza Activity






COVID-19 Hospitalizations
