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Harmful Algae Blooms (HAB) confirmed in Otter Lake; Report of a likely HAB on Delta Lake

Oneida County Health Department is encouraging the public to use caution, as there has been a confirmed presence of a cyanobacteria HAB in Otter Lake (Oneida Co.). There is also a report of a likely cyanobacteria HAB on Delta Lake and Turtle Pond within Delta Lake State Park but currently outside of the public bathing beach.

Exposure to blooms and toxins can cause symptoms such as diarrhea, nausea or vomiting; skin, eye or throat irritation and allergic reactions or breathing difficulties. People and pets should avoid contact with blooms, and should rinse off with clean water if contact occurs. People can come into contact with harmful toxins through recreational water activities, drinking untreated surface water, and consuming contaminated freshwater fish or shellfish. The Oneida County Health Department recommends contacting your health care provider if symptoms following exposure to blue-green algae occur. The Health Department also is discouraging people from drawing water from the lake for domestic use at this time.

Blue-green algae, technically known as cyanobacteria, are microscopic organisms that are naturally present in lakes and streams. They usually are present in low numbers. Blue-green algae can become very abundant in warm, shallow, undisturbed surface water that receives a lot of sunlight. When this occurs, they can form blooms that discolor the water or produce floating rafts or scums on the surface of the water. Bathing beaches regulated by local health departments are periodically closed due to the occurrence of blue-green algae blooms. In addition to the possible presence of harmful toxins, reduced visibility in the water caused by algae blooms could create a drowning hazard.
