Oneida County – Trend Data

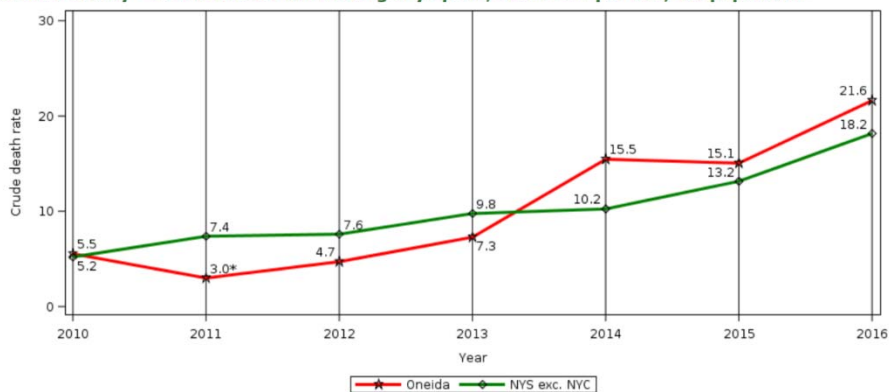
- Onondaga County Medical Examiner Data: 39 Drug Use/Toxin Related Deaths for 2018

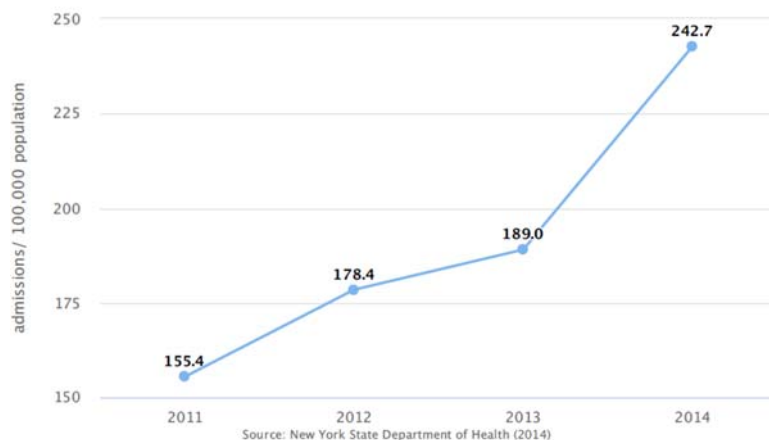

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About ODMAP (Overdose Detection Mapping Application Program):

Trend data is important to help monitor trends over time; but it does not provide real-time “actionable” surveillance data to detect and respond to immediate overdose crises.

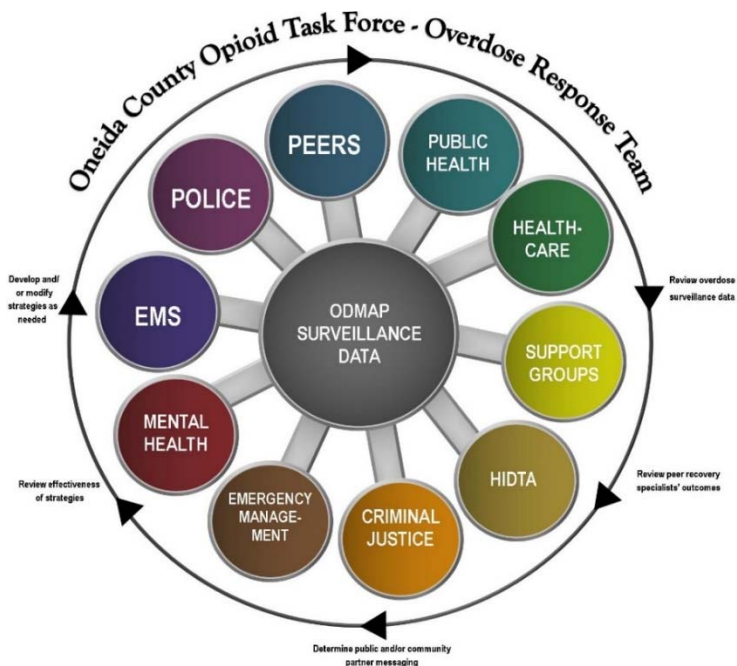
Most communities lack a consistent methodology to track overdoses, both fatal and non-fatal, in real time across jurisdictions, which is necessary to mobilize a cohesive and collaborative response capable of addressing these issues within our communities. ODMAP addresses this issue by:

- Providing near real-time suspected overdose surveillance data across jurisdictions to support a collaborative public safety and public health effort to mobilize an immediate response to a sudden increase, or spike in overdose events and to directly connect to overdose victims.
- Supporting a strategic analysis of overdoses locally, across jurisdictions and nationwide. This tool is only available to government (state, local, federal, or tribal) agencies serving the interests of public safety and health.

Overdose Response Team Goals:

The Oneida County Overdose Response Team is a multi-sector subgroup of the Opiate Task Force with the primary goal of using surveillance data to reduce overdose injuries and fatal drug overdoses in Oneida County by:

- **Objective #1:** Implementing ODMAP (Overdose Detection Mapping Application Program) to capture and monitor accurate and real-time confirmed overdoses from law enforcement.
- **Objective #2:** Establishing a 24/7 peer referral process to dispatch Certified Peer Recovery Advocates (CRPAs) to overdose victims identified in ODMAP to help link them to treatment and recovery services.
- **Objective #3:** Monitoring ODMAP surveillance data to identify spikes and develop and disseminate coordinated public health alerts to reduce injury or death from overdoses and to mobilize resources and a coordinated response from community members and community partners to address the threat.

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County Law Enforcement Agencies Reporting to ODMAP:

Results of outreach to law enforcement to promote reporting to ODMAP:

- 16 out of 16 Oneida County local law enforcement agencies signed agreements to report overdoses to ODMAP and to allow sharing of their data for peer follow up.
- Law enforcement call in reports of overdoses increased from **21%** in January 2019 to **91%** in March of 2019 (remainder mined and confirmed by the Mohawk Valley Crime Analysis Center).

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Peer Visit Outcomes (Jan –to Date):

- 17 people accepted treatment or peer recovery services
- Some feedback from peer outreach:
 - *“Thank you so much for caring”*
 - *“I didn’t know that people really cared about this; do you think you can help my wife?”*
 - *One person in tears said “I can’t believe you came here to help me- I didn’t think anyone cared”*
 - *“I didn’t want to let you guys down”.*
 - *“I feel like you guys are the only people who understand”*
 - *“Thank you for caring and believing in me”*
